TO MAINE'S DEAD

Mast of III-Fated Battisship-Will Be Principal Feature of Artington Monument.

SHAFT

Unless something unexpected intervenes, a handsome monument in memory of the dead of the battleship Maine will be erected in the Arlington national cametery before the close of the coming summer, in execution of the act of congress to that effect. There is about \$50,000 available for the purpose, and the committee of fine arts has approved two designs for the memorial.

In accordance with the provisions of the act of congress, the mainmast of the Mains will form the principal feature of the memorial. That mast was taken from the sunken hull inthe harbor of Havana about a year ago and brought to the Washington navy yard on the transport Leonidas. Since then it has been denuded of, the searchlight platform and the boom atep and covered with red lead. It now consists of a hollow tube about sixty feet in length surmounted with an armored fighting top. It will form a column rising from a foundation of points. granite and concrete with ornamental surroundings.

The sum of \$300 was allotted for the transportation of the mast from the local navy yard to its chosen site in the Arlington cemetery. A contract for its removal was made with the understanding that the work should be done with as little delay as possible. The mast, in its present condition, weighs 22,660 pounds, or about twenty long tons. Because of its length and peculiar construction its successful transfer involves several problems for the contractors: Their plans involve the use of a specially constructed truck in two or more sections with from twenty to thirty draft borses for the motive power. 

A CONFUSSION OF IDEAS

There seems to be a tendency in the literature and on the stage of these times to vulgarity. From a study of eugenics and a fight against the white slave traffic there seems to have risen a demand for stories and plays dealing with the sex problem. Writers and publishers, these are in plenty, that will deal in this sort of literature because there is a market for it. They may be better than owners of houses of ill-fame but they are in the same infamous business. Many stories dealing frankly with the sins of passion and the punishment of such sins have been banished from res pectable libraries for years and cast aside by good women who must know something of life, but these same libraries and good women will read and sanction novels that are rotten to the core so long as they are written in respectable language.

The viciousness of these stories lies not in the fact that they deal with sex relations-many of the finest words in the world deal with these relations and will deal with them so long as the awful tragedies that fill the newspapers grow out of them; it lies in the fact that they deal with these tremendous forces of human nature for the purpose of trade. The talk about "truth to life," "art for art's sake," "daring to face the facts" is pure hypocrisy in the case of men and women who exploit passion for business purposes The difference between the art that deals boldly and nobly with the sins of passion and that which exploits passion is distinct and net misleading, the mischief lies in interposing a veil that confuses but does not conceal; that heightens the immorality by substituting suggestion for revelation.

The fashion in womens dress that constantly reveals a little more of their anatomy each year is a menace to one of the safe guards heaven of society. It cheapens women and anything that tends to lower the respect of society for women strikes at the foundation of resthan you. pectability. If our boys grow up with no respect for wifehood or motherhood there is little to keep them from living like the beast of the field.

A FEW SUGGESTIONS

THE DEMOCRAT, at the danger of being accused of butting in. has taken the privilege from time to time of suggesting improvements, etc., that the town is in need of and has at this time a few things in its system that will at least look well on paper.

First. The town needs a dumping ground and needs it bad. It is getting increasingly difficult and expensive to get a barrel of tin cans, broken bottles and china hauled away and will soon become prohibitive unless a place is provided for the disposal of such refuge. A monthly collection of such rubbish at the town's expense might be arranged.

Second. A pair of hay scales located on a prominent and easily row-gauge mind a wreck is the inevitable result. accessible corner would be a great convenience to merchants and farmers and would easily pay a good rate of interest on the invest-

Thirdly. The town ought to own a team of mules, wagon and mower. Nearly every town in the state owns one or more teams and finds them a great saving in expense. With our own team the dirt could be hauled out of the streets more promptly and the weeds could be cut from the highways often enough to keep them neat and trim.

Fourthly. We would suggest that so long as a tax has been laid for a new town hall, one years' assessment collected and the build next summer so we can be getting the use of the beauty and usefulness of the structure as soon as possible.

Fifthly. The most important step in installing water, lights and sewerage is the hiring of an engineer. Get one that is of unquestional integrity and pay him enough so the contractors can't easily tempt him. He will have seven or eight months' work with an assistant most of the time and his time is worth more than common labor

SMALL FARMS DESIRABLE

Taking the country as a whole bountiful crops have been raised and prices are good, far above the average. There will soon be plenty of cash in circulation, and as usual thousands will be seeking new homes. Land prices continue to advance with a prospect that they will go still higher. This causes a hegira from the states and communities of high-priced land to other sections of the country. The average young American is land hungry, and is anxious to secure a home. In former days it was the ambition of all young es to own a large body of land. Nowdays the young ifs is willing to extile down upon a small tract and cultivate it intensively. The boy's corn clubs have demonstrated the value of intelligent and intensive cultivation. The taxes on small farms are not as great as on large ones and as labor is scarce it pays the young farmer to buy a small piece of land which he and his family can easily cultivate.
