Nearly all Europe now owns Mexican silence without being called a sphinx. and operates the telegraph and telephone, and we are several years behind them in this respect. These things are natural monopolie and should be run in the interest of the public like the Post Office instead of in the interest of the stockholders as



## GOVERNOR STUART SIGNS ENABLING ACT

Poem from Virgil's "Æneid"

Shortly before one o'clock yesterday Gov. Henry C. Stuart signed the enabling act, passed last week by both branches of the General Assembly. The act directs the Governor to call a special election for September 22, 1914, upon a petition signed by one-fourth of the qualified voters of the State who voted in the last general election, approximately 18,000. The act admits to the electorate all persons who voted in the November, 1913. election and those who are qualified to vote in the election of June. 1914. The ballots are to be marked "For" and "against State-wide probibition," and if a majority vote is cast for Statewide prohibition the law becomes effective November 1, 1916.


