One thing that caused a big stir in legislative circles last week was the call which was issued by Attorney-General Pollard, President of the Progressive Democratic League, for the convention to be held in Richmond on the 27th and 28th, as forshadowed in last week's report, at which Senator Owen and Secretary of State Bryan will deliver addresses. The legislature has also invited Mr. Bryan to make a special address to its members and Senator Owen is expected to address the Senate committee on elections on the subject of woman's suffrage. The Progressive Democrata are expected to come to Richmond in large flocks, and there will be interest in the atmosphere.

Meanwhile, the calendars of the Senate and House are being crowded and the session is more than half gone. Few bills have been actually passed and most of those have been inconsequential. There is great interest in the fate of the primary election bills. but the Senate committee stubbornly refuses to report any of them. It is to be hoped the Governor will send a special message on election reform which will shake some of the reactionary Senators like an earthquake.

MAIN POINTS IN AND LING ACT

Directs Governor to call special election on September 22, 1914, upon petition signed by approximately 18,000 qualified voters. Admits to electorate all persons who voted in general election November, 1913. and all persons who are qualified to vote in

June elections of 1914. Ballots are to be marked "for State-wide prohibition" and

"against State-wide prohibition." If majority of votes are cast for State-wide prohibition, prohibi tive law goes into effect November 1, 1916.

Permits manufacture and sale of wine and beer only by persons or companies now engaged in their manufacture, providing that products are shipped out of State and into wet territory. Prohibits manufacture of brandy as a by-product of wine, and

all other wine by-products which contain a larger percentage of alcohol than wine itself. Exempts from operation of prohibitive law domestic manufa
