One of the biggest fights ahead will be over the proposed tax commission. Business men generally and many of the conservative members of the Legislature desire a commission of five named by the Governor. However, the predominant sentiment among the members seem to be for a large commission of members only. Perhaps there may be a harmonizing of the two ideas with a commission of, say, fifteen members plus five outside experts named by the Governor. Anyway, it is doubtful whether the special session of only thirty days can accomplish a general revision of our tax system.

The current week will witness the convocation of progressive democrats, who will meet Friday pursuant to the call issued by Attornéy-General Pollard. Senator Owen will speak Friday night and Secretary of State W. J. Brvan on Saturday night. The latter's theme will be "Progressive Democracy." Earlier in the day he will address the Legislature, and will naturally be the object of much attention while in Richmond.

The progressive democrats declare their program to be formulative and not factional, and insist that they are merely trying to hring Virginia into line with her more progressive sister states.

TO SPREAD FARMING GOSPEL Congress has before it a bill providing means by which the ex-

perts of the agricultural schools can go forth and tell the farmers face to face that which the experts have been telling in the written word. The idea is to make the work of the schools a little more practical, to spread the gospel of good farming a little more directly, to show by example just how much good meat there is in these things which the scientists have been setting down in books.

Without doubt there is a tremendous amount of lore stored away rds and libraries and brains of the agricultural colleges which does not get to the folk who can benefit by it. Life is too short, there is too much to do. there are too many ideas hobbing up from day to day, there is too much go-aheadness in the human mind, for experts, once they have made discoveries or developed a system or improved upon something or other, to spend all their days in harping upon and distributing one set of facts. They write about them and then go on with other work. Perhaps the facts are made use of, perhaps they are not. The trouble is that the form of distributing wisdom is defective. It is a hit-or-miss game.

The bill in Congress ought to pass. It is the best thing in the things to urge your congressman to give this measure his vote.
