"Thirty-six thousand pounds of mail-order catalogues, filling a large box car, reached Staunton recently from a Chicago firm for distribution in Virginia and adjoining States. The catalogues would have cost about \$1,500 if sent by parcels post trong Chicage, so the books were freighted at a cost of \$192, and will be mailed from the Staunton postoffice.

The above item, which comes from a Staunton paper, tells story with a moral. It tells the story of the successful mail order house in the big cities reaching after—and getting—the business that rightfully belongs to the local merchant.

It tells the story of thousands of dollars going to the mail order houses that should be spent with local business men.

It tells the story of money going from the rural districts to the cities never to return-money that should remain in circulation at

It tells the story of the difference in success of the man who advertises and the man who don't. The one knows it pays to advertise, the other thinks it don't.

Moral: If you want the people to spend their money with you, advertise! Tell them what you have to sell and tell them that you want their business. If you don't want them to spend their money with you, don't advertise, just brush the accumulation of dust from your counter and walk to the door—and you will see those who should be your customers go to the postoffice and buy money orders payable to the mail order concerns. If you don't want to do busiiness. don't advertise!

YOUNG PEOPLE AND SCHOOLS

Parents, tell us what you think of this. Medical statistics are authority for the statement that a large per cent of children attending school are afflicted with curvature of grasp is the spine or other bodily imperfections which could be easily corrected by a simple method of physical exercise.

And this brings to our mind a suggestion for local application. Why not let our school board, or teachers, prescribe such a course for the pupils in our public schools? That sluggish feeling which retards the advancement of so many pupils would gradually disappear under proper physical exercise, leaving both mind and body in practice and the Spanish-American disturbance a holiday vacation a healthy state.
