## RIVER VICTIM STILL UNIDENTIEIED

Man Found Floating in Potomac Near Quantico Last Week Was Well Dressed-Long Gash on Left Side of Head.

The circumstances, surrounding the death of the man found floating in the Potomac river near Quantico last week as reported in the Democrat, still remain a mystery. At a coroner's inquest held last Wednesday afternoon the jury returned ,a verdict of drowning and declared that the man was un-

Magistrate W. E. Lloyd, who presided at the inquest, in making his report to Commonwealth Attorney T. H. Lion, of the finding of the jury, gave a description of the man, stating that he was black. Some who viewed the body declared that he was a Haitian. He was about 28 years old, weighed about 150 pounds.
