It is now the first week in March. June, with its biennial municipal election, will soon be upon us. The present, therefore, seems the time for the citizens of Manassas to be considering in a serious manner the term of government that Manassas needs for the two years beginning Sep-

Through the medium of the press and conversation with a number of local citizens, I have adaynced the opinion that the logical and much needed type of administration for Manassas is that where the management of the town is placed in the hands of one competent individual is still my earnest conviction that this form of municipal government fers the only satisfactory solution of the critical situation which Massasas now finds itself in.

To the majority of the citizens of Manassas, I trust, it is superficient to say that in presenting my opinion it has been done with absoluters we thought of "feathering my own cap." Were I deemed as pussessed of the necessary qualifications and offered the position of town manager had Manassas, positively I would not accept it, as plans now coming to a head, and which have been in process of formation for seevral months. will shortly call me elsewhere.

This clears the slate for announcing the taking of a straw vote by the local papers to ascertain, if possible, just what the adults living within the corporate limits of Manassas-men and women, regardless of whether or not they are registered voters desire in the way of women administration for the two years starting September 1, 1921.

For the benefit of the Manassas readers of this-paper who are unfamiliar with or do not recall the reasons I have given for favoring the town manager form of government for Manassas, I have written an article in the nature of a summary, which will be found in another column of this






