#### CODE OF THE TOWN OF MANASSAS. (Continued from last week.)

Sec. 9 No member shall, after appearing at any meeting, stated or special, retire before adjournment, unless excused by the Council ceeded against as provided in section seven. Claire Whitney, Charles Gerard, and and any member violating the provisions of this section may be pro-Frankie Moran.

Sec. 10. Regular meetings of the Council shall be held on the first and 22 cents. day of September, 1917, and every two years thereafter, and on the last Monday night of each calendar month, at 8 o'clock p. m.

The Clerk shall attend all meetings of the Council and shall accurately record all proceedings of such meetings, in the orde in which they are adopted; and shall record the appearance and re-Ogle, and Clarence Burton. tirement of members; charge the Treasurer with all fines reported by Also Pathe News and Review. Man the Mayor; countersign all warrants drawn upon the Treasurer; and 11 and 17 cents. Night 11 and 22 cents. by order of tthe Council, record all ordinances or resolutions having the effect of ordinances, in a book to be provided for that purpose leaving every alternate page blank for the entering of such amendments as may be adopted; make out all tax bills, assess all persons and property omitted by the Commissioner of the Revenue; issue all licenses provided by the town ordinances; preserve the records of the town, and while keeping the same open for inspection at all times, he shall not let them leave his possession, except upon an order of a court of competent jurisdiction; he shall furnish copies of any records to any person applying therefor, for which service he may charge fifteen cents for each page of one hundred words or fraction thereof, to be paid for by the person for whom such service is rendered. Whenever requested by the Mayor or any three members of the Council, he shall issue, in writing, a call for the Council to assemble in special meeting. Sec. 12. The Sergeant shall, in addition to performing the duties

of a police officer, keep the supervision of the Street Committee; co lect such revenues as he may be required to collect, accounting for the same to the proper officer of the town, and perform other such duties as shall be required of him. Sec. 13. No person shall carry into any barn or stable, or use therein for lighting purposes any light other than that furnished by

electricity, gas or a lantern; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of lamps in any room set apart as an office or sleeping apartment. Any person violating this section shall, upor conviction be fined not less than one, nor more than five dollars. Sec. 14. No person shall cast, throw or fire any squib, rocket cracker, torpedo, grenade, or other combustible fireworks or ex-

plosive preparation, within the town; provided that the Mayor may give permission for an exhibition of fireworks, at stated places, on Independence Day and Christmas Day, the said exhibition to be continued not later than midnight, and when such permission is given CHAS. H. ADAMS the party obtaining it shall file said permit with the Principal Engineer of the fire company before the beginning of such exhibition. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than one nor more than five dollars.

Sec. 15. No person shall keep any ashes in any wooden or other DE L. F. HOUGE, vessel, within fifty feet of any building nor place ashes on the floor of any building. Any person violating this section shall upon conviction, be fined not less than one, nor more than twenty dollars.



by France to Great Britain in 1766 and became a part of the United States at the end of the Revolution by the Treaty of Par-is in 1788. The Northwest territory was brganized by 'congress four years later. Then, as this great federal domain became settled and was gradually divided into states, the Eastern part of the present State of Min-nesota belonged in turn to the Territories of Indians, Michigan

and Wisconsin. As to the western portionthe state, this was a part of the Louisiana Purchase, which was bought from France by the United States in 1808. As this region became subdivided. Western Minnesota formed a part of the Territories of Louisians. Missouri and Iowa.

The first white man to pene trate to Minnesota was the French explorer. Duluth, who in 1678 built a fort on Lake Superfor and there established a very extensive for trade. Two years later, Father Hennepin and two companions were sent by La Saile to explore the Upper Mis-St. Anthony, where Minneapolis now makes. But it was not uptil the Nineteenth century that permanent settlements were made. In 1822 the first mill was

built at the Falls of St. Anthony. where were destined to arise such important successors. In 1841, Pather Galtier built a chand dedicated to St. Paul, and this was the foundation of the passent great city of that name. As to the name Minnesota, the state was so called from the river that runs through it, which in the Dakota Indian language makes the words "Minne." meaning "Water," and "Setal," meaning "Sky-colored." Is it necessary that the council "request" all places of business to close their respective houses during Sunday morning and evening hours of worship? And if there is a law forbidding the conducting of business on Sundays, does it not apply to all hours of the twentyfour and not just those during which religious worship is conducted?

The council is asked to give encouragement to the ladies in organizing a civic league. Why any more "the ladies" than men and children? Civic leagues, to be really successful, must be made up of me and even children, as well as women. A civic league, if properly functioning, addresses itself to all-around improvement and beautifica- will profit. tion of the town. It seeks to enroll as members every citizen, regard less of sex, who has the interests of the town at heart.

There is no doubt in the minds of those who have looked into the tires. Try them next time. matter that both our light and power rates are too high. What became a necessity during the high prices that held until about six months ago does not hold today. Mayor Davis' recommendation that the town cut the light rate to 15 cents per kilowatt hour is well nassas. taken. With such a cut in the light rate, should there not be a twocent cut in the power rate? We must not forget that one of the first questions asked by prospective business establishments is "What are your power and light rates?"

Paragraph No. 6, section No. 76, of the town code specifies that Managers no milk shall be disposed of in Manassas until the party or parties so doing shall have a permit from the board of health showing that the regulations latt down previously in this section have been complied with. This law, we understand, has not been rescinded, and, therefore, needs but to be enforced.

The foregoing comments are made in the spirit of public helpfi ness and with an earnest desire to see the new administration account plish what it is expected to accomplish for Manassas.


