

Commandment IV says the school is "the cradle of the future," and that we should honor it with the best of teachers, building and equipment. How true! But this is not intended to be a summary of the article, so again we suggest that you read it carefully.

AIMING TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF MISPITS

One of the most hopeful features of present-day education is the increasing attention given to vocational guidance work. It is only within comparatively recent years that anything really worth while has been attempted to prevent the appalling tragedy of so many misfits in life work everywhere. For centuries and centuries, it has been observed that a man who is a failure in one line of work may have all the necessary qualifications for being successful in another, due to inaptitude and aptitude, respectively, for the work performed.

The Manassas Africultural High school is doing good work along the line of vocational guidance, but, of course, this is limited in its scope. Outside of offering a number of specialized courses o study for those who wish to get a training in some work at which they can make a living, each year a series of vocational guidance talks is given before the student body. This, we understand, is, the extent of the work of this character given at the local high school.

Note elsewhere in this issue an article telling of the establishment of a vocational clinic at a Washington community center. There, the children are not only given helpful advice about the work they seem to be best fitted for, but their parents are invited to confer with the officials in charge, and grown-ups who feel that they are not fitted for the work they are doing, can seek advice there also. Perhaps some which vocational clinic, in a modified form, could be provided for in each school in Prince William, with decidedly helpful results to the Individuals applying, to their communities and to the whole county.

DO YOU PLAN YOUR LEISURE?

The man or woman, or boy or girl who does not make plans for his on her leisure hours in running the risk of really wasting a great deal of time, if not promoting an unsatisfactory future. 
