OUR SUGGESTIONS SOMETIMES MISINTERPRETED. PERHAPS.

The NEWS and its editor desire to take this opportunity to clear up a certain amount of misunderstanding that seems to exist in the minds of a few of the citizens of the town and county which we have

It has been brought to our attention in a few indirect ways that some have gained the impression that the NEWS, in freely offering suggestions along various lines for the betterment of county and town. has not hesitated to "knock" both Prince William and Manassas. Nothing, however, is farther from the truth.

If the ideal paper is one that knows only adjectives of praise and that, for one reason of another, desists from stating unpleasant facts of public concern, then the NEWS pleads guilty of never having striven to be an ideal paper.

But to our mind, and to the minds of hundreds and hundreds o journalists throughout the country, the function of a paper is to give the news and to enlighten its readers upon matters of vital importance to them. This, in a nutshell, explains why the NEWS has repeatedly risked the "knocks" of a few "boosters" in telling the local public what we have felt it was not only entitled to know, but what it was anxious to know, even though weaknesses of county or town may have been revealed in such recitals.

In this day of enlightment it is well nigh futile for county town to strive to appear what is is not; and we do not believe the great majority of the people would care to wear a false front, if the maintenance of one were at all profitable, which is certainly not the

Thinking back over the suggestions that the NEWS and its editor have made for the advancement of Prince William and Manassas, it will be recalled that in every instance the suggestions were suggestions and never anything more. Not once have we asserted that our opinion was THE opinion (for we are as apt to err as any, and we know it); all our suggestions have been made with the idea of provoking discussion and clear-cut thinking, and it is surprising to us that a few have so misinterpreted our statements and suggestions as to consider some of them "knocks"

The man or woman or child in Prince William, if there is one, who thinks the county and the county seat are well nigh perfect and that things are good enough and that but little remains to be done to improve the lot of those living in this territory, is a hopeless "Rip Van Winkle." It must be remembered that all progress is made through a healthy discontent with existing conditions. It is only when we confess to ourselves—not in fear and trembling; not in a resigned manner, but in the spirit of desiring improvement—that we realize the need for better roads and schools and municipal advantages, etc., that we are on the path leading to these things.

If the NEWS and its editor have been of any assistance in promoting the progress of Prince William and Manassas, the fact that we have done a little something to advance the interests of county and town rewards amply our untiring efforts. If, on the other hand. there are those who feel that our services have not been as helpful as they might have been, we ask that, by these, our motives be weighed and that our efforts be judged from the viewpoint of what we were seeking to see accomplished for the ultimate good of one and all.
