W. M. KLINE WILL PRESIDE

W. M. Kline, Manassas, a member of the board of directors of Southern States Manassas Cooperative, will preside and also make an address at the Southern States Regional Board meeting to be held at the Masonic hall, Manassas, Thursday evening, February 17, at 7 o'clock.

One of the principal features of the program will be consideration of several matters of policy, including the following:

- Shall patronage refunds be paid in stock or cash?
- Shall Southern States shorten the period during which voting stock is left outstanding? (Present policy is to call stock at par value 10 years

from date of issuance.) Shall delegates (board members) nominate Southern States directors by mail in advance of the annual meeting?

If transportation restrictions become no more severe shall the members' (patrons') annual meetings be held this year?

District Manager B. H. Werner of Leesburg will outline what he believes are the prospects farmers have for getting various supplies they need in conducting their farming operations this spring, and W. G. Wysock, Richmond, general manager of Southern States Cooperative, will review some of Southern States activities during the last half of 1943. Group singing will be another feature.

This meeting will be attended by members of Southern States Advisory boards and boards of directors and other representatives of Southern States Cooperative in Prince William and Fairfax counties.

NEGRO APPLICANTS ACCEPTABLE FOR SRU'S

Alton Frix, Chief Petty Officer in Charge of the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station which is located in the Post Office building in Manassas, announced today that negro applicants are now acceptable for rating in the famed Ship Repair Units of the Navy. Men of the SRUs, as the Repair Units are commonly called, are today rebuilding, repairing and re-fitting the ships of Uncle Sam's greatest Navy. Basic training for the duties to be performed in the SRU is given at the big Navy Yards throughout the country.

"Negro applicants for the SRUs may qualify in any of the many rates now open to skilled men," said Chief Frix. At present skilled men in the following trades are urgently needed by the Ship Repair Units: Riggers, Divers, Blacksmiths.

Men qualified in any of these skills are urged to contact their nearest Navy Recruiting Station at once. The procedure for enlistment in the Ship Repair Units require that an applicant see an interviewing officer of the SRU before receiving his final notice of induction into the armed forces. If found qualified for a rating in the SRUs the applicant will be awarded a rating commensurate with his skill and given a letter which is to be presented to his local draft board. He will volunteer for induction and be assigned to the SRUs when inducted. It is needed, as in the SRUs, he not only helps his country, he helps himself and his family, for the pay of the higher ratings is awarded skilled men of the SRUs who qualify."

KILLED IN ACTION

On Sunday Mrs. Hazel Ash, Warrenton, received a telegram stating that Sgt. Ash was believed lost, and General J. A. Uilo's confirming letter said: "An official message has now been received which states that he was killed in action on the date he was previously reported missing in action. If additional information is received, it will be transmitted to you. May the knowledge that he made the supreme sacrifice in defense of his home and country be a source of sustaining comfort."

Sgt. Ash, a bombardier on a Billy Mitchell bomber, was reported missing in action after a combat mission from North Africa to southern Italy on September 16, in which his bomber was shot down by enemy anti-aircraft fire. Three of the five-man crew jumped before the plane crashed, but could not be identified, and all five were reported missing.

He has two brothers in the Army, Frank Ash, overseas, and Albert, stationed at Camp Shelby, Miss. His wife and young daughter Betty Ann make their home with his parents, and he has two brothers, W. Alwyn and Carlin Ash, in Warrenton.

Sgt. Ash used to help out on the Journal and we thought very highly of him.

Cadet Douglas C. Morris, son of Mrs. Mary V. Morris of Manassas, Va., recently reported to Greenwood Army Air Field, AAF Training Command, Greenwood, Miss., as a student in basic flight training. He was graduated from Manassas High School and attended the University of Virginia at Charlottesville, Va. He was accepted as Aviation Cadet at Richmond, Va., in July 1943.

HE is so small and helpless. So dependent on you for his life and well-being. And yet you are able to look at him and say—

"Someday he may be President."

Put it down as foolish sentiment. Put it down as parental pride. But where else in the world could you envision for your child the possibility of his attaining, one day, the highest office in the land?

Maybe your child won't make it. But one child, very much like him, will. One child out of the three million babies born this year—or the next—or the year after.

Whether or not he attains this high position is not so important. What matters is that here, in America, he is born

with that opportunity. He is born in the stubborn tradition of free men—men who felt that in government, the wisdom of the many is preferable to the ambition of the few. He is born in a tradition of self-reliance—where he may succeed or fail, win or lose, rise or fall, according to his own efforts.

Because of that, you will train him to think for himself, to fight his own battles, to make his own way.

You will teach him that responsibility is inseparable from freedom. And that if he joins with other men in an enterprise he should demand the same responsibility and freedom for his business that marks his birthright as an individual.

Someday he may hear, as you have heard, voices that say, "Surrender your opportunity for the certainty that you shall always have bread"—as if man lived by bread alone. As if the country were better served by limiting all to mediocrity—instead of assuring to all, under law, an equal chance to rise by their own efforts, conscious of their obligations to others.

What that son of yours learns at your knee will decide whether or not he will ever have to bend his knee before dictation and tyranny.

And because of what you teach him, he too may one day look with that same foolish pride on his own son to say, "Someday he may be President—"

Mr. Disney, inspired by the wise "You can't breakfast like a bird and work like a horse!" Guess we'll all agree to that—and most of us are working like horses these days.

What kind of breakfast will your family start the day with, tomorrow? Will it keep them strong right up to lunchtime—or will it be a sparrows' breakfast?

What, No Time?

If it's lack of time that's worrying you, remember that you can get a good breakfast together in ten minutes—the time it takes to make a cup of coffee! Modern cereals are quick and easy as opening a package, and they come in more varieties than you can shake a stick at. And the cereal breakfast foods of 1944—natural, whole-grain, restored or enriched with vitamins and minerals—make an important contribution to the daily requirements of proteins, B-vitamins, minerals and fuel for energy.

You can serve a big bowl of cereal, with fruit and milk and sugar in it, and have a breakfast in that single bowl! An egg or some meat takes only a few minutes, and rolls or bread or toast and butter (or margarine) add to the score.

Look Ahead!

First make yourself a list of the fruits your family likes and which are on the market (oranges, grapefruit, dried prunes, apples, etc.)—and remember they can be served alone or on cereal. Put opposite each one, the way you want to prepare them—stewed, sliced, fresh, squeezed (ever squeeze a grapefruit for the juice alone?—mmmm!).

Then make a list of the cereals your family likes best, including a few different ones for them to try as a treat. Wheat, corn, oats, barley, bran, rice—what's their favorite flavor? Rolled, ground, flakes, made into shreds, biscuits, rounds—all shapes and sizes!

Make a list of the ways your family likes its bread—as many as you can. The same goes for eggs and meat. Change the style or choice as you follow the week through.

There's the basis for your week's "pin-up" breakfast plan!

Are we looking for a "soft job" at home instead of doing our patriotic duty?

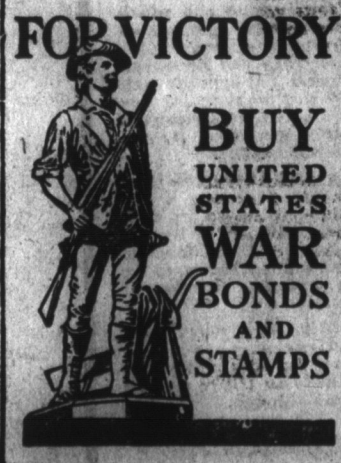
