Day to Get Wheat Loans

Farmers have until next Tuesday, January 31, to take out loans and purchase agreements on their wheat crop. The same closing date applies to price support programs for 1949 crop oats, rye, barey and soybeans.

On the 1948 crop, loans and purchase agreements were available only through December 31, 1948, but the price support period was extended through January this year to give farmers greater price protection and market stability. lengthening of price support availability also enables farmers to apply the proceeds of their 1949 crop price support and sales on 1950 income taxes, since most farmers are on an annual rather than accrual income tax basis

Farmers holding crops under purchase agreements, who intend to deliver to the Commodity Credit Corporation, must file their intentions with the local PMA county office within a 30-day period prior to the maturity date for loans.

Both loans and purchase agreements on 1949 corn will continue to be available through March 31,


