REPORT ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

January - March 2014

Executive Summary

During the first quarter of 2014, the Department of Economic Development (the Department) completed five (5) economic development projects totaling \$75.0 million in intended capital investment and 60 new jobs, 33 of which were in targeted industries. The Department also continued to advance its key functions of project assistance, prospect development and marketing outreach. This report offers an overview of current economic conditions, an update on the Department's program activities as well as other departmental initiatives.

Current Economic Conditions and Leading Indicators

Most recent estimates suggest that Prince William County's population grew to 420,465¹ by December 2013, an increase from 402,002 as of the last US Census in 2010. The County's population grew by 43% between 2000 and 2010.



According to latest available data, as of the third quarter of 2013, the County was home to 7,969 business establishments, employing an estimated 116,765 persons. *Images 1 and 2* depict the ten-year trend in both indicators and show they have increased during this time period.





Notwithstanding an upswing in unemployment over the period 2007-2010 in the wake of the economic downturn, unemployment has continued to trend downwards over the last four years as shown in *Image 3* from a high of 6.5% in February 2010 to 4.8% by the February 2014, reflective of a steady improvement in overall economic conditions.



During the first quarter of 2014, vacancy rates for most categories of commercial real estate trended downwards suggesting an increase in commercial real estate activity over the period. The overall commercial vacancy rate stood at 8.1% for the quarter down from 8.7% in the fourth quarter of 2013 and a peak of 11.1% in the first quarter of 2010. Underlying the overall commercial vacancy rate in the first quarter of 2014 were vacancy rates of 12.4% for office, 15.1% for flex, 6.3% for industrial and 6.2% for retail properties as shown in *Image 4*.



Economic Development Program Update

Existing Business Program

During the first quarter of 2014, the Department continued to focus on providing support to our local businesses through a variety of means. Existing business outreach during the quarter consisted of **597** instances of proactive and reactive outreach bearing in mind that outreach often entailed multiple interactions with the same company. Accordingly, our efforts resulted in:

- 12 visitations to existing companies to understand both their unique and specific business challenges as well as to identify other ways to encourage business expansion within Prince William County;
- consultation to businesses in 64 instances; and
- 142 resolutions to queries from businesses within the County.

New Business Attraction and Market Outreach

The Department continued its accelerated marketing outreach during the first quarter of 2014, engaging in several regional and national industry events and increasing Prince William County's visibility on a regional and national level. Some examples of those events are:

- 2014 Public-Private Partnership Conference, Dallas, TX one of the largest gatherings of
 economic development and industry practitioners. The Department participated in one of the
 Deal Day sessions where municipalities presented information about potential development
 projects and procurement opportunities to the country's top developers, investors and A/E/C
 (architecture, engineering and construction) professionals. The event was a unique opportunity
 to showcase the County to industry executives seeking new relationships with local
 governments.
- 2014 Site Selectors Guild Conference, Denver, CO a highly sought after gathering of over 30 of the world's most respected, influential corporate location advisors, which provided a valuable relationship-building opportunity. Also in attendance were 200 local, regional and state economic developers.
- MODEX 2014 and Georgia Logistics Summit, Atlanta, GA both events brought together over 20,000 professionals from the logistics and supply chain sectors and offered numerous points of contact with industry professionals. The Department held one-on-one meetings with a dozen consultants and company representatives and established contact with several others.
- Science Without Borders, Baltimore, MD the Department attended the event hosted by Johns
 Hopkins University, which provided a unique opportunity to network and learn more about a
 featured country's (Israel's) biotech and life science sectors as well as possible ways to partner
 and collaborate with that country.
- Northern Virginia Community College (NVCC) Workforce Development Forum, Annandale, VA

 the Department participated in a panel discussion on workforce development hosted by NVCC.

 The panel concurred that Northern Virginia's economic future remains bright but that the region's leaders must do more to increase the workforce's size and technological skills.

- NAIOP Northern Virginia Economic Update, Tysons Corner, VA the Department participated
 in a panel discussion at the forum hosted by the National Association of Industrial and Office
 Properties (NAIOP). The panel was comprised of economic development directors from other
 localities in Northern Virginia and discussion focused on current trends and challenges facing the
 region as well as their implications for economic development.
- 8th Annual Small Business and Government Conference, Fort Belvoir, VA the Department took
 part in a panel discussion led by local government and county agencies. The event was a
 valuable opportunity to conduct outreach to small businesses particularly within the federal
 contracting community.

Electronic Marketing Program

In order to support both existing business and new business outreach efforts, the Department continued the execution of its electronic marketing program. During the first quarter of 2014, the program experienced:

- an 18.6% increase in Twitter® followers;
- a 13.7% increase in email list; and
- a 17% increase in searches for property via our online real estate database; underscored by a
 - o 22% increase in searches for existing spaces; and
 - o 32% decrease in searches for land with build-to-suit opportunities.

Results

Overall:

For the first quarter of 2014, the Department's business development efforts resulted directly in:

- 5 projects completed;
- \$75.0 million in new capital investment; and
- 60 new jobs logged.

Of the 5 projects completed:

- 4 were in targeted industries; while
- 3 were new business to the County and 2 were expansions.

Other Key Initiatives

The following are some of the key initiatives being pursued by the Department as we continuously strive to improve our efforts at attracting new opportunities, encouraging expansion of existing businesses and increasing the visibility of Prince William County.

- Potomac Communities Initiative the Potomac Communities brochure has been completed. The 32-page brochure was the result of a great collaboration between the Planning Office, Economic Development as well as the generous input of our allies within the County. This publication provides a unique consolidated overview of the strategic assets and development opportunities which exist within the Potomac Communities in eastern Prince William County. It will also serve as a template for future publications aimed at showcasing other geographic areas and assets of the County. The brochure has been widely disseminated locally and nationally and has received very positive feedback. Thus far, over 1400 copies have been distributed.
- Updated List of Targeted Industries In February 2014, the Prince William Board of County Supervisors agreed to update and expand the County's list of industries that are targeted for economic development opportunities. The decision was based on recommendations proposed in the Economic Competitiveness Analysis and Target Industry Study completed in 2013. The decision also marked an important expansion of our Department's marketing and investment attraction strategy that will determine the scope and focus of the Department's efforts going forward. We have already responded to our revised mandate by adjusting our marketing and outreach strategy to include industry events consistent with our revised targets.
- Simulation and Game Institute Ribbon Cutting Ceremony the ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the opening of the Simulation and Game Institute (SGI) was held on March 27, 2014. Over 100 dignitaries and specially invited guests turned out to help celebrate the occasion. Chairman of the Prince William County Board of Supervisors, Corey A. Stewart and County Supervisor W.S. Wally Covington, III, both delivered remarks. Other dignitaries in attendance included County Supervisor, Maureen S. Caddigan, Hon. Karen Jackson, Secretary of Technology, Commonwealth of Virginia, Ángel Cabrera, President, George Mason University (GMU), Dr. Annie Hunt-Burriss, CEO, Prince William Campus, GMU and Dr. Scott M. Martin, Founding Director, Computer Game Design Program, SGI, GMU. The event generated extensive positive earned media coverage for the County and helped brand Prince William County as a strong player in science and technology. To date it is estimated that media coverage gained from the event is equivalent to approximately \$6,500 in "ad value".
- Prince William County Science Accelerator work on the build-out of the Science Accelerator
 continued during the first quarter of 2014 with completion anticipated in mid-May 2014. We
 anticipate holding a ribbon cutting ceremony on Wednesday June 11, 2014. Located in
 Innovation Park, adjacent to George Mason University's Prince William Campus, this facility will

be the only public-private commercially available property featuring wet laboratory spaces in the Northern Virginia region for the life sciences industry. The Accelerator will offer up to nine modern wet labs, with shared conference rooms, new equipment and a secure entry lobby and was established to bring critically needed wet lab space to market to attract growing life science companies. In April 2014, the County signed a license agreement with its first tenant – ISOTHrive LLC – a startup life sciences company, for the sub-lease of 603 square feet of space.
