




# **Number of Positive Tests vs. Tests Conducted - Cumulative**



Number of Testing Encounters, Number of Positive Testing Encounters, and Percent Positivity\*\* by Lab Report Date - Prince William, PCR Only






# Prince William Health District Percent Positivity by Zip Code








## Number of Hospitalizations in NOVA



Number of Patients Hospitalized with a Positive or Pending COVID-19 Test - Northern Region




### **Number of Deaths in NOVA**

## **Transmission Extent for NOVA**




### Transmission Extent by Region, Northern

## **Executive Order Updates – Effective 11/15**

### Executive Order 63

 Adjusts the mask mandate for indoor public spaces to all individuals over the age of 5 years old (was 10 years old).

### Executive Order 67

- Limits all public and private in-person gatherings to 25 individuals (was 250 individuals).
- All restaurants, dining establishments, food courts, breweries, microbreweries, distilleries, wineries, and tasting rooms:
  - Are prohibited from the on-site sale, consumption, and possession of alcohol after 10:00 PM
  - Must close by Midnight
- Strengthens enforcement of social distancing, mask-wearing, and enhanced cleaning requirements for essential retail businesses.

## **EOC Taskforce Updates**

- Several taskforces have sunset or transitioned their Emergency Activities:
  - Disinfecting Taskforce
    - Transitioned to Facilities and Fleet and department-level users.
  - Election Taskforce
    - Completed; election certified.
  - Reconstitution Taskforce
    - Transitioned to PWC Forward Initiatives Longterm transition of workforce to partial virtual, or as appropriate.

## **EOC Taskforce Updates**

- Community Testing Taskforce
  - Administered more than 12,150 free tests since July 13.
  - Currently seeing higher demand at test sites
- Community Feeding Taskforce
  - Surpassed 8 million pounds of food redirected into the community and 10,000 unique donation pick ups
  - Supporting multiple Thanksgiving-related food distributions
- Human Service Alliance Disaster Fund
  - Increased demand; allocated total of \$3 million; Final report coming later this week
- Rent, Mortgage, and Utility Relief Program
  - 529 applications in progress; 217 applications funded for over \$2.2 million

## **EOC Taskforce Updates**

- Homeless Services Taskforce
  - Continue to identify locations for long-term homeless services to support social distancing requirements
- School Reopening Joint Coordination Taskforce
  - Schools started hybrid schedule last week
  - Continue to coordinate any unmet needs
- Judicial Center Taskforce
  - Jury Trials resumed October 26<sup>th</sup>
  - Continuing to coordinate any unmet needs
- Cost Recovery Taskforce
  - Continuing to implement CARES Act allocations and FEMA Public Assistance eligibility based on County and Community needs.
  - Detailed presentation will follow this update.

## **Economic Recovery Program Updates**

- Small Business Micro-Grants
  - 532 grants disbursed with over \$4 million awarded
- Small Business Technical Assistance Program (SBTAP)
  - Since beginning of November, almost 70 eligible businesses
- Capital Investment Grant
  - Received 246 applications; \$4.7 million awarded
- Construction and Permit Rebates
  - Received 18 applications; \$6,400 approved in permit rebate grants
- Elevate Workforce: Building Business and Careers
  - Since mid-August, 150 PWC resident jobseekers enrolled; 119 approved for job training.
- Ambassador Program
  - Halfway through the program, over 42 volunteers have done outreach to 340 PWC businesses.
- Be Safe, Work Safe Program
  - Contract awarded; Completing a comprehensive set of tools for the business community and their employees to share, educate, and build new skills to combat COVID at work.

## **COVID-19 Vaccination Planning**

- Participating in focused pre-planning for COVID-19 Vaccination with Prince William Health District, Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park Emergency Management
- Current VDH Planning Assumptions:
  - Phase 1: Limited Doses Available
    - Highly targeted campaign focused on immunization of healthcare, public safety, and persons with highest risk of severe illness
    - Vaccine events will be at closed events targeting specific groups
  - Phase 2: Large Number of Doses Available
    - Transition from vaccinating critical populations to vaccinate general public; Large, open community events
    - Public Health-focused events on underserved and hard to reach populations
  - Phase 3: Continued Vaccination, Shift to Routine Strategy
    - A surplus of vaccine is expected
    - Vaccine will continue to be available in the private sector, much like the flu shot.


## **Coronavirus Relief Funds**



- Congress passed, and the President signed into law on March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security of 2020 (CARES Act), which provides funding to address the COVID-19 pandemic
- CARES Act provided \$150 billion in Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) to States; Virginia received approximately \$3.1 billion
- The State allocated \$82.1 million of CRF funds to the County, including the Towns of Dumfries, Haymarket, Occoquan and Quantico
  - 1st allocation (May 2020) \$41,034,915
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> allocation (July 2020) \$41,034,915

# Important Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) Stipulations

- Payments from CRF may only be used to cover costs that
  - (1) are "necessary" expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19;
  - (2) were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 for the state or government; and
  - (3) were incurred during the period that begins March 1, 2020 and ends December 30, 2020



- Medical expenses
- Public health expenses
- Payroll expenses for public safety, public health, health care, human services, and similar employees whose services <u>are substantially dedicated</u> to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency
- Expenses to facilitate compliance with COVID-19 related public health measures
- Expenses associated with the provision of economic support in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency
- Other COVID-19 related expenses reasonably necessary to the function of government that satisfy the fund's eligibility criteria




### County costs
