SERIOUS FIRE IS CHECKED

Judge Smith Acts to Speed Project Long Delayed

On Monday of this week Hon. Howard W. Smith, Congressman from the Eighth District, announced that he has started the necessary routine which will culminate in the letting of bids by the Treasury Department for the construction of the new Manassas Post Office.

Visiting the Treasury Department within ten days after taking office, Congressman Smith expedited the project initiated more than twelve years ago and secured assurances both from the Treasury Department and the Post Office Department that bids would be called for with a period of three to five months for the construction of a handsome new federal building at Manassas. "The building program of the government covers a five-year period," Judge Smith stated, "but I was told that the work would start very shortly."

The government already owns a lot purchased for this purpose when Hon. C. C. Carlin represented the Eighth District in Congress.

GREATLY REDUCED WEEK END FARES ANNOUNCED BY THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY SYSTEM

Reduction in Week End Excursion Fares will be inaugurated by the Southern Railway beginning March 27, and continuing until October 25.

The new Week End will apply to any point south of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers and east of the Mississippi River. The tickets will be sold for all trains on Friday and Saturday and Sunday forenoon trains, limited to return to reach original starting point prior to midnight of Tuesday following date of sale. The fares will be on basis of one fare plus one-fifth fare for the round-trip. This will make a rate of approximately 20 per mile and it is expected this marked reduction will be very popular and used extensively.

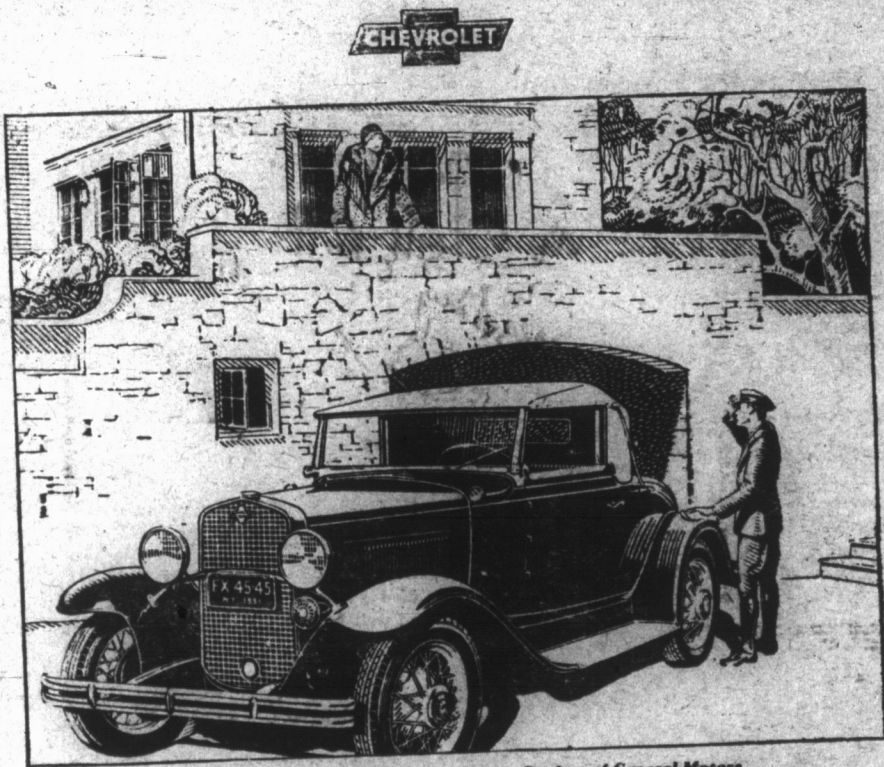

FOOD PRICES LOWER THAN YEAR AGO

February A & P Sales Indicates
Lower Retail Prices

February sales of The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company were \$82,384,806. This compares with \$86,121,818 for the corresponding period of 1930, and is a decrease of \$3,737,012, or 4.34 per cent.

The Company points out that the decline in dollar sales reflects lower retail food prices, the volume of goods sold in February, 1931, measured in tons, was 10.72 per cent greater than it was in the same month a year ago. And the average weekly tonnage for February of this year was the highest in the history of the Company, the previous high figure being in December, 1930, and the next highest in January, 1931.

Sales of the Company estimated in tons were 443,516 this February, compared with 400,586 in February, 1930 and increase of 42,930. Estimated average weekly tonnage was 110,879, compared with 100,417 a year ago, an increase of 10,732.

Average weekly dollar sales in February, 1931, were \$20,562,020, compared with \$21,530,454, a decrease of \$968,432.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION ADVISES JOB SEEKERS NOT TO COME TO WASHINGTON

In a statement issued today, the United States Civil Service Commission advised the public not to come to Washington for the purpose of seeking Federal employment.

The Commission explained that the District of Columbia Committee on Employment has called its attention to a number of pathetic cases where persons have come from considerable distances expecting to obtain a Government position on the strength of having passed a civil service examination only to become stranded and in some instances a public charge.

It was pointed out that even if a person has passed a civil service examination with a high rating he has no assurance that a position will be immediately available to him. Appointments to Federal positions, the Commission said, are made only as the actual needs of the service require, and in accordance with the civil service rules, and the presence of an applicant in Washington can not in any way improve or expedite any prospects of employment he may have.

The Commission stated in conclusion that no one should come to Washington expecting to receive a Federal position except in response to a definite offer of employment from a Government establishment.

FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA ORATORICAL CONTEST

The Future Farmers of America Oratorical Contest will be held at the same time as the Athletic Literary Contest. The two Agriculture Departments in the County are expected to compete. The school elimination contest are to be held April 2 at both departments. Sidney McLoean and Earnest Hale, Jr., are to represent the Nokesville Department on the subject of "The Machine Age and Its Effects on American Agriculture."

Arthur Carter and John Pattie are to represent Manassas Department on the subject of "What the F. F. A. May Mean to Agriculture."

The winners in each elimination contests will meet at Nokesville to determine final contest.

Each production by a contestant will be limited to 10 minutes in length and shall be allowed 5 minutes of additional time to defend his production on questions which shall be asked by the judges.

The winner will be selected according to the following:

The National Board of Trustees of the F. F. A. in cooperation with the National Committee responsible for

vocational agriculture contests will be in charge of this contest.

Three competent and impartial persons, one of whom shall be designated to act as chairman, will be selected to judge the contest.

Prior to the contest, the judges shall be furnished with typewritten copies of the contestants' productions which they will grade and record on the score sheets which will be provided.

At the time of the contest, the judges will seat themselves apart from one another in different sections of the room in which the contest is held and will score each contestant upon the delivery of his production, using the score sheet provided. 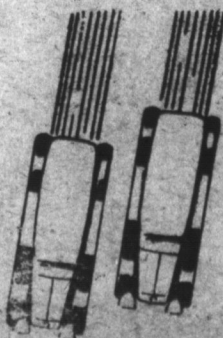

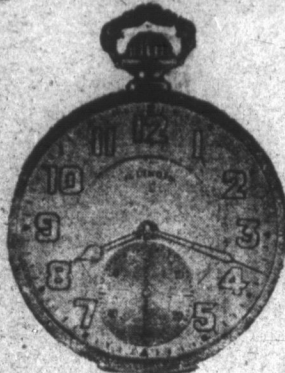
