Admitting that the cost of state operation for the year ending Feb-ruary 28, 1929 was \$2,281,479 more

In an official contest his average yield on a 3-scre field was 180.52 bushels of shelled corn an acre. In making this exceptional record, Thrash made liberal use of fertilizers. He side-dressed twice with Chilean nitrate of soda during the season, using 200 pounds an acre at each using 200 pounds an acre at each application

A striking illustration in eco-nomic crop production was fur-nished by another southern grownished by another southern grow-er, Paul Simmons, 18-year-old boy of Piant City, Fia., who won the 4-H Club corn contest of that state. 
