VOCATIONAL RALLY  
AT BLACKSBURG

Approximately three thousand boys will participate in the State Rally of Agricultural boys at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute at Blacksburg, June 17 to 19 inclusive. Teams will compete from Manassas and from the Brentsville District Agricultural High School. The Prince William contestants will compete in dairying, corn, wheat and poultry events. A cup will be awarded the winners who will also enjoy a free trip to Kansas City to attend the Kansas City Royal Fair.

The Future Farmers of America will also meet at Blacksburg on the same dates and will elect officers. They will be addressed by Dr. C. H. Lane, Director of the Federal Board of Vocational Education.

We had quite a reviving rain after such a long dry spell. The farmers feel much encouraged.

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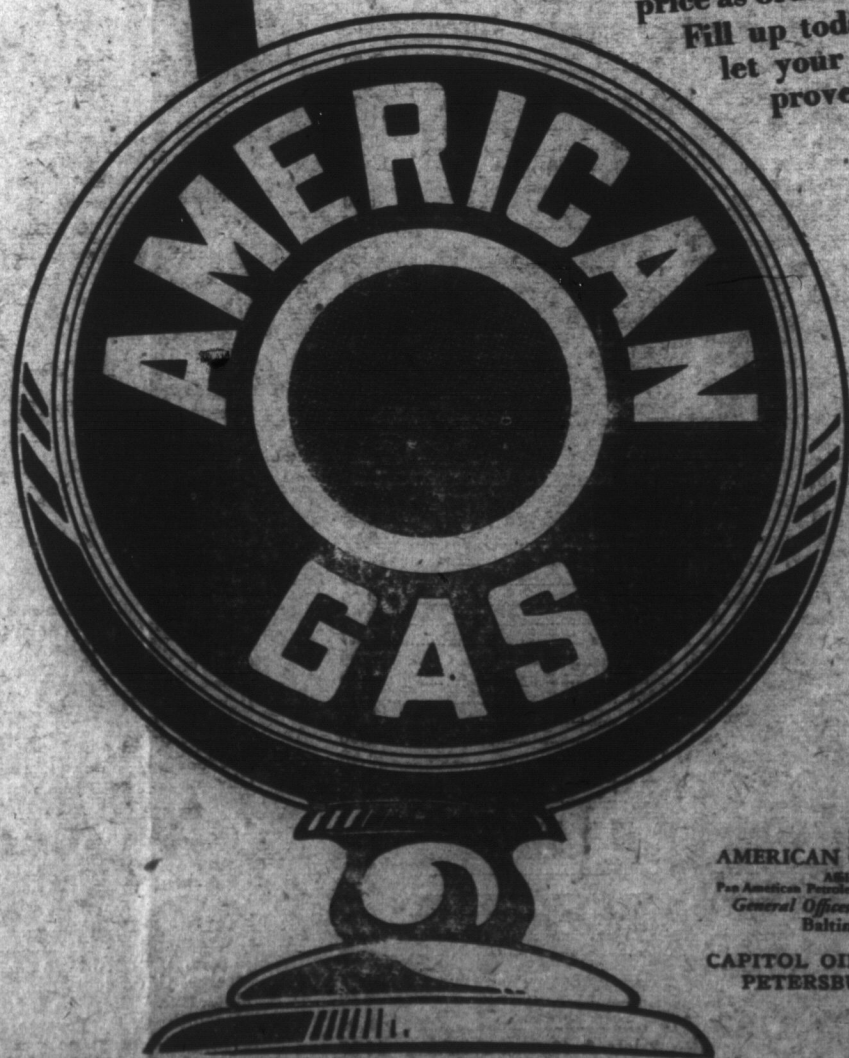

## Telephones Increase; Complaints Decrease

Increasing the number of telephones and at the same time decreasing the number of troubles on telephones and making other improvements in the service were among the accomplishments of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Companies last year.

Telephones operated by these companies in Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia have been increased more than 32,000 in the past year, and there are now about 629,800 in service.

Last year a subscriber's line or telephone equipment was in trouble on an average of only once in 23.7 months as compared to 21.3 months previously reported.

Reports show that telephone calls made in the territory of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Companies last year which failed of completion on the first attempt, due largely to busy reports and don't answers, were reduced by 2.8 per cent over the previous year. This resulted in greater satisfaction to telephone users on about 4,750,000 calls. Also, during the past year the average length of time for handling out-of-town calls was materially reduced and voice transmission on such calls was materially improved.

Dear Sir: I was much impressed with the article published in your issue of the 15th inst., relative to the policy of Mr. Harrahan, City Manager of Portsmouth, Virginia, in keeping the taxpayers of that city informed as the collection and disbursement of the municipal revenues and the results obtained from the expenditure of the same.

**Noted Planter Tells How He Side-Dresses Cotton**

Every acre of cotton from East Texas to the Carolinas which did not receive 200 to 400 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer at planting will make a larger yield if it is side-dressed during the early growing season, says B. L. Moss, well-known farmer and agricultural writer of Soso, Miss.

On his own farm, where as many as 750 acres are planted in cotton, Moss side-dresses with 200 pounds of Chilean nitrate of soda, in addition to using about 100 pounds at planting time.

"The safest rule to follow in side-dressing," declares Mr. Moss, "is to make the application any time after the cotton is chopped out and put in a clean state of cultivation, but not later than the time the first blooms appear."

He scatters the material in a shallow furrow alongside the cotton row, on one side only, and lightly covers it by running a broad-sweep or heel-sweep once to each middle. The application is made by hand, and the nitrate dropped from 2 to 6 inches away from the plants. Following this system one man can side-dress about 8 acres a day.

**Telephone Research Department Expands****New Building Under Construction Will Provide Increased Laboratory Facilities**

The Bell Telephone Laboratories, where research and development is carried on for the Bell System Companies, is undoubtedly one of the best equipped institutions of its kind in the world. In this building, located at 463 West Street, New York City one will find more than 5,400 scientists, engineers and assistants engaged in problems designed to produce new and improved equipment for telephony and telegraphy.

They have special ventilating systems to admit fresh air without allowing noise to enter. There are now thirteen such rooms, which vary in size from booths in which one or two persons can work to larger rooms thirty by thirty feet square.

These sound-proof rooms are used in tests on various kinds of telephone transmitters and receivers and in studies of speech and hearing.

## Dixie's Corn Yields Rival Nation's Best

The Corn Belt, long famed for its economical corn production, is in danger of losing some of its laurels.

For instance, a Dixie farmer, W. Y. Thrash, of Walnut Grove, Miss., might well contest the honor of producing the highest yield of corn during 1929. In an official contest his average yield on a 3-acre field was 180.52 bushels of shelled corn an acre. In making this exceptional record, Thrash made liberal use of fertilizers. He side-dressed twice with Chilean nitrate of soda during the season, using 200 pounds an acre at each application.

A striking illustration in economic crop production was furnished by another southern grower, Paul Simmons, 18-year-old boy of Plant City, Fla., who won the 4-H Club corn contest of that state. He produced corn at a net cost of 18 cents a bushel. His yield on a one-acre plot was 111 bushels. The only fertilizer young Simmons used was 200 pounds of Chilean nitrate, which was applied as a side-dressing when the corn was knee-high.

## Introduction to United States in 1830 Marked First Use of Commercial Fertilizer.

THE first hundred years in the use of commercial fertilizers can now be recorded in the agricultural history of the United States.

The practice of using commercial nitrogen as a fertilizer was started in 1830 when the first shipment of nitrate of soda was brought to this country. Up to that time only lime and marl of the inorganic substances now commonly used for agricultural purposes were known to the early farmers. Used continuously since that time, nitrate of soda, or Chilean nitrate, as farmers commonly call it, is now recognized as the oldest of the present-day commercial fertilizers.

Although nitrate of soda has become a commonplace article on farms throughout the country, it is not generally known that one of the romances of modern civilization is woven around this fertilizer. It is a product of a barren desert, high in the Andes mountains of northern Chile. There is no rain or vegetation in the entire nitrate zone, which occupies a region nearly as large as the combined area of New York and Pennsylvania. Not a blade of grass springs from the soil, beneath which is one of the most important fertilizing compounds known to Nature.

The nitrate ore is found at various depths below the surface, the average being about three feet. It varies in richness from 5 to 70 per cent sodium nitrate. Open-cut mining is practiced

in removing the ore, after which it is transported to a refining plant erected near by on the desert. The refining of the ore is an extremely technical process. The objective of the operations, however, is to remove the impurities from the ore and to concentrate the sodium nitrate so that when ready for shipment the fertilizer contains 96 to 99 per cent sodium nitrate and analyzes 15.5 per cent nitrogen. Iodine, which is also present in the ore, is a by-product of the refining process. Small quantities of this element are found in the fertilizer, as are also traces of boron and magnesium.

Conservative estimates by geologists and engineers in Chile indicate that the deposits are of sufficient size to supply the needs of the world for generations to come.

## Red Letter Events Found in American Agriculture

1830—Nitrate of soda introduced into United States. In point of service, nitrate from Chile is exceeded only by lime and marl of the inorganic substances now used for farm purposes.

1842—Laves in England took out patent for making superphosphate. Since that time phosphate deposits have been discovered in our southern states and in Africa.

1860—Potash from German mines first utilized for farm purposes.

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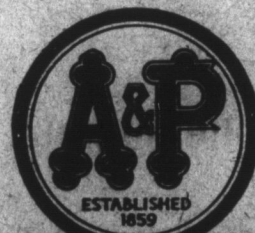
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
