MANASSAS HIGH SCHOOL CLOSES

Closing events at Manassas High last week were very well attended and received. The regular class night exercises were held Thursday evening. Messrs. Dodson and Robert Athey having just returned on May 29, 1940, the class was holding its deferred exercises. This was explained by Miss Nadine O'Bannon.

Claron Kline gave the salutatory. Miss Raney played a violin solo and Miss Compton gave a vocal solo.

The Class Will which elicited much mirth was read by Miss Lora Bell. Clopton Athey distributed the gifts which brought out both applause and laughter. Helen Evans recited the class history.

Last, but far from least, Bobby Waters gave the valedictory. The class then joined in a song arranged by Miss Eloise Compton. And it was all over but the shouting.

The next evening the seniors made their appearance for the last time as students of the Manassas High School.

The salutatory on this occasion was given by Mr. Beverly Weir-Mitchell following the class song and the invocation by Rev. T. D. Clark and songs by the Girls' Glee Club.

Miss Hilda Moser read Governor Pollard's greeting to the graduates. More songs from the Girls' Glee Club followed.

Miss Ethel Ritenour spoke on "Our World of Today." Miss Eloise Compton read her prize winning English paper.

After Bobby Waters had recited his Valedictory and the Boys' Chorus had sung, came the address of the evening from Hon. C. J. Hyalup, Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education, State Board of Education. Mr. Hyalup offered the boys and girls some very sound advice.

The seventh grade certificates were presented by Dr. G. R. C. Johnson. Mrs. Annie Humphreys of the American Red Cross, at Washington, awarded home economic and nursing certificates.

Announcement of prizes was made by Dr. Johnson.

Then came the big moment, and Professor Haydon gave each student the trophy for which he had been working for four long years. Each was greeted in turn with vigorous applause.

Rev. J. R. Cooke closed the ceremonies with the benediction.

M. H. S. NET TOURNAMENT ENDS.

The first annual tennis tournament of Manassas High School ended on May 30th when waters brushed aside opposition and took the Boy's singles crown.

In the semi-finals on May 29th, Hopkins, who had startled tennisdom at the high school by defeating Miller and Wetherall, bowed in a hard match to Mitchell. Hopkins jumped into an early lead, gaining a 5-2 advantage at the start. Mitchell, at set point three times checked the speeding Hopkins with sparkling shots and rallied, winning five straight games and the set. The second set was very different and the tourney dark horse wilted gradually as Mitchell marched to the finish with clean tennis. The score was 7-5, 6-1.

The finals was a different story. Waters, exhibiting a beautiful game of balance shots, routed Mitchell in straight sets 6-1, 6-2. Game after game went to Waters and Mitchell, who seemed a little off, failed to rally as Waters calmly progressed to the title. For one fleeting instant it looked as if the loser might rally as he had against Hopkins but he dropped back as Waters ran out the remaining games and the match.

Waters also finished second in service aces gathering two from Mitchell thus breaking a tie with Beachley. Mitchell topped the list with 21, leading the field by eight blows. The runner-up was the only one to make 20 or more aces.

The two young Manassas net stars are going to C. M. T. C. this summer where they will carry the local hopes into competition further. The title-holders are pairing up for the doubles also.

The first five in aces are: Mitchell, 21; Waters, 13; D. Beachley, 11; L. Beachley, 10; Athey, 9.

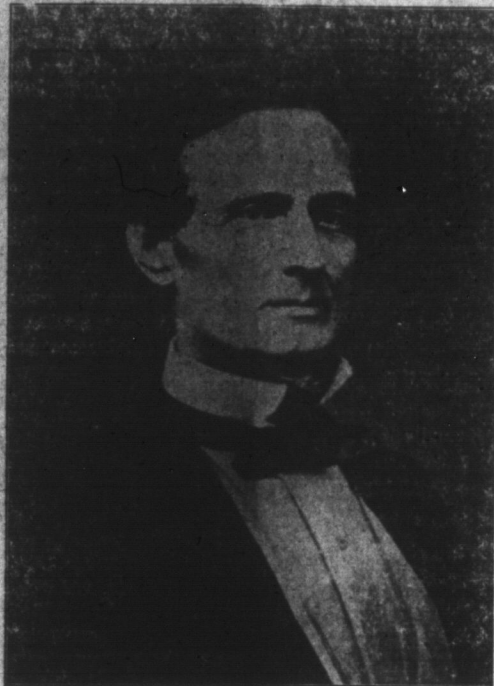
A large number of 5-Point Certificates were next presented by Miss Love.

Aden Cross Road Section Will Be Benefitted by Increased Service.

The county school board held its regular meeting Wednesday with all members in attendance.

It was decided to pay off two of the thousand dollar bonds of Manassas District on July 1st.

The school terms at Smithfield and Fayman were reduced to eight months for the next term due to the small enrollment at these schools.

Bids for wood are to be received at the July meeting of the Board (July 2nd).

The Board decided to purchase new equipment to establish a bus route to take care of the children in the Aden Cross Roads section. As long as the condition of the roads permit the bus will go to Grim's Corner, otherwise it will stop at Kettle Run. This will relieve the Brentsville bus from having to double back to Valley Church.

Mrs. May Smith, representing the Garden Club, presented final plans for landscaping the groups of the local schools. These plans have had the approval of the leagues and faculties of the two schools and by the Garden Club. The Board unanimously accepted these plans and extended its thanks to the Club.

Mrs. W. L. Sanders, representing the music section of the Garden Club, appeared and made further recommendations with reference to music instruction in the local schools next year. The Board incorporated these with other recommendations previously made as a guide in establishing this new department.

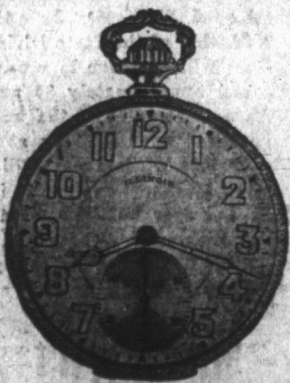

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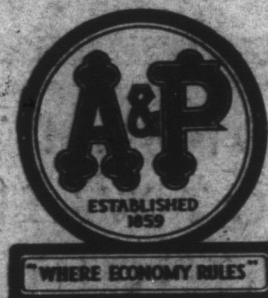
