PROPER CARE AND FEEDING OF DRY COWS AND FRESH COWS

Good Dairy cows with yearly re cords of 300 lbs of butter fat and over should have a dry or rest period weeks, if cow is thin or in poor ndition, feed from 4 to 8 lbs of a fitting grain ration daily according to her condition, so that she will be built up in good flesh for her next milking period. A thin, out of condition cow at calving time can never do her best, make the most butterfat for amount of feed used.

About a week before freshing, use very little or no corn silage, substitute hte grain mixture with 6 to 8 lbs of wheat bran or ground oats and wheat bran 50-50 and all the good legume hay she cares to eat. For several hours just before calving feed very little hay or silage. A warm bran mash would be beneficial.

If heavy feeding of corn silage and heavy grain mixtures are fed before and right after calving. It is one of the causes of cake udders and milk fever. It should be from two three days before cows are put on full grain rations after calving.


