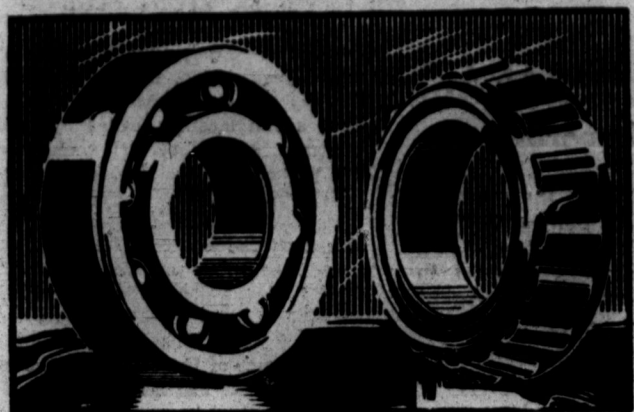

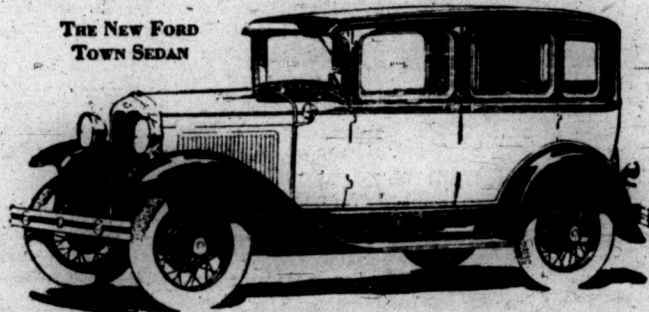

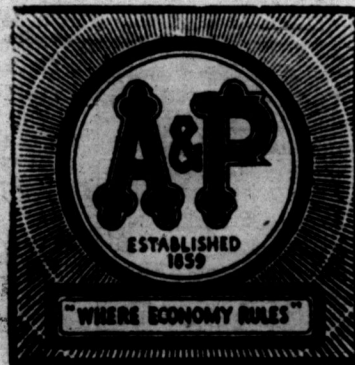

## CLOVER AND CATCH CROP MEETINGS SCHEDULED FOR COUNTY

Red clover, or a mixture of clovers is the keystone of a permanent system of agriculture and no other crop can take its place.

A crop rotation including legumes is absolutely necessary in order to maintain soil fertility and insure legume feed for livestock. Red clover, including sapling variety, fits into our cropping system better than any other legume because it does not require extra cultivation to get a good stand as is the case with soybeans and cowpeas. It is usually superior to alfalfa in a rotation, because alfalfa once seeded should be allowed to stand for a period of years. In addition to this, alfalfa can not be successfully grown on many of our soils. While red clover requires lime, it will make a successful crop on soils where the supply of lime is not sufficient to grow sweet clover or alfalfa successfully.

This does not mean, however, that the annual legumes or sweet clover should not be made use of in the present emergency. Immediate Shipment on State Lime Orders received by G. W. Kolner, State Commissioner of Agriculture can now be shipped as soon as transmitted to Staunton plant. The present freight rate to Manassas is \$1.40 per ton, applying on lime in bags or bulk. Prices at plant for the lime are the same as last year. It is advised by Mr. Kolner that orders be placed at once for any special date of delivery preferred.

Seaboard Public Service Company of Alexandria, Virginia December Output

Subsidiaries of the Seaboard Public Service Company, operating in seven states along the Southeastern coast line, showed an increase of 14.3 per cent in kilowatt hour output for the month of December, and an 11.7 per cent increase for the first twelve months of the year.

The total output for December, 1930, was 32,254,096 kilowatt hours as against 28,212,682 in December a year ago, a gain of 4,041,414 kilowatt hours, or 14.3 per cent. chanced during December, as against 2,322,931 for the same month in 1929 a decrease of 1,190,694 kilowatt hours or 51.3 per cent.

Energy generated in the first twelve months of the year in the company's plants aggregated 334,845,858 kilowatt hours as against 297,328,998 for the same period during 1929, an increase of 37,516,856 kilowatt hours, or 12.6 per cent.

Energy purchased from outside sources during the twelve month period totaled 24,473,314 kilowatt hours, as against 24,169,773 for the same period of 1929, or an increase of 303,541 kilowatt hours, or 1.25 per cent.

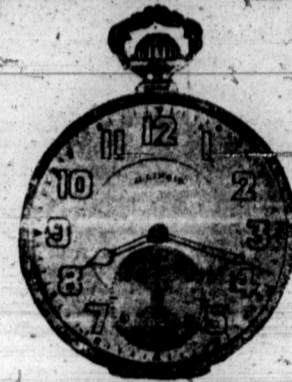
