The amount loaned will be based on the requirements of the applicant for seed, fertilizer, feed for workstock, fuel and oil for tractors, and the acreage of crops on which he gives a crop lien to secure the payment of the loan made to him. Notes given will be due November 30, 1931 with interest at the rate of 5 per cent.




