

Dressing Corn Pays Under

Certain Conditions Side dressing corn with a quickly available nitrogenous material pays a good dividend during a normal season, provided the soil needs nitrogen, and provided further that there is a sufficient amount of phosphorus and potash in the soil for the crop to take advantage of the added nitrogen. In other words any one of the essential plant food elements (nitrogen, phoshorus and potash) may be the limit-

ing factor in crop yields. During the past three years sixtyive demonstrations on thin soils which received an application of phosphorus and potash at planting time, and the equivalent of 125 pounds of nitrate of soda when the corn was knee-high has given an average increased yield of 12 bushels of corn per acre over the check which re-






