

BERRY CLASSED AS PARTY BOLTER

Majority of Democratic Committee Expected to Resign.

The political situation in Stafford is still very much upset, and feeling is running high. N. N. Berry, former chairman of the Stafford Democratic Committee, and a candidate against Dan M. Chichester for Treasurer of the County has bolted his party, and announced that he will not be a candidate for the Democratic nomination but that he will run as an independent in the November election. This assures for Stafford voters a three-cornered contest for the treasurership and a very exciting time this fall. Berry's withdrawal from the primary leaves Chichester unopposed for the Democratic nomination, and the Republicans have nominated W. H. Simpson, former Commissioner of Revenue.

Will Split Democratic Vote.

James Ashby, Clerk of the Court, and W. D. Reamy, present Treasurer, who head the faction opposing Chichester, are alleged to have brought Berry out for the purpose of defeating him, and it is thought that it was upon their advice that Berry has bolted the party and is running as an independent. The belief has been expressed that Berry has not developed the strength that his backers expected and that their only hope of defeating Chichester now is to split the Democratic vote and thus enable the Republicans to elect Simpson.

Voters Left Off List.

Chichester's friends charge the political trickery and unfair methods in their efforts to bring about his defeat. They allege that nearly a hundred voters favorable to Chichester have been intentionally left off of the qualified list. It is said that they will petition the Circuit Court when it convenes on Monday, July 13, at Stafford, to order Treasurer Reamy to add these names to his list. Tax receipts showing that these voters have duly qualified will be presented to the Court.

In Embarrassing Position.

The seven members of the Democratic Committee opposing Dan M. Chichester have gotten themselves into a very embarrassing position by their own actions. Early in the campaign they unanimously adopted a resolution pledging their "active support to the Democratic nominee regardless of who he may be." Their candidate's withdrawal from the primary and announcement that he will run as an independent makes Chichester the Democratic nominee without opposition, and under this resolution they are honor bound to support him. It is generally believed, however, that they will resign from the committee and support the independent candidate.

JOHN MCGILL, MANAGER OF MARYLAND AND VIRGINIA MILK PRODUCERS ASSOCIATION, CHIEF SPEAKER AT BRENTSVILLE DIST. COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION MEETING.

Approximately 200 people were present at the July meeting of the Brentsville District Community Association at Nokesville, Tuesday evening, to hear John McGill, Manager of the Maryland and Virginia Milk Producers Association, discuss the Washington market. Mr. McGill stated that the producers were being paid basic price for the product used as fluid milk and that the surplus price was being paid only for that part of the product that went into butter, cheese and other products that had to be marketed in competition with that produced outside of the Washington milk shed not subject to the Washington Board of Health requirements. Producers were asked to maintain their usual fall averages so that it would not be necessary to go farther out in the territory to meet the fall demand of the market thus building up more competition for present shippers during the months of high production. The usual reports of the various working committees of the association were made. Instrumental music was furnished by the Greenwich boys.

Following this program, short talks were made by Messrs. Jesse, Rust, Boatwright and Herring, candidates for the upper and lower houses of the state legislature, who stated their view from the agricultural standpoint.

The program was arranged by the Agricultural Committee of the Brentsville District Community Association of which M. J. Shepherd is chairman.

PRINCE WILLIAM BICENTENNIAL

Initial Celebration Will Be Held at Woodbridge.

An enthusiastic group of Prince William citizens gathered at Rippon Lodge Monday afternoon to further plans for the Prince William Bicentennial and the national bicentennial.

After an extended discussion a committee composed of Mrs. Annie Cline, Messrs. Davies, Dawson, Lamb and Wharton was appointed by Chairman Ellis, with authority, to increase its own membership, to make definite plans for the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the establishment of the first county court house near Woodbridge.

A date of September 25 has tentatively been selected, and it is expected that a school holiday will be declared on that day.

Representing the committee, Mr. Dawson has already reported back that Mr. and Mrs. Egbert Thompson, who own the property on which the court house was built, will co-operate to the fullest extent with the central committee.

The matter of the form of the celebration and other details will be discussed at a committee meeting to be held at Mrs. Cline's home near Dumfries preceding the community league meeting on Monday night.

Hon. John M. Gibbs will be present Monday night to tell the citizens something of the plans and workings of the national commission.

Mrs. Cline has been made chairman of a special sub-committee of the central committee to secure the fullest possible attendance on Monday night.

The direct purpose of this meeting will be to ascertain to what extent the citizens of the Dumfries area desire to memorialize one of the most ancient spots in the United States.

At the conclusion of the meeting on Monday, Mr. Ellis stated that he would be in Europe for two months, acting as associate counsel for the overseas exposition in Paris to assist Hon. Bascom Slemp, and appointed Mr. Wharton as vice chairman of the central committee to act in his stead.

FAIRFAX DEPUTY

DIES OF WOUND
E. R. Holbrook is Mourned by Many Friends.

E. R. Holbrook, for many years deputy clerk of the Court of Fairfax County, died at his home in Fairfax late Sunday evening after a long and painful illness. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Martha Wiley, one son, Wilmer and three brothers, Linwood, of Washington and Harry and Stockton, of Fairfax.

Funeral services were held on Monday under auspices of Henry Lodge, A. F. & A. M. He had been connected with the county clerk's office for 42 years.

The circumstances surrounding his immediate death were particularly sad. His recovery was not expected and his suffering painful and constant. In a temporary delirium he managed to secure possession of a revolver and succeeded in firing a shot which ended his life a few hours later.

July 4, One Hundredth Anniversary of the Death of James Monroe

PIEDMONT DAIRY FESTIVAL ASS'N

NORTHERN VIRGINIA COUNTIES
WELL REPRESENTED

Organization Perfected and Directors and Officers Elected

At a meeting at the Manassas Town Hall Wednesday afternoon, which was attended by representatives from several of the Northern Virginia counties, as well as Prince William, plans were perfected for holding the Piedmont Dairy Festival and officers and directors for the Piedmont District at large were elected, for 1931, as follows:

A vice president for each of the counties participating will be elected at special meetings in each of the participating counties. John M. Kline was named vice president for Prince William County. It was decided to call the directors together at an early date at which time the work of holding the festival would be started in earnest. In the meantime F. R. Hynson, managing director, in cooperation with county agricultural agents, school superintendents, the dairy departments of V. P. I. and U. S. D. A. and interested local dairymen and business men will go forward with plans already set up. October 31 was set as a tentative date for holding the first festival.

The main purpose of the first festival will be to stimulate the use and consumption of dairy products. It is believed that attention will be attracted to the excellent cattle of the section and that a better market for surplus dairy stock will be developed as a result of holding a festival similar to that held at Winchester annually.

A parade featuring the food value of dairy products followed by a pageant, in which the schools of Prince William and nearby counties will participate, will be held. The history of dairying in Piedmont, Va., will also have a place. Military and school bands will be arranged for and in the evening the Dairy Festival Ball will be arranged for in honor of the Queen and Princesses selected. Every effort will be made to make the affair both educational and entertaining. Radio station W. J. S. V. will be made use of in putting the progress of the festival and its purposes before the public, at 12 o'clock of each Thursday.

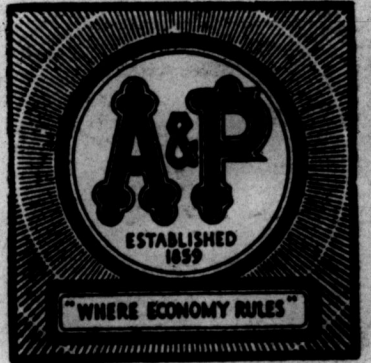

INTERNATIONAL MORATORIUM

The President of the United States has been successful in securing international agreement to postpone settlement on war debt obligations for a year. With certain reservations insisted upon by the French, the moratorium goes into effect as of July 1 with many assurances that Mr. Hoover's proposal will be beneficial and will ameliorate the word-wide slump now existing.

There are many obstacles to be overcome, both abroad and in this country. No foreign treaty or agreement can be entered into by the executive branch of our national government without ratification by the United States Senate. This distinguished body has always been very zealous in the preservation of its prerogatives, and has on other occasions caused much embarrassment to the Chief Executive. Whether the Senate will cooperate with Mr. Hoover remains to be seen, but any proposition coming before the upper branch of Congress this winter will have a precarious experience.

If this is a proposition made by the President of the United States for humanitarian purposes, and receives the support of all the people, much good ought to flow. If, however, partisan politicians begin to use it for campaign purposes and it becomes merely a piece of Republican strategy on the eye of a Presidential Campaign, little can be expected from it as a remedy for the "Slump."

In all fairness the President should be given credit for a constructive idea, forcefully attained, and every good citizen regardless of his political affiliation, should feel gratified that our nation has been able to take the leadership in adjustment of a serious international situation.

For many years it has been expected that sooner or later the Lee Highway would be re-routed past the Town of Fairfax. The desirability of eliminating right angle turns and crowded business streets has been found so important in numerous instances that it has been inevitable that sooner or later this necessity would strike our county seat.

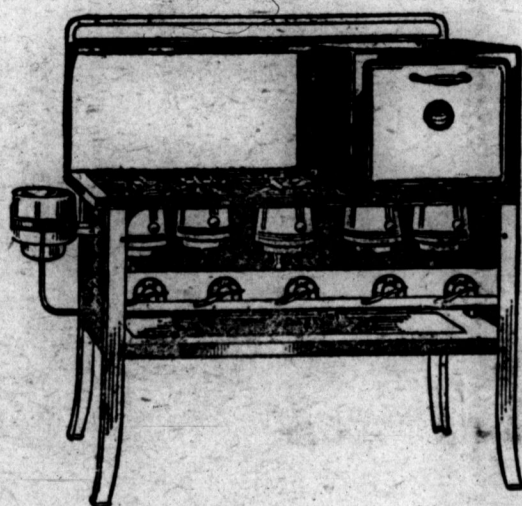
