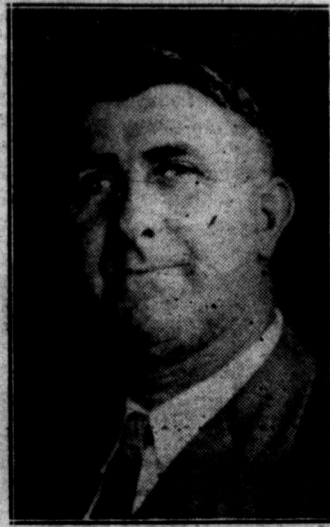

## CONNER HEADS RELIEF BODY

Prince William Chairman Does  
Not Regard Situation Se-  
rious at Present.

E. R. Conner, who directed activities of the Prince William County Drought Relief Committee, has just been named as a member of Gov. Pollard's Committee on Unemployment, and will serve as chairman of the Prince William Committee.

"While the unemployment situation is not acute in this section at present, due to demand for corn cutters, the pipe line project of the Virginia Gas Distribution Corporation, work on the new post office at Manassas and several minor building projects," said Mr. Conner, "we are conducting a county-wide survey seeking to learn of unemployed and Mayor Harry P. Davis has opened a bureau in Manassas for registration of all unemployed citizens or part-time workers, so that a comprehensive report can be forwarded to William T. Reed, general chairman, at Richmond.

## BRENTSVILLE DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL FAIR PLANS ANNOUNCED

Agricultural Exhibits to Be Held  
Saturday, Oct. 17, at High  
School.

The Agricultural Fair of the Brentsville district, which will be held at the Brentsville District High School, will outstrip any those held in the past, judging from the number of entries in the large list of exhibit classes.

The main event in the morning will be the dairy judging contest, open to vocational high school students and to members of the county 4-H clubs, and from the successful contestants in the event will be chosen members of the county judging teams of the 4-H and Future Farmers organizations.

One of the outstanding events in the afternoon will be the demonstration and dress review for girls of 4-H clubs, under the direction of Miss Sarah Pitts, home demonstration agent.

The association will start Friday, October 16, receiving entries. You will help greatly if you will get in all non-perishable entries Friday afternoon. All entries must be in by Saturday a. m., Oct. 17 (the morning of the fair) by 2:30 o'clock.

Suitable prizes and ribbons will be awarded in all classes.

Event Will Be Spectacular.

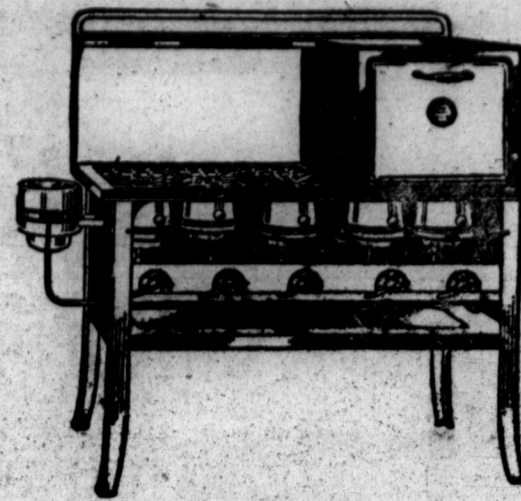

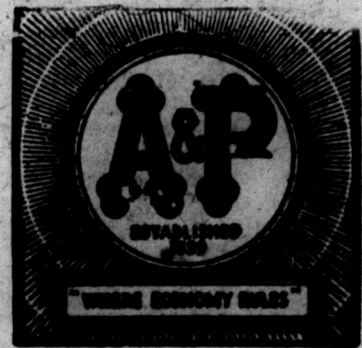

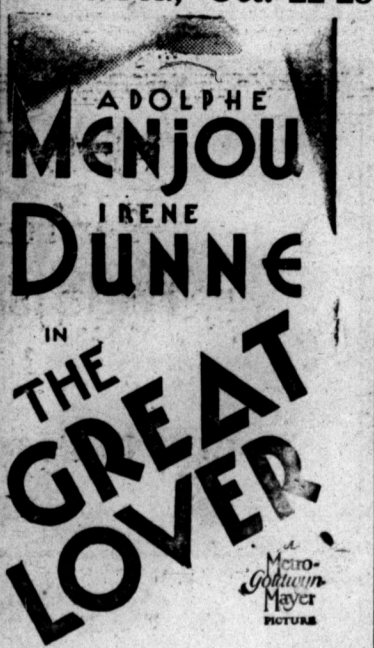

M. J. Weber given sentence of six months on prohibition felony and assigned to Coles District Road Board.

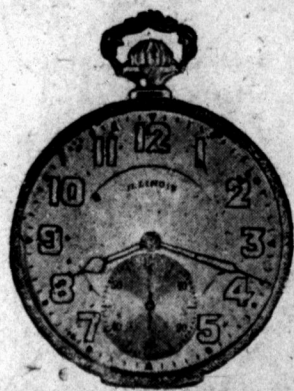

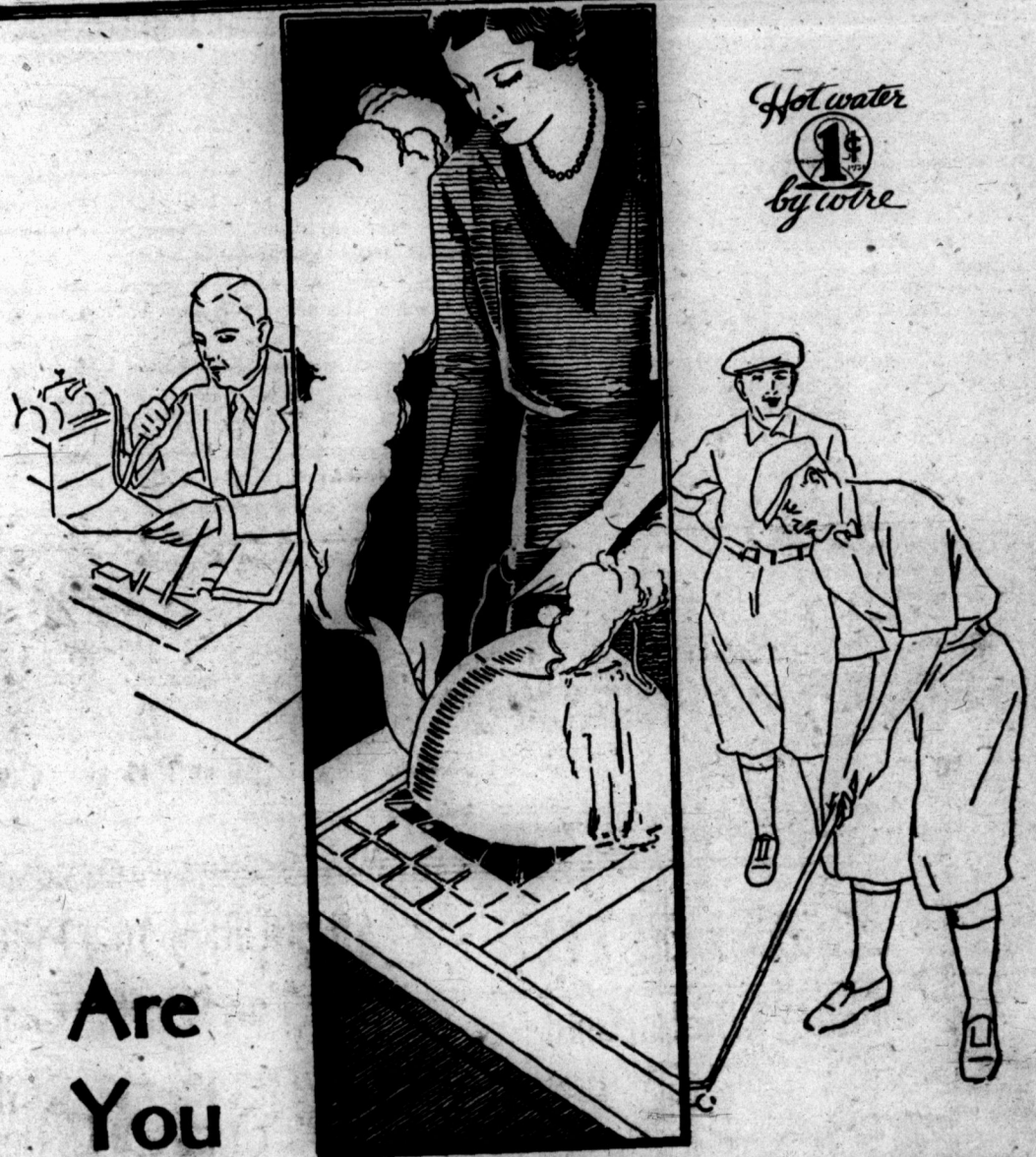

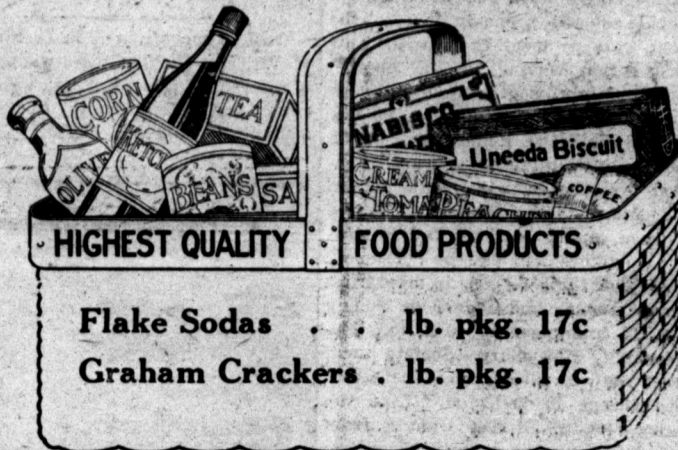
