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



BUSINESS AND WEATHER

It has been said that "God tempers the wind to the shorn lamb." A study of business slumps made by a weather expert seems to suggest that this is literally true.

Observing the unusual warmth of this fall and early winter, C. A. Donnel of the Chicago weather station began checking up on former crises and found a string of curious parallels.

We have had warm weather since the stock market crash of 1929. The winter immediately following that event, for December, January and February, averaged well above normal temperature. The winter of the post war depression, 1920-21 was still warmer. It was a little above the average of 1914-15, and a good deal above in the panic winter of 1907-1908. The record is not entirely uniform, but nearly so, for about half a century, with the greatest excess warmth in the winter of 1877-1878.

What do you make of that, Watson? Is there any similar parallelism, as some have main tained, between depressions and water levels? And if so why?-Exchange.


