SENATOR SMITH FOR GOVERNOR

Urged by Farm Group to Enter Contest.

Hon. Worth Smith, State Senator from Louisa county, has been urged to enter the contest for Governor of Virginia. His endorsement came Tuesday from a group of prominent farmers in session in Richmond, who referred to Senator Smith as a man who "thinks as we do and has the uncompromising type of courage which characterized leadership in Virginia in early days."

Senator Smith has been prominent in organizing the dairymen of the State and is recognized as a friend of the farmer. He has not yet indicated his attitude toward the matter.

Senator Smith has been an outstanding exponent of an extra session of the General Assembly to relieve distress so wide spread throughout the State at this time.

Secretary Elected and Plans Being Laid.

Literature for use in the work is being rushed and the committee will have the same for its meeting tomorrow.

Where road work is done, the same will be in co-operation with the official organization in the county.

Persons desiring work under this relief plan should see their nearest committee member and enroll. Upon acceptance they will be examined and put to work at once. The first month's allowance is available (\$27.70).

The committee is serving without compensation of any sort, the secretary being the only paid official, and he is giving his full time to the work.

Arthur W. James, secretary of the State Welfare Board, has general supervision of all relief work in the State.

BOARD DESIRES TO ADD ROOMS

Woodbine Jumps to Three-Room Class.

The county school board made the most progressive move yesterday in recent months. Resolutions were passed asking the Board of Supervisors to authorize loans from the State Literary Fund amounting to \$5500, \$500 of which is for Woodbine and the remainder for Occoquan High.

The dual construction plan came after a study of conditions at the two schools. In anticipation of favorable action by the Supervisors, the School Board authorized Supt. Haydon and Trustee Lynn to have plans prepared for two additional rooms at Occoquan, and further instructed a committee composed of the superintendent and Mr. Barnes to move the Smithfield school to Woodbine where the material will be used in adding two rooms to this school.

On request of local patrons, the Board granted permission for the use of the Minnieville school for religious purposes and appointed the following committee which will be responsible: Messrs. D. J. Hunt, J. H. Gordon and Eddie Russell.

The Board appointed the following budget committee: Professor R. C. Haydon and Trustees Arrington, Lloyd and Lynn.

AN ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince William County, Virginia, held in the Court House of Manassas, Virginia, January 3, 1933. A quorum being present, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried by the affirmative vote of the Board, the following ordinance was proposed and ordered to be published in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 2743 of the Code of Virginia, 1930:

Be it ordained and enacted by this Board under and pursuant to the powers invested in it by the provisions of Sec. 2743 of the Code of Virginia, 1930, that the following rules, regulations and requirements be, and the same are now ordained and enacted, regulating and controlling the operation of Hog Farms and Commercial Raising of Hogs in the County of Prince William.

1. The hog farm is hereby declared to be any building, shed, pen or other enclosure or any farm-lot or any premises or any portion of any premises upon which more than fifty (50) swine over three months old are fed for commercial purposes upon garbage.

2. No hog farm as so defined shall be located, operated, conducted or maintained within three-fourths of a mile of any residence, place of business, public school, or other public building without the operator thereof having first obtained the written consent of at least 75 per cent of the property owners within said three-quarters of a mile zone, which said consent shall be first filed with the Board of Supervisors and an order obtained permitting such location, operation and maintenance.

3. No hog farm as so defined shall be located, operated or maintained within one mile of any public highway, without the consent of this board, first had and obtained after a public hearing.

4. If garbage is used, in whole or part, as a feed supply for any swine, the same shall be hauled in water-tight containers, adequately covered so as to prevent the wastage.

5. Any violation of this ordinance will constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail, not exceeding thirty days, or by both, in the discretion of the Justice, Court or jury, trying the case and each day's violation thereof shall constitute a separate offence.

The Clerk of this board be, and he hereby is directed to cause a copy of this ordinance to be published in two consecutive weekly issues of The Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in this county, and hearing upon this ordinance is set for the 23rd day of January, 1933, provided, however, this proposal shall have no force and effect until and after final hearing by this board and such ordinance adopted shall have been published for two successive weeks.

Ordinance Would Place Restrictive Measures.

On Tuesday morning a situation which had been gathering some impetus in the past few weeks broke in full force before the Board of Supervisors when counsel for some of the disturbed property holders offered a tentative ordinance, full text of which is printed in another column.

The whole matter deals with the operation of a large hog farm at Featherstone, just off the Jefferson Davis Highway, below Woodbridge, and is the property of Hon. G. W. Herring, delegate from Stafford and Prince William in the General Assembly.

The new corporation is known as the Southern Livestock Company. The directors are as follows: B. S. Garber, Washington; G. E. Garber, Bridgewater; R. S. Garber, Silver Springs, Md.; M. G. Garber, Falls Church; D. W. Garber, Falls Church; Don M. Garber, Washington; G. W. Herring, Woodbridge. Mr. Herring is not listed as an officer.

Under the provisions of the charter the purposes are "the conduct of a general livestock business, including the raising, buying, selling, feeding, slaughtering, operation of abattoir and packing plants, operation of fertilizer plant, marketing of all products involved in the business of the corporation."

Reports state that the matter first came to light through a request from Blacksburg to the Federal Department of Agriculture to recommend to the District Commissioners the sending of one or more cars of refuse to some point twenty miles from the District of Columbia.

Some work has already been started at the farm but the proposed ordinance will probably stop such proceedings and both sides will have counsel to argue the respective merits of their cases.

It is stated that the initial herd would contain 250 hogs and that this number would gradually be increased to 5,000 or more.

The promoters of the hog farm claim that they are exercising every care to create no unusual nuisance, either in actual sanitation or in objectionable odors. Those opposed to the same scoff at the idea that such a plan can be operated on a gigantic scale without serious detriment to the neighborhood.

The proposed ordinance places bars to the unlimited operation of commercial hog farms but leaves it as a neighborhood proposition in every case, based on a petition of property holders within three quarters of a mile.

As a county-wide proposition the hearing is sure to bring out a large crowd and those interested pro and con should so express themselves to their member on the Board. The provisions of the ordinance will be explained to anyone by the counsel to the Board of Supervisors, Hon. Thomas H. Lion, Commonwealth's Attorney for Prince William county.

IN RE: TRIAL JUSTICE

Ordered that a hearing be held at 2 p.m., January 24, 1933, for the purpose of determining or passing upon the question of establishing a trial justice for Prince William County. It is further

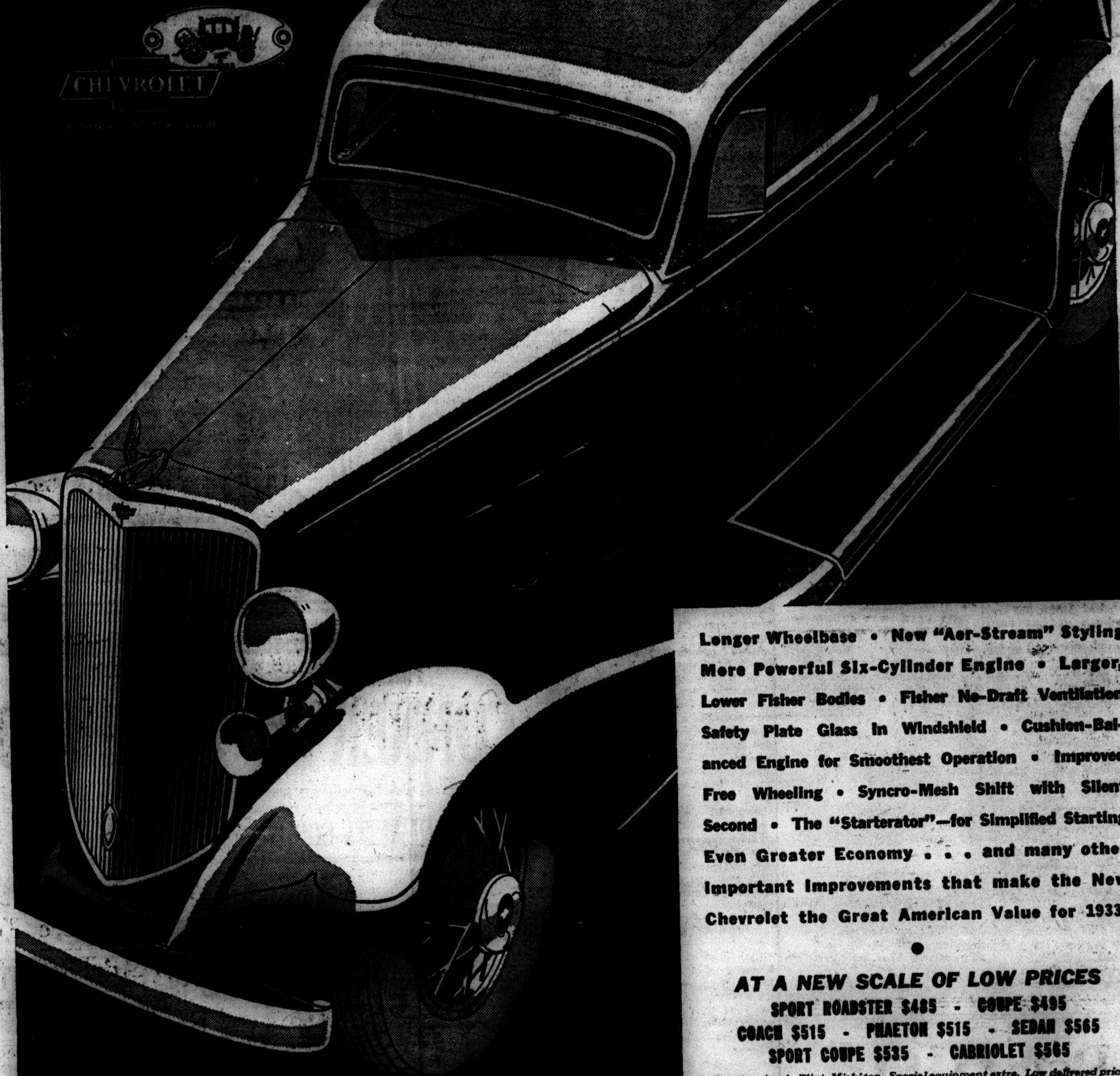

CONGRATULATIONS

We are in receipt of a copy of the 149th anniversary of The Alexandria Gazette.

While old in name and possessing rare bits of history in its antique files, The Gazette is new in everything else, its equipment ranking far ahead of other papers in towns of similar size.

The edition shows the usual amount of care which has characterized these special issues of recent years. It reflects a great deal of credit on its youthful editor, Charles C. Carlin, Jr., and on his efficient staff, both editorial and mechanical.

THE MATTER OF A TRIAL JUSTICE

So far 21 out of 100 counties have, in eight years, adopted the trial justice ordinance.

To the lay mind, it might be well to explain this in some details.

It has been liberally represented that the trial justice would expedite justice and relieve the circuit court of many trifling liquor cases. This is true to a certain extent but not nearly so much as has been touted.

The main beneficiaries under this act are the circuit court itself and the Bar. Naturally the circuit court will lighten its work. The lawyers like it uniformly because they do not have to travel out of the courthouse.

It is claimed that a trial justice "shall sit at such points in the county as the circuit judge may prescribe." But if the judge never designates such points, how can this clause become effective?

The office is salaried, but no trial justice has yet had to fall back on the county treasury for his salary, which varies from \$600 to \$2700.

It is not necessary to appoint a lawyer to this position, but nothing but lawyers have yet been appointed.

The average trial justice after blundering around for six

months may become as effective as an old-time magistrate. He does know many points at law, however, and that frequently prevents what might otherwise become innocent miscarriages of justice.

Just as the old-time circuit court becomes crowded, so will the court of any trial justice in a county of over twelve or fifteen thousand population. He is but one man, and as one man he can do just so much and no more.

With an alternate sitting around over the county to cover the civil end of the matter, the whole thing would have a different color, but with one man trying everything in sight, we see no effective solution over the present situation in any county, and the time is not far off when either the old county judge will be restored or the number of circuits will be cut down to about one third of the present number in the general consolidation which is the growing tendency of the times.

WHY CONGRESS OBJECTS

President Hoover wants to re-organize the governmental departments. Congress is not friendly to his proposal and the reason is easy to discover.

The Republican administration has made no honest attempt to curtail government expenses. During the past six months the huge deficit has continued about in the same ratio as before the budget was "balanced." There was no special gesture toward reduced expenditures in the Hoover plan, which even created some more new high salaried jobs.

After March 4 the American people, rather than the special interests, will take charge of our government and as their duly chosen representative, there is little doubt that Franklin D. Roosevelt will apply the axe to the huge expenditures of the government departments and the new Congress will not enter objection. A heroic remedy is necessary to cure a very serious situation and it will surely be applied.

STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT CLINIC FOR ADULTS

A clinic for adults conducted by a specialist of the State Health Department for the diagnosis of diseases of the chest in their early stages will be held in the Court House at Manassas on Wednesday, January 11. This clinic will be under

the auspices of the County Board of Health and in co-operation with physicians of the county.

This clinic to be of the most value to the community should be attended by those who have lost relatives or friends with tuberculosis or who have lived for some time in the house with a case of the disease. Tuberculosis is catching just like measles or small-

pox, and many people have the disease months before they call the doctor. Only 28 people will be examined during the day.

All who wish to take advantage of this free clinic should consult their doctor or the visiting nurse and make an appointment. They can thus insure examination when they come. Those who do not have appointments may be turned away. This opportunity comes but seldom to this community and should be used particularly by those who have been forced to associate with active cases of the disease tuberculosis.

NEW FRATERNAL ORDER FOR NORTHERN VIRGINIA

Mr. Arthur A. Philo, past grand regent of New Jersey and field manager of the Royal Arcanum for Virginia, has appointed Judge Bryan Gordon of the Arlington County Court House Square, field representative for Arlington county for the purpose of instituting a Royal Arcanum Council in Clarendon. Temporary headquarters are located at the Judge's office.

The Royal Arcanum is a fraternal insurance society organized in June 1877 with headquarters in Boston. It has councils all over the United States and Canada. It is the oldest fraternal insurance society in this country. It issues modern contracts from one to ten thousand dollars, operating on the lodge system.

There is connected with the organization a ladies auxiliary known as the Loyal Ladies of the Royal Arcanum, who are active in promoting the social and fraternal features of the society.

The nearest council in Virginia is at Alexandria and in Washington there are 5 councils with an approximate membership of over one thousand. For further details and particulars read the local papers.

It is proposed to maintain a local headquarters in Clarendon. It is necessary to have 50 new members before instituting a new council.

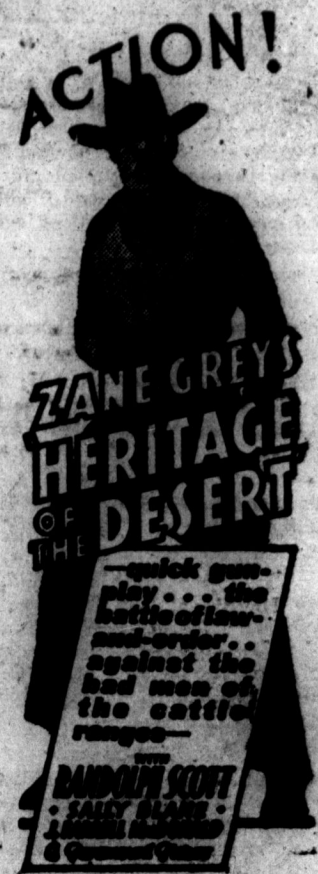

IN RE: SOUTHERN LIVESTOCK COMPANY INC. AN ORDINANCE:

At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince William County, Virginia, held in the Court House of Manassas, Virginia, January 3, 1933. A quorum being present upon motion duly made, seconded and carried by the affirmative vote of the Board, the following ordinance was proposed and ordered to be published in accordance with the Provisions of Section 2743 of the Code of Virginia, 1930:

Be it ordained and enacted by this Board under and pursuant to the powers invested in it by the provisions of Section 2743 of the Code of Virginia, 1930, that the following rules, regulations and requirements be, and the same are now ordained and enacted, regulating and controlling the operations of Hog Farms and Commercial Raising of Hogs in the County of Prince William.

1. The hog farm is hereby declared to be any building, shed, pen or other enclosure or any farm-lot or any premises or any portion of any premises upon which more than fifty (50) swine over three months old are fed for commercial purposes upon garbage.

2. No hog farm as so defined shall be located, operated, conducted or maintained within three-fourths of a mile of any residence, place of business, public school or other public building without the operator thereof having first obtained the written consent of at least 75 per cent of the property owners within said three-quarters of a mile zone, which said consent shall be first filed with the Board of Supervisors and an order obtained permitting such location, operation and maintenance.

3. No hog farm as so defined shall be located, operated, or maintained within one mile of any public highway, without the consent of this board, first had and obtained after a public hearing.

4. If garbage is used, in whole or part, as a feed supply for any swine, the same shall be hauled in water-tight containers, adequately covered so as to prevent the wastage.

5. Any violation of this ordinance will constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail, not exceeding thirty days, or by both in the discretion of the Justice, Court or jury, trying the case and each day's violation thereof shall constitute a separate offence.

The Clerk of this board be, and he is hereby is directed to cause a copy of this ordinance to be published in two consecutive weekly issues of The Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in this county and hearing upon this ordinance is set for the 23rd of January, 1933.

Provided, however, this proposal shall have no force and effect until and after final hearing by this Board and such ordinance adopted shall have been published for two successive weeks.

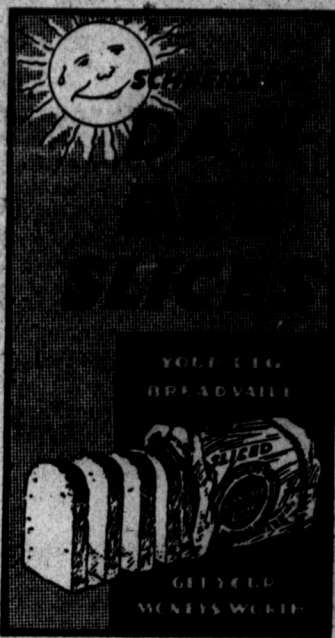
