



Too often we see baleful influences manifested in the lives of young people to their own undoing and the heartache of those who are interested in their wel-





The whole project is a fundamental working plan that takes its place with numerous other activities of importance in the proper functioning of the Bell System as a whole.

Sitting Rooms Provided
The facilities provided for the female operating personnel do not stop with the furnishing of dining rooms. HOME SOCIETY MAKES ANNUAL CHRISTMAS APPEAL FOR GIFTS

OVER SIX HUNDRED DEPENDENT CHILDREN IN CARE OF SOCIETY

For the past thirty-six years the Children's Home Society of Virginia has been making its annual Christmas appeal to the generosity of Virginians for gifts to aid the foundlings, orphans, neglected and deserted children of whom more than 5.000 have been cared for since the Society was found-

ed in 1900.

Over 600 bewildered and destitute Over 600 bewildered and destitute children are at the present time entirely dependent on the Society for the home care and training which is every child's birthright. And the Society is entirely dependent on the generous gifts of its supporters for funds with which to carry on the responsibilities they have assumed for the welfare and development of their wards.

These little foundlings, and orphans by death, desertion or neglect, are fac-ing not only a bleak and cheerless Christmas, but a future life empty of the loving care and protection without which no child can be expected to develop into a useful citizen. The Society feels responsible not only for the ma-terial needs of the children under protection, but for their character and emotional needs as well.

No one can bear the prospect of

unloved and uncared for little children awaking on Christmas morning to the chili grey ashes of a cheerless hearth, and empty sagging stockings, but prospects even more de-pressing than these are facing hun-dreds of little children all over Virginia this Christmas, unless the generous friends of the Children's Home Society will share the increased prosperity which they have enjoyed this year with these unfortunate, de-

pendent children.

The annual Christmas appeal of the Society is being made this year as usual to the more than thirty thousand contributors, many of whom have already given to support the work of the Society. A large number, how-ever, give an additional amount at Christmas time, and additional large numbers make their regular annual contribution at Christmas.

Due, however, to increasing needs and the fact that the Society faces

a possible deficit of approximately five thousand dollars in the current year, it is hoped that many who have not it is hoped that many who have not been helping as regular contributors will join in the work of the Society in rescuing and caring for Virginia's homeless and neglected children. MENTAL TEST FOR DRIVERS

Rhodes Says May Become Part of Examination for Permits.

John Q. Rhodes, jr., director of the Virginia Motor Vehicle Division, said this week he is "seriously considering" a proposal to require prospective motorists to undergo a mental examination before they are issued permits to drive.

The proposed mental tests for drivers is part of Rhodes' plan to institute more rigid examinations for applicants for drivers licenses as a highway safety move and as a possible check to what Governor Peery has termed "needless murder on our

His plan would supplement the pres ent requirement under which applicants must demonstrate their skill in handling a car. However, Rhodes said, mental and emotional reactions are more important factors in avoiding accidents than mere physical ability to operate an automobile.

Under the present set-up applicants are tested for color-blindness, ability to read and interpret road signs and vision and hearing. They are then required to demonstrate to an examining officer their ability to operate a machine in traffic.

But these tests, Mr. Rhodes pointed out, do not reveal the emotional makeup of the driver, his degree or excitability or his ability to think quickly in a crisis where a few seconds may mean life or death.

The director frankly asserted he believes there are some licensed motorists in Virginia who should never have been granted permits.
