**HOBART NEWMAN  
BECOMES JUDGE**Appointed to Succeed Judge  
Hitt in Washington.

Youthful Hobart Newman will take his place on the bench of the District Police Court without any "revolutionary plans" in mind, he declared yesterday after President Roosevelt appointed him to succeed Judge Isaac R. Hitt, whose term expired six months ago.

"I expect to follow along in the good work already started down there. I have two or three pet and personal traffic ideas, maybe; but nothing extraordinary."

"Besides, I will be so busy getting started this summer that I won't have time for thinking up many new plans. My work will be heaviest in the summer, you know. This is not the Supreme Court to which I am being appointed."

Newman, a 34-year-old attorney, is a native of Washington and will go to the court from the Department of Justice, where he is a special attorney in the claims department. Of athletic build and brisk and energetic, he is popular in Washington legal and business circles.

Since Newman had the endorsement of Senators Wagner, Bankhead, McKellar and George, and local Democratic leaders, quick Senate approval is anticipated.

The new judge was educated in Friends Select School, Central Hill School, George Washington University and National University. He latter school in 1925, and soon thereafter was admitted to the District bar.

The first legal experience was obtained in the office of the United States District Attorney here, under whom he served as an assistant.

He is the son of Enos Newman, who has lived in Washington for many years, and a nephew of the late Edward A. Newman, who was at one time Democratic national committee man for the District.

Although disclaiming any special hobbies other than "the legal profession," he is fond of Chows, swimming and "reading of all descriptions."

Judge Newman frequently visits Manassas. He is a nephew of the late Mrs. E. R. Conner.

**GARDEN EXPERT  
VISITOR HERE**Mrs. C. M. Lawrence An Inter-  
esting Speaker.

The Manassas Garden Club met Tuesday morning at the home of Mrs. R. A. Hutchison with Mrs. C. R. C. Johnson as assistant hostess, and with the president, Mrs. Paul Cooksey presiding. Mrs. Cassius M. Lawrence, of Herndon, Va., was the guest speaker. Other guests were Mrs. MacMillan, Miss Estelle Holden, Mrs. Raymond Wrenn, all of Herndon, and Mrs. T. J. Broadbuss.

Mrs. Lawrence read an interesting paper on "Landscaping". She said that landscaping, as we know it, was an early art, and in a delightful way sketched the beginning, and the development of this art from the time of the Ancient Egyptians, Babylonians, Greeks and Romans down to the present day. She told of the gardens in the South saying that there were none worthy of the name before about 1700, and that Middleton Place Garden on the Ashley River near Charleston, S. C., was the first landscaped garden in America, and the garden at the Governor's Palace in Williamsburg the first in Virginia.

Mrs. Lawrence also gave many practical suggestions that were of much help to those present, and offered the following sound advice, "Having laid out your plot and placed best flowers where they are the best suited, let them alone. Some people nag their flowers to death." She urged that more excursions be made to the woods and mountains for native material, and ended by saying, "Let the members of all the garden clubs build gardenward and sunward for the fuller appreciation of the out-of-doors, and a greater joy of living."

Mrs. Jacobson, Chairman of the Conservation Committee, reported that work would be resumed in the fall on landscaping the Centreville Road, a project in which the club members are much interested.

An encouraging report was given by Mrs. C. R. C. Johnson upon the survey of the garages on the Lee Highway.




Dear Frank:

I have just learned of some of the tactics being used by you and some of your supporters in Stafford County, to which I wish to call your attention.

I had hoped and believed that this Campaign would be conducted in a fair and friendly way, but it is evident that you and some of your friends are attempting to use the same methods, in an effort to defeat me, as were used against Mr. N. N. Berry, when he was a candidate for Treasurer, several years ago.

The first case I wish to call your attention to is the vote by mail of Mr. Reuben Gallahan who is not physically unable to vote and who possibly has not been absent from the precinct for a good many years. I am advised that you and Mr. R. H. L. Chichester carried the Registrar to his home, had him sign an application and voted him all at the same time. This, I believe, is in violation of Section 202 of the absentee voters law.

The other case I just learned of is the case of Mrs. Nannie Lynn who votes at Stafford Store Precinct. I am advised that Mr. D. M. Chichester accompanied by a notary public went to Mrs. Lynn's home, who it is true is a very old lady, and persuaded her to vote by mail and persuaded her to vote for you. While I have not seen Mrs. Lynn in person, yet one of her closest friends has informed me that she never would have voted by mail if she has not been persuaded by Mr. Chichester and that she desired to vote for me and that she is very much dissatisfied.

I feel that these tactics are entirely improper and, I believe, the good people of Stafford County will resent such tactics on election day.

I appeal to you to have your lieutenants discontinue such conduct.

I am mailing this letter to you and a copy to the Free Lance Star, and Manassas paper in sufficient time that you have time to reply before election day.

Dear Sir:

It seems that some do not know that those who live out their lives on mud roads will never reconcile themselves to the diversion of the gas tax. Knowing this, I wrote Mr. Moncure early in 1936 that this community did not want the gas tax diverted from the roads for any purpose. Nevertheless, he saw fit to help in diverting \$161,000.00 for the year commencing July 1, 1936 and \$146,500.00 for the year commencing July 1, 1937. This money was diverted for the purpose of increasing the state police force and adjusting salaries.

Could it be possible that Mr. Moncure had a son who needed one of these soft jobs?

The \$308,000.00 thus spent would have built, under the conditions that exist, in this community 100 miles of passable secondary roads. The use it has been put to is of very questionable value. It was supposed to increase the safety of our highways. Nevertheless, the dead and maimed per auto have increased at an alarming rate. I, for one, cannot bring myself to support those who divert our road funds.

**Democratic Primary Will Be  
Held Next Tuesday.**

With the Democratic Primary occurring Tuesday, August 3, the outstanding contest of the election is undoubtedly that being waged for the office of Lieutenant - Governor between the veteran Senator Saxon W. Holt and his opponent, Senator Robert W. Daniel.

The election of James H. Price to the Governorship of the State is generally conceded. Certainly in this section, at least, he has no substantial opposition in the candidacy of Senator Vivian L. Page.

The lack of a real contest for Governor has thrown the Lieutenant - Governor fight into, exceptionally bold relief, but heading the contest, without question, is the rugged personality of the veteran Senator Holt who has served the people of Virginia for more than 34 years and whose record of public service since 1902 has placed him in the forefront.

The contest for Attorney - General lies between Hon. A. P. Staples, who now holds the office, and Hon. John Galleher, of Leesburg. Both gentlemen have many friends in this county and while the outcome in the state may not be in doubt, the vote in Prince William County may be closer than that polled in the other contests.

The contest for Delegates to the General Assembly has aroused much interest. Both candidates have served Prince William and Stafford in the legislature and the voters have their respective records of service before them.

On March 2, 1936, a bulletin was issued by the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U. S., from Lynchburg, Virginia, Department of Virginia, General Orders No. 8, from which I wish to quote the following:

"To be read at two consecutive meetings and posted on B. B.

1. The Veterans Preference bill was killed in the Committee and the following delegates voted against the bill:

Medley, Chapman, Quisenberry, Venable and Oast. Oast was the chairman of this committee and strongly opposed this bill.

The following delegates supported the bill in the committee:

Bandy, Moncure, Chitwood, Cordell and Boatwright, to whom the veterans owe thanks and appreciation.

Let us remember our friends in the future and fight our enemies. . . . It behooves all veterans to mark their friends and support them actively."

There is much more to the bulletin, which it is not necessary to write. I am writing to Lexington today in an effort to secure additional copies, and would like to send you one, as I only have the one for my file.

Dear Howard:  
I have your letter of May 22 enclosing a copy of Frank P. Moncure's letter to you dated May 17, 1937 concerning his vote on the Veterans' Preference Bill.

Please be advised that I have just checked the record of the vote taken by the members of the General Laws Committee of the House of Delegates when this bill was before the committee for consideration and find that Mr. Moncure voted for the bill which was defeated by a vote of 6 to 5.

As a final resort to get the bill on the floor of the house on March 5, 1936, a motion was made to discharge the General Laws Committee from further consideration of the veterans' preference bill. The motion was lost by a vote of 48 to 31, with 21 members not voting. According to the record in the office of the Clerk of the House of Delegates, Mr. Moncure is recorded as voting "No" on the motion and is to be construed as a vote against the bill.

You will note that the vote was taken three days after the Veterans' of Foreign Wars issued their bulletin on how the members of the General Laws Committee voted.

We are at a loss to know why Mr. Moncure, after voting for the bill in committee, changed his mind and voted against the discharge of the committee when the matter came up on the floor.


