In 1936 a crippled man in Prince William county was struck by an automobile on the highway. He was picked up by a Washington car, carried to a small nearby hospital where it was found that he had a fractured skull and fractured bones in the right hip and left leg.

His life was saved but proper orthopedic care could not be given him in this hospital. In March, 1937 he was transferred to a larger hospital where bone was grafted and the bones in his legs broken and reset.

After thirteen months in these hospitals which necessitated the sale of his little home he returned to Prince William County on December to become a welfare case. He has a comfortable bed but no mattress.

Children's Home Society Makes Annual Christmas Appeal

The annual Christmas appeal of the Children's Home Society of Virginia is now being made to more than 30,000 former contributors as well as to the thousands of others who will be asked to help provide a merry Christmas for Virginia's largest family of homeless and dependent children.

In making the appeal this year, Mr. E. Strudwick, Jr., president of the Society, calls attention to the fact that through campaigns held in practically every community in the State funds are raised throughout the year to carry on the work of the Society. "These campaigns," says Mr. Strudwick, "do not provide sufficient income to take care of the total of our expenses. A special sum in addition is needed each year to enable us to balance our budget. Such sum has always been received in response to our Christmas appeal. We are definitely in need of a generous response this year."

Over Sixty Babies Now in Care

Included in Virginia's largest family this year, there will be between sixty and seventy babies—children under three years of age. Within the next twelve months, they will need not only the mother's care which they will receive in the good homes in which they are being cared for, but there will be the extra expense of clothing, medical care and special diets for most of them. It will not take much to provide for their Christmas needs, but the year's care for each of them will cost the Society a considerable sum of money.

Fifty Children Spend First Christmas

Another group of children for whom the Society is particularly anxious to provide especially at Christmas time are the fifty or more children who will spend their first Christmas as a part of Virginia's largest family. Perhaps for some of them, this Christmas will be the first they have ever spent under conditions that will make them think of the day as children should think of it. For all of them, there could be no greater gift than the assurance that before next Christmas they, too, will be in homes where they have been adopted and made a part of the family.

Of course, the largest single group that will be wholly dependent upon the Society for whatever Christmas cheer they have will be

the group of over one hundred in boarding homes. They are wholly dependent upon the Society for everything, and unless the Society provides, in addition to necessities, special Christmas boxes, they will receive few if any gift reminders of the day.

The annual Christmas appeal of the Society, however, would not be complete unless it took into consideration those children who are not now members of the family, but who will before the year is over, through one misfortune or another, join the family circle of Virginia's largest family. Officials of the Society state that based on past experiences from 150 to 200 appeals for help may be expected during the coming year. Not all of these, of course, will be accepted by the Society, but each appeal must be investigated and care and protection provided for those who should become members of the Home Society family. "Nothing could make the Christmas at the Children's Home Society more complete," says Mr. Strudwick, "than to receive such a generous response to the annual Christmas appeal that we would be able to say on January 1, 1938: This year we will not find it necessary to refuse aid to any child who should receive care from this Society."




