In 1936 a crippled man in Prince William county was struck by an automobile on the highway. He was picked up by a Washington car. carried to a small nearby hospital where it was found that he had a fractured skull and fractured bones in the right hip and left leg.

His life was saved but proper orthopedic care could not be given him in this hospital. In March, 1937 he was transferred to a larger hospital where bone was grafted and the bones in his legs broken and reset.

After thirteen months in these hospitals which necessited the sale of his little home he returned to Prince William County on December to become a welfare case. He has a comfortable bed but no mattress.
