ESTEEMED LADY CALLED TO REST

Mrs. Wenrich Dies On Christmas Day

One of the local happenings which marred an otherwise perfect Christmas for the community was the death, shortly after midnight on Christmas Day, of Adah Catherine Wenrich, widow of the late H. D. Wenrich, who located in this town nearly 50 years ago.

Although quite businesslike in her every day work, yet pleasant and friendly Mrs. Wenrich was quite a favorite with both young and old. She had been a member of the Lutheran Church since girlhood, and affiliated with the Bethel Lutheran Church when she came here with her family. She was always a very loyal church worker.

It was at one of the Christmas entertainments given by the Sunday School not so long ago, that she expressed the wish to a close friend that she might die on Christmas Day. This wish was granted as she lived eight minutes past the midnight hour.

Mrs. Wenrich, as a young girl, was noted for her beauty and she retained much of this to her death. She was quite active up to just a few days ago when she was suddenly stricken. Born in Berk's County, Pa., on April 2, 1861, she was the daughter of John and Mary Hettinger. On Nov. 2, 1878, she was married to Mr. H. D. Wenrich, and a few years later the couple located in the town which was home to them for the rest of their lives. Of this marriage there were six children, three daughters, Mrs. Mary Hibbs and Mrs. May Rexrode, of Manassas, and Mrs. Evelyn Watkins, of Pikesville, Ky.; three sons, one who died in infancy, Mr. Charles W. Wenrich, who resides in Washington, and Mr. Wilson N. Wenrich, of Manassas, who took over the business carried on by his father; also a niece, Mrs. Shirley Bywaters, who grew up in the family; thirteen grandchildren and one great grandson also survive.

The funeral took place from Bethel Church on Monday afternoon, with the pastor Rev. A. W. Ballantine, officiating. Interment followed at the Lutheran Cemetery. The pallbearers on this occasion were all grandsons of the deceased, namely, Messrs. Franklin Hibbs, Herbert Hibbs, Keiffer Wenrich, William Watkins, Thomas Watkins, and Thomas Bywaters.

TWO KILLED IN AUTO-MOBILE ACCIDENT

A sad accident occurred on Thursday, December 16, when George R. Hawkins and Dewey Amidon, both about 40 years of age, were killed instantly about two miles north of Dumfries. It is stated that their car ran into the back of a heavily loaded truck.

MRS. BRADFORD BADLY INJURED

Auto Accident Last Friday Caused by Fog

Last Friday Evening about seven o'clock when Mr. and Mrs. Bradford and daughter Ann were returning from Richmond, their car was wrecked on a curve on Route 233 between Catlett and Cedar Run Bridge. Mrs. Bradford was knocked unconscious and badly hurt.

Mr. Roy Wilson of Catlett responding to Mr. Bradford's message for help sent by a passing motorist, carried all three of them to the hospital in Warrenton where immediate attention was given Mrs. Bradford and Dr. McBryde was summoned from Manassas. Upon Dr. McBryde's arrival it was found that Mrs. Bradford was in a very serious condition from shock and injuries, so an ambulance was called and she was taken at once to Emergency Hospital in Washington.

X-ray pictures made Tuesday show that she has some eight or nine fractures or broken bones. Her general condition has improved considerably since Saturday but no visitors except the immediate family are allowed to see her.

Mr. Bradford and Miss Ann escaped without serious injury and after treatment at Warrenton Hospital for cuts, bruises and shock, were taken home where they are under the doctor's care.

A NEW YEAR MOTTO

"As thy days so shall thy strength be." (Deut. 34:25) Only faith in God can enable us to face the new year without foreboding. To many people world conditions seem dark. We all may be sure that our road will not be uniformly smooth. We will have our hills of difficulty to climb, and stony paths of tribulation to traverse. The happy fact is that Heaven assures us that our "shoes shall be iron and brass," and that our strength shall not be allowed to fail.

This promise applies to the kind of strength needed. It may be strength to meet suffering, disappointment, sorrow or death itself. It is He who gives the physician his brains, place curative properties in certain plants and minerals, and endows the human body with power to set up resistance to disease.
