CHRISTMAS PRIZES AWARDED DEC. 27

Mr. Owens Announces Plan For Drawing Shopping Campaign Numbers

The drawing of tickets to determine the winners in the Christmas Shopping Campaign will be conducted at 3:00 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, December 27th, 1939, in Pitts Theater in Manassas.

There are a greater number of prizes this year than in previous campaigns, so a greater number of tickets will be drawn. There are 44 prizes, but a list of 75 numbers will be drawn (to avoid necessity of a redrawing,) and should there be any of the first 44 not represented by a holder, the number or numbers not represented by a holder will be eliminated and the whole list of numbers moved up accordingly.

As in previous years, numbers will be drawn in the presence of anyone who wishes to be present, under the supervision of impartial judges, and the numbers will be placed on a list, exactly in the order as drawn.

This list will be on file in the office of Stanley A. Owens, and will be published in The Manassas Journal the issues of December 28th and of January 4th.

Presence at the drawing is not necessary to get prizes if lucky tickets are registered.

Holders of any numbers shown on the official list must present same for registration at Mr. Owens' office not later than noon of January 8, 1940. No prize money can be demanded until after that time, and must have been registered by then, or the number will be eliminated.

SMITH COMMITTEE IS COMPLIMENTED

After eight days of hearings packed with intensely interesting developments, Rep. Howard W. Smith, Chairman of the Special Committee to Investigate the National Labor Relations Board, announced a Christmas recess Tuesday and declared that hearings would be resumed in Washington January 5th.

1. Rarely, if ever, have they seen a congressional committee function so smoothly and efficiently as the Smith Committee; 2. No committee has ever "leaned backwards" further to see that every witness was afforded the fullest constitutional protection and accorded all courtesies than has the Smith Committee; and 3. No Committee has crowded so many thrills and sensations in the first week of hearings than has the Smith Committee.

Rep. Smith has been the recipient of many compliments from his Com- and from the public in general for gressional colleagues, from the press his impartial conduct of the hearings.

During the first eight days of hearings, the Committee board Members William Leiserson and Edwin S. Smith of the Labor Board; Nathan Witt, the Board's secretary and several other Board employees, present and past.

Rep. Smith announced that after the January hearings are completed, the Committee will visit several parts of the country and indicated that one of the first places to be the scene of hearings would be Detroit.

PHOTO SHOWS the new Ford tractor with Ferguson plow in action. The operator merely steers in a straight line to obtain perfect plowing results. One of a series of book reviews by students of Osbourn High School, Manassas—Session 1939-40—in competition for W. C. Wassner Memorial Prize.

COME AND GET IT
Edna Ferber

The novel, "Come And Get It," written by Edna Ferber, was published in 1936 by Doubleday, Doran and Company, Inc., Garden City, New York.

Miss Ferber tells of the life of the lumberjacks, how one of them became one of the wealthiest men in the lumber business, and how this wealth affected the lives of his family.

Barney Glasgow had a hard life as a youth. He was born in a lumber camp in Maine, of Scotch-Irish parents who had migrated to America. His childhood days were spent in learning to be a good lumberjack. Much of this knowledge was acquired through the teachings of Swan Bostrom, a Swede whose friendship was to have a great influence on Barney's life. Barney determines to be something big in the lumber business and realizes his ambition when he marries Emma Louise Hewitt, daughter of a lumber king of Wisconsin. Two children were born to them, Evelyn and Bernie.

There is a sudden change in Barney's life when he meets Lotta Lindbeck, the eighteen year old granddaughter of his old friend, Swan Bostrom. Barney becomes infatuated with her and, to make matters worse, his son, Bernie, falls in love with her, too. Then, fate steps in to settle the question, leaving only Lotta and Bernie.

Bernie carries on the story by marrying Lotta. Lotta, eager to become important in the world of society, goes abroad to live. Barney's grandchildren are born in England. They prove that they have the Glasgow blood in them when, contrary to the ideas of their parents, they go to America to answer the call, "Come And Get It," by carrying on the work of their grandfather.

Miss Ferber gives such a vivid description of her characters that when you have finished the book, you feel that you have really met them. The labors of the lumberjacks are made more interesting by the weaving in of a tangled love story. "Come And Get It" is one of those books you like to sit down and read in one sitting. I thoroughly enjoyed it.

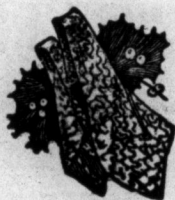
