THE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION MEETS

At the call of the president of the Prince William Education Association, Miss Evelyn Irons, the teachers of the county met in session at Manassas High School on Tuesday afternoon. The devotional exercises were in charge of Rev. Ballentine.

The session was a lively and interesting one, many taking part in the discussion of educational problems. The discussion grew out of the reports of standing committees and of delegates to the fall convention in Richmond of Thanksgiving.

Mrs. Tipton presented the report of the Education committee. This was formulated under eight heads. One of the objectives presented is to work toward a sick-leave for educational employees. Another is to promote closer co-operation of professional organizations concerned with the development of the child. A third to "direct the thinking of teachers toward depersonalization of aims in educational progress." (This point brought out most discussion in an effort to translate it into ordinary English. It has to do with the "three-point program", and tries to show that efforts to secure this desired end must be divorced from personal desires and must be secured entirely on its abstractness.)

The Public Affairs committee's report was presented by Mr. Sigman. He said that inspired by President Irons, efforts have been made to give publicity to the doings of the teachers and to what is being done in educational circles. He said that the county newspaper, THE MANASSAS JOURNAL has been co-operating thoroughly to secure this result. The articles have been given prominent places in this journal.

Most discussion grew out of the report of the resolutions' committee. Mr. C. O. Bittle presented this report under nine heads. The sub-head that aroused most discussion was the one that had to do with the three-point program. Mr. Peters in discussing it wanted to know whether the association wanted it "whole hog or none". It was clarified by stating that it was all desired ultimately, but in this order.

(1) Salary; (2) Retirement Fund; (3) Free textbooks. The governor was quoted as being in favor of this program, but that the last item would likely have to wait awhile.

Several of the resolutions attempted to tie up a closer relation between teachers and the community that they serve. Mr. Francis Chase, the executive secretary's plan for holding regional conferences of the officers and leaders of the county association, was commended.

Delegates to the Richmond association gave their reports. Of the three who gave them, Mr. Peters, Mr. Johnston and Miss Powell, the last was by far the most complete in detail.

Supt. Haydon in speaking of the plan to put white and negro teachers on the same remunerative basis, showed that it was a matter of time and of equal preparation for the teachers' positions. He took an inspirational attitude and showed that teachers to secure real results must be imaginative enough to put themselves on the same plane as the students, "for," said he, "they cannot put themselves on our plane".

He announced that the schools on account of the long Christmas vacation, would close on Friday, the 20th, at the same time as on any other day.

Cost of a flood control project for the Roanoke River basin has been set at around \$15,000,000 by R. E. Colton, representing Colonel Kenneth Conklin, commanding the Norfolk District, Army Engineers.

Reporting to a meeting of business men and farmers at South Boston, Mr. Colton stated that damage done by last August's flood surpassed that of the previous record inundation of 1877, estimating the harm at \$5,500,000.
