## HIGH SCHOOL TO AID KIWANIS

### Toy Dance For Benefit Annual Christmas Fund

This year, as once before in recent years, Manassas High School will show the right by sponsoring a toy dance on the night of December 20, in order that the underprivileged children in or around Manassas may have a more enjoyable Christmas. But, unlike the preceding occasion, the high school will only be part benefactor to the needy children. The Manassas State Vocational School will aid in making this affair a success. The dance will be held in the Vocational School gymnasium which the boys are expected to decorate in a manner befitting the occasion. The price of admission is only a new toy or an old one of considerable value and in good shape. The price applies to each-not to a couple. To those who do not bring a toy, the price will be twenty-five cents per person. The toys will be placed on display in order that everyone may see what has been brought. The toys collected in this way will be turned over to the Kiwanis Club for distribution to needy children.

An invitation has been issued by the Voc. School and the high school to the people of the town to come out and make this dance a big success. We are certain that the students and the townspeople will not let us down this time, but will support this cause with the full extent of their ability. ## HONOR FORMER LOCAL EDUCATOR

### Citizens Of Gainesville District Plant Memorial Tree.

On December 6, a Chinese elm tree was planted on the lawn of the Gainesville District School in memory of the late Dr. Henry M. Clarkson, a former superintendent of public instruction of Prince William County, and resident of Haymarket.

Mr. Richard C. Haydon, our present superintendent, acted as master of ceremonies.

The elementary Glee Club sang "Abide with Me", after which Col. Robt. A. Hutchison of Manassas was introduced as chief speaker of the occasion. Having been a native of Gainesville District, Col. Hutchison was intimately acquainted with Dr. Clarkson and family. He spoke of the progressiveness of the public school system in Prince William County, and gave a list of the various men who had ably filled the office of superintendent. Being a physician as well as an instructor, Dr. Clarkson was well known throughout the county. He was a poet of much ability, and his volumes of poetry are treasured by many of Hutchison spoke heartily of the resemblance of a tree to man, and said, "In planting this tree in memory of Dr. Clarkson, the citizens of Gainesville District are conferring an honor not only upon Dr. Clarkson, but upon themselves also; for it is an honor to any people to desire to perpetuate the memory of so fine a man".

Mrs. W. Park Wilson of Hickory Grove, who taught under him for many years, spoke of his high sense of honor, and of his value as a physician, friend and co-worker. As a special tribute to his memory, she read the 15th Psalm.

Miss Mary Price of Haymarket another of his teachers read one of Dr. Clarkson's poems.

The high school glee club sang "America, the Beautiful". The benediction was pronounced by Rev. John S. Schwartz, and the entire group gathered on the lawn to assist in planting the tree. Among those sharing the honor were Mrs. Etta Lynn, who taught for many years at Catharpin. Mrs. Willis Foley and Mrs. Maude Jordan of the present school faculty of Haymarket, and Mr. W. Y. Elliott, principal of Woodbine School, all of whom were instructors under Dr. Clarkson.

The room receiving the greatest number will be awarded a substantial prize at the next monthly meeting which will be held Wednesday, Dec. 18, 7:30 p. m. The program of the Music Festival will also be given at this time. Be sure to be present.

### Supervisor Johnson Will Review History Of Structure.

The dedication of the gymnasium addition and improvements will be held on Monday night, December 23, during the intermission of the games between the alumni and the high school basketball teams.

Mr. R. C. Haydon, superintendent of Prince William County Schools, and Mr. Wheatley M. Johnson, member of the alumni association and a member of the Prince William County Board of Supervisors, will be the speakers of the occasion. Mr. Johnson will review something of the past history of the gymnasium and the need that existed for it and the means by which it was originally constructed. Mr. Haydon will discuss the needs which have led to the present additions and the importance of such a building to the town of Manassas. All individuals and clubs who have at any time participated in the construction of the gymnasium are urged to be present or represented. Among those who have received invitations to attend are:

### Action Taken

The county school December meeting will present.

A final decision necessary in the matter of a school department at Haymarket passed such a resolution as of September 1, 1941, two story frame building market will be abandoned, a board plans to complete the elementary unit.

The board decided to cooperate with the State Vocational School in offering night classes in the Manassas High School Building during the winter months.

It was further decided to co-operate with the National Defense Program and early in January classes will be started in auto mechanics and wood working at Manassas High School, auto mechanics at Nokesville High School, elementary electricity at Regional High School, and one in welding and metal work at the CCC Camp near Joplin. The project is awaiting approval and tentative plans have already been OK'd at Richmond. The budget for this work is unusually progressive for a county the size of Prince William.

The school holidays begin at the end of this week and continue until January 6.

### ELIGIBLE SELECTEES CAN APPLY FOR FLYING TRAINING

Young men who are subject to call under the Selective Service Act are not restricted from making application for Flying Cadet training. This announcement was made by authorities at Hq., Third Corps Area in Baltimore in answer to numerous inquiries received from prospective inductees interested in flying training. Even though a man is included in a quota subject to report in the near future he is still eligible to apply for Flying Cadet training provided he is otherwise qualified.

Requirements for appointment as a Flying Cadet remain the same. Young men with two years of college, or able to pass a written examination in lieu thereof, who are physically fit, unmarried, and being between the ages of 20 and 27 are eligible for appointment.

Under the rapidly expanding program recently inaugurated by the Army Air Corps, opportunities for appointment as a Flying Cadet have been greatly increased. With the opening of many new training schools in various parts of the country the Army is fast reaching a capacity to handle over 1000 enrolments a month.

Information can be obtained readily by writing to the Commanding General, Third Corps Area, Baltimore, Md., or by a visit to the nearest Army Recruiting Office.

### CITIZENS SEEK NEW STATE HIGHWAY

#### PETITION

To the Virginia State Department of Highways

and The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors:

We, the undersigned taxpayers, voters and residents of Fairfax County, do hereby petition you to take such action as may be necessary and within your power to cause the necessary secondary roads from Manassas to Annandale to be made a part of the State primary system, using the most direct route feasible from an engineering point of view and passing in sufficient proximity to Clifton, Fairfax Station, Sideburn and Burke to afford relief from the present lack of a direct road to Washington, D. C. The improvement of these roads to such an extent as to develop a primary road through this territory, we believe, is urgently needed for the following reasons:

1. Such a highway will provide a more direct road for residents of the affected area which has been deprived of necessary local train service by the Southern Railway and has at its disposal no other public transportation system.
2. The construction of such a road would help to relieve the congestion on existing highways which pass through the continually expanding metropolitan area of Washington, D. C. It would pass through a territory not as yet greatly developed. This road would help to keep such expansion uniform. It would be easier and cheaper to construct now than at a later date when property values will have increased and traffic become more complicated, due to the proposed construction in the area through which the road will pass.
3. Such a road would shorten the distance from Burke, Clifton, Manassas, Bristow, Nokesville, Catlett and other southern points to Washington and Alexandria.

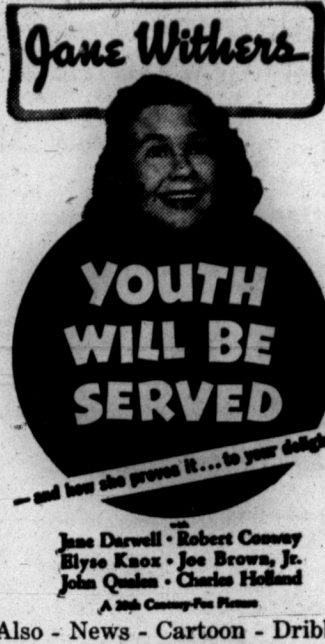

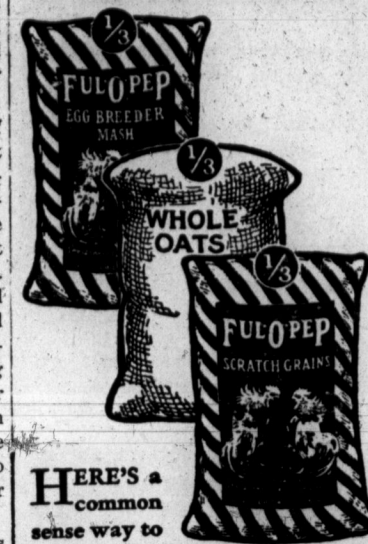

# Alcohol the Nation

The National Christian Temperance Union, organized for "the protection of the home, and the abolition of the liquor traffic", calls upon the citizens of our country to defend the young men now called to the defense of the nation from alcohol - an enemy which will undermine their health, their physical strength, their mental faculties, their efficiency and thus unfit them for the task to which they are called and which they gladly assume.

These young men, many scarcely more than boys, come in large numbers from homes where high moral and religious standards are held; where safeguards for clean living are maintained. Alcohol in smallest quantities affects the brain and hence, skill and

ment. These are the men who are called to the defense of the nation from alcohol. The man who pilots the plane, the man who operates the anti-aircraft gun, the man who gives the orders must be mentally alert, with a brain not dulled by alcohol.

One of the first effects of even small quantities of alcoholic liquors is to loosen the tongue and now at a time when Fifth Columnists and spies from other countries are seeking to gain military information which would harm our country, it is highly important that no alcohol be allowed to be served to our men.

The fall of the French republic is the present warning to us. The official report of the Council of Ministers of the Vichy government ascribes its fall to the use of liquor by the men in the army during the inactive months of the past winter. The Council reported that in one hospital alone during the month of January, 1940, there were 814 cases

of delirium tremens. On the other hand Germany declares that to conquer the world their army must abstain from alcohol. If this is true, abstinence from alcohol is necessary for the defense of the world. The fine legislation which protected the American army in 1917-18 has been repealed. The distillers, the brewers and vintners now have a free field in the main.

For the protection of our country, the defense of our institutions and the reservation of the lives of our people, the most important measure to be taken is to protect the man uniform from the use of alcoholic liquors.

We call upon all patriots, all who earnestly wish to see the United States protect its citizenry, to unite in an effort to secure legislation and the issuance of regulations now possible to secure the accomplishment of the purpose for which our men have been called to service - the defense of this country from foreign aggression.

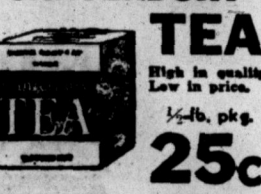

### T. B. LISTED AS LEADING

### CAUSE OF DEATHS IN VA.

Tuberculosis kills more Virginians during their productive years of life than any other cause, according to figures compiled by the State Bureau of Vital Statistics and released today through the Virginia Tuberculosis Association.

Last year, the figures show tuberculosis was the leading cause of death among people between the ages of 15 of 912 fatalities.

In the same age brackets, accidents took second place, with a total of 898 deaths. Heart disease, generally regarded as the leading killer, trailed in deaths, 365 less than the number who died from tuberculosis.

Others of the seven leading causes of deaths during 1939 were ranked as follows:

Pneumonia, 367; Cancer, 290; Nephritis (kidney diseases) 222 and cerebral hemorrhage, 200.

"Is it any wonder," asked J. Vaughan Gary, president of the Virginia Tuberculosis Association, "that we cannot relax our program to cure and control tuberculosis? These figures are startling because they bear tragic testimony to the loss of our men and women, boys and girls, during their most productive years. Our work for the further control of tuberculosis is limited only to the degree that generous-hearted Virginians buy Christmas Seals. The income so produced furnishes the sinews of war upon this enemy of mankind.

"It should be a cheerful Christmas thought to those who purchase seals to know that the money they subscribe makes up the fund used to protect from tuberculosis the young people who are its chief victim."

## BUSINESS GAINS

## IN RECENT WEEKS

Manufacturing, employment in industry, power use, retail sales and almost without exception other indices of business prosperity continued to rise during the last sixty days, according to the monthly report on business conditions of the Virginia State Chamber of Commerce.

Power consumption by industry jumped 6 per cent, while reports from the three principal power companies show that October power use in Virginia was 11 per cent above the corresponding month of a year ago. The chamber's statisticians also report a 13 per cent increase in total hours of work in Virginia industries and gains in employment of 4 per cent for October, over October of 1939. Some 20,000 more are employed, exclusive of agriculture, than a year ago.

The tobacco industry paid revenue taxes which indicate a 12 per cent increase in October business, while checks drawn on clearing house banks in Virginia cities reporting to the Federal Reserve Board indicate an all-time high for October and an increase over September of 10 per cent.

At the same time announcements of

atmospheric nitrogen, announced an expansion program during the month. Virginia's largest cotton mills, at Danville, received orders for a sustained period calling for three shift, capacity production. Preliminary work has begun on the construction of an \$11,000,000 nylon plant at Martinsville, while a new factory manufacturing cigarettes will be established in Danville shortly. Other industrial expansions are being perfected in Bedford, Glasgow, Lynchburg, Richmond, Radford and Norfolk.

Defense expenditures running to many millions, at Fort Lee, Fort Belvoir and around Norfolk, are progressing.

Miss Nelda Coverstone who has been connected with the local office of the State Highway Commission, has accepted a position with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and reported for duty there on Monday of this week.
