I hereby formally announce my candidacy for reelection to Congress from the Eighth Congressional District, subject to the Democratic Primary to be held on Tuesday, August 4, 1942.

I have represented this Dis-trict in Congress since 1930. I have been elected each time by large majorities, and I take this occasion to thank my many loyal friends and supporters for their continued confidence. Many new consistuents have entered my District due to the urgencies of the War, and in view of my inability to personally meet and dis-cuss with them my record, I take this occasion to state my position relative to matters of public interest.

In the position I have taken on the many problems that have confronted the Congress during my service, I have refused to be a "rubber stamp" or to be subservient to the will of any minority pressure group seeking special privileges

I have never offered for public office on the platform that I had no principles worth risking my ce of judgment worth fighting for and no conscience worth living with. I never will. I have voted in favor of every bill and every appropriation re-commended by the President for National Defense and for our war effort both before and since Pearl Harbor, including the fortification of Guam.

#### UNFALT RING SUPPORT OF THE PRESIDENT'S PRF. PAREDNESS AND DEFENSE PROGRAM

It has been falsely stated that I did not support the President's recommendation for the repeal of that Section of the Neutrality Act which prohibited the Arming of Merchant ships. On August 9, 1941, the President sent a message to Congress in which he said: "I recommend the repeal of Section 6 of the Act of November 4. 1939. which prohibits the arming of American-Flag ships en-gaged in foreign commerce." tion of the President in that message with respect to the Neutrality Act. The bill to carry out the President's recommendation (H. J. Res. 237) came before the House on October 16, 1941. I, personally, presented the Resolution for consideration of the bill to the House and made the first speech for it in the House (Congressional Record, page 8160) and voted for it on a roll call vote (Congressional Record, page 8250). When the bill went to the Senate, the Senate went further than the President's recommendation and added an amendment authorizing our merchant ships to venture into belligerent ports. This meant war for which we were not prepared. At that time, November 12, 1941, we had lost 25,000,000 man days of labor in that year alone through strikes, sit-downs and other labor stoppages. The time lost by strikes in the twelve months prior to Pearl Harbor would have produced enough planes and guns, ships and munitions to have turned the scale in our favor on any of the battle fronts. I spoke and voted against the Senate amend-ment, although I voted for and supported the President's recommendation. My action was a sincere effort to bring about increased production of arms and munitions for our boys in the armed forces since such increase was vitally essential, due to the slowdown in production brought

about by the selfish and arbitrary actions of certain labor leaders.

The utterly false statement has been repeatedly made that I have not supported the President in preparedness measures and the War effort. These statements are wholly untrue and known to be untrue by those who make them. My votes in favor of every bill and every appropriation recom-mended by the President for National defense and our War effort are a matter of public record, and I challenge anyone to refute the statement here made.

## VIGOROUSLY OPPOSES AND DENOUNCES RACKET

I vigorously opposed and denounced the racketeering practices of certain labor leaders, who, un-der threat of strikes, in vital war work, compelled free American citizens to pay initiation fees to their unions of from \$50.00 to \$1500 for the privilege of working in defense of their country at a time when the work of every available man was essential and the lives of our soldiers were at stake.

The most prominent leader of the CIO recently said: "Nothing must stop the work of organizing the unorganized in America-not even a great National emergen-cy." Do the people of America realize the significance of this ominous threat to their liberties? While all our energies and activi-ties are being diverted to fight the threat of dictatorship from abroad, we should not be unmind-ful of the equally serious threat of dictatorship at home by a handful of selfish, power-seeking labor leaders. The cold fact is that one labor leader possesses the absolute power today to halt the production of steel any moment he says the word, and only last week, in the "Little Steel" case, he held the covert threat of strike over the head of your Government, to enforce his demands. Another labor leader possesses the power to halt the production of automobiles and tanks at any moment he gives the order. Another labor leader has the power to halt, over night, the production of coal which makes the wheels of your factories turn to send the munitions to the boys we have placed on the battle lines. Another labor leader has the power to halt all construction at any time he sees fit to do so. The veiled threat to exercise these destructive powers is, today and everyday, an ever present menace hanging over the head of your, Government, and its armed forces. These powers have been brought about through legislation that I have been opposing; and through the failure of the Congress to enact corrective measures that I have introduced. No country is safe, in peace or war, when such destructive powers rest in the hands of any minority group. These are cold facts that you ought to be thinking about, whether you are for me for Congress or against me.



I early learned to appreciate hard work. I have never sought to deny to any man the right to join a union or to engage in col-lective bargaining. I am in favor of collective bargaining, but I am in favor of having it conducted in an orderly and lawful manner and in a way that will protect the individual union members as well as the public. The individual union member is just as good an American citizen as anyone else and is entitled to be protected from the racketeering practices of unscrupulous labor leaders. These practices are recognized and resented by the majority of union members, but there is little that they can do about it under existing conditions. I will continue to be the real friend of the working man, and I shall contin-"e to fight for his rights against those who attempt to use him to their own selfish ends.



#### **AUTHOR OF ALIEN REGISTRATION ACT**

The radical and communist centrolled publications have at-tacked me because I was the author of the Alien Registration Act which became a law in 1939 by which we were enabled to have a complete registration; finger-printing and location of every alien in the United States prior to the beginning of the war. They do not expect me to cringe and crawl and grovel and tremble with fear when threatened with political reprisal by selfish groups seeking to use the machinenry of the United States Government to further their own private interests.

When I first ran for Congress in 1930, I made one campaign promise, and only one, which I now quote:

"I will not pledge my sup-port blindfolded to any unknown measures, to any person, on any subject, but will use my best judgment and discretion after careful study and consideration, and vote for such measures as I believe to be in the interest of the welfare of our country of the welfare of our country and in conformity with the wishes of my constituents." I have faithfully performed the pledge. I repeat it to you now. If re-elected to Congress, I shall continue to pursue that policy.
