Diagnostic X-Ray Clinic Will be Held In Manassas Nov. 9

Tuberculosis continues to be a major public health problem. The control of it depends basically upon early diagnosis of the positive case, thereby lessening the possibility of "open" cases who are responsible for the spread of the disease. The x-ray examination is an important diagnostic facility in the case-finding program. It, therefore, becomes evident that where tuberculosis is suspected or an "open" case is known in a family group, every member should be examined and x-rayed.

During the week of November 9 in Prince William-Stafford Health Office, at Manassas, Virginia, a diagnostic x-ray clinic for tuberculosis will be conducted by a specialist of the State Department of Health. This activity is under the auspices of the County Health Department and in cooperation with the medical profession of the county. The examination and testing is a free service, but there is a charge for the chest x-rays, the maximum cost being two dollars (\$2.00) per person.

A written request for these examinations must be obtained from your doctor. Also, a written request is necessary from the parents for children whom they wish to be tuberculin tested.

Apply to your local county nurse for a clinic appointment well in advance of the clinic. Only a limited number of persons may be examined and x-rayed in these clinics, hence appointments made prior to the clinic date are imperative to obtain this service.

Patients will not be admitted to the clinic Thursday or Friday afternoons. The clinician conducting the clinic is always available, especially Thursday afternoon and by appointment for consultation with the local physician regarding their patients.

Frank Emanuel Jones Succumbs at Fairfax After Long Illness

The entire community of Fairfax was saddened by the death of Mr. Frank Emanuel Jones on Tuesday, October 6, 1942 after a long illness. The deceased, who was sixty-four years of age, was the son of the late Emmanuel H. and Ellie S. Jones, and lifelong resident of Fairfax and vicinity. For many years he was engaged in the nursery and orchard business.

He was married in his early manhood to Miss Byrd Dunn, and to this union was born one son, Franklin Weir. Besides his son, Mr. Jones is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Walter Fischer of Falls Church, and Mrs. Oden Hutchinson of Chantilly, and four brothers, Henry, Howard, and Clinton of Fairfax and Dr. Ben Jones of Greenville, S. C.

Mr. Jones was a member of the Jerusalem Baptist Church, and the life he lived bore testimony of a strong Christian character. He was a devoted father, and a good neighbor. The large gathering at the funeral and the beautiful floral tributes gave evidence of the high esteem in which he was held.

Funeral services were held at Groff's Funeral Home in Fairfax, Wednesday morning with the Rev. Marshall Whitehurst, pastor of the Fairfax Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Dunnsville, Essex County.

Red Cross Making Kits For Men Now In Service Abroad

The material for making these kits is being furnished by Red Cross Headquarters and the Prince William County Chapter is centralizing the purchasing of the contents for these kits. Each group or individual interested in helping may reimburse the Chapter for its part of the expense.

CITIZENS URGED TO AID IN BLOOD DONATIONS

One hundred and thirty-five men and women volunteers are being sought by the Prince William County Chapter of the American Red Cross, to give one pint of their blood to make plasma, when the Mobile Unit for blood donors visits Prince William County, on November 10.

The Mobile Unit will be operated in the Parish House of the Episcopal Church (next door to the Post Office) between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m.; where hospital rooms will be set up. Doctors, nurses and technicians will be in charge, and donors will be given a careful check-up, and only those in good physical condition asked to contribute. Donors must be between 21 years and 60 years—those under 21 years may donate with consent of the parents.

The process of "donating blood" is simple, painless and harmless. The whole process, including a ten minute rest period and light refreshments, taking under 30 minutes.

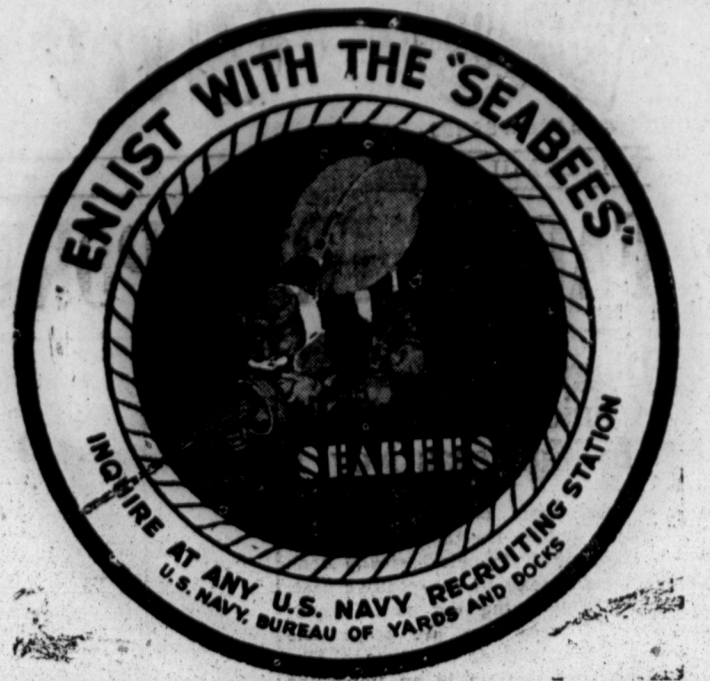

IN RE: ORDINANCE-UNLAWFUL SALE OF BEER AND WINE OR BEER OR WINE ON SUNDAY

Be it resolved that we hereby order that it shall be unlawful to sell beer and wine or beer or wine, any where in Prince William County, Virginia, exclusive of incorporated municipalities located in Prince William County, Virginia, between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight of each Saturday and 6 A. M. of each Monday. Anyone who shall be convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 for the first offense hereunder, and all subsequent convictions hereunder of any person shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisoned in the Prince William County, Virginia, jail for a period of not more than thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the jury or the Court trying the case without a jury.

It is further ordered that a certified copy of this order, certified to by the Clerk of this Board, upon the adoption of said order, be transmitted to the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board and that this order be published for two successive weeks upon its adoption in the Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in the Town of Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia.

This order shall become effective on December 1, 1942.

Sift flour and measure. Heat milk. Place sugar, shortening, and salt in large bowl; add hot milk; stir until shortening is melted; cool to lukewarm, about 15 minutes. Add crumbled yeast; mix well. Add flour; stir until dough leaves sides of bowl. Cover bowl with damp cloth; let rise in warm place until light and double in bulk, about 2 hours. Punch down. Place on lightly floured board; knead until dough is smooth. Mold into desired shapes. Place on greased baking pan. Cover with damp cloth. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 30 minutes. Brush with glaze mixture of 1 part sugar and 2 parts milk. Bake in moderately hot oven (425° F.) 15 minutes, or until done. Makes about 3 dozen rolls.

WIRED WIRELESS TO THE RESCUE

Civilian Defense workers,

particularly in rural areas are intensely interested in announcements from Washington that there are definite possibilities of solving the difficult problem of communicating lackout signals through the use of "wired wireless".

This new method of communication, developed by Mr. Perry Wrightman, of Prince George County Maryland, uses the wires of electric power for transmission of radio messages in a manner which does not interfere in any way with the power current. Thus, when air-raid alarms take the regular radio announcements off the air communications may still come through to defense workers having the rather inexpensive equipment necessary for its reception.

While such a new idea naturally must be viewed rather conservatively, and although it may develop weaknesses not now apparent, and while still further it may be found impracticable to get even the relatively simple equipment necessary on account of war priorities, still we believe they have something here well worth being given substantial trial.

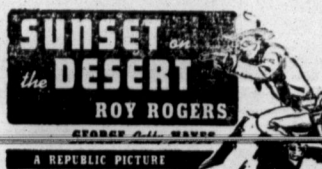

M. of each Monday. Anyone who shall be convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 for the first offense hereunder, and all subsequent convictions hereunder of any person shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisoned in the Prince William County, Virginia, jail for a period of not more than thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the jury or the Court trying the case without a jury.

It is further ordered that a certified copy of this order, certified to by the Clerk of this Board, upon the adoption of said order, be transmitted to the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board and that this order be published for two successive weeks upon its adoption in the Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in the Town of Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia.

This order shall become effective on December 1, 1942.

In re: an ordinance establishing closing hours for dispensers of alcoholic beverages on week ends.

Be it resolved that we hereby order that it shall be unlawful to sell beer and wine or beer or wine, anywhere in the corporate limits of the town of Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia, between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight of each Saturday and 6 o'clock A. M. of each Monday. Anyone who shall be convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 for the first offense thereunder, and all subsequent convictions hereunder of any person shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisonment for a period of not more than thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the court trying the case.

It is further ordered that a certified copy of this order, certified to by the clerk of this Town Council, upon the adoption of said order, be transmitted to the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board and that this order be published for two successive weeks in the Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in the Town of Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia.

This order shall become effective on December 1, 1942.

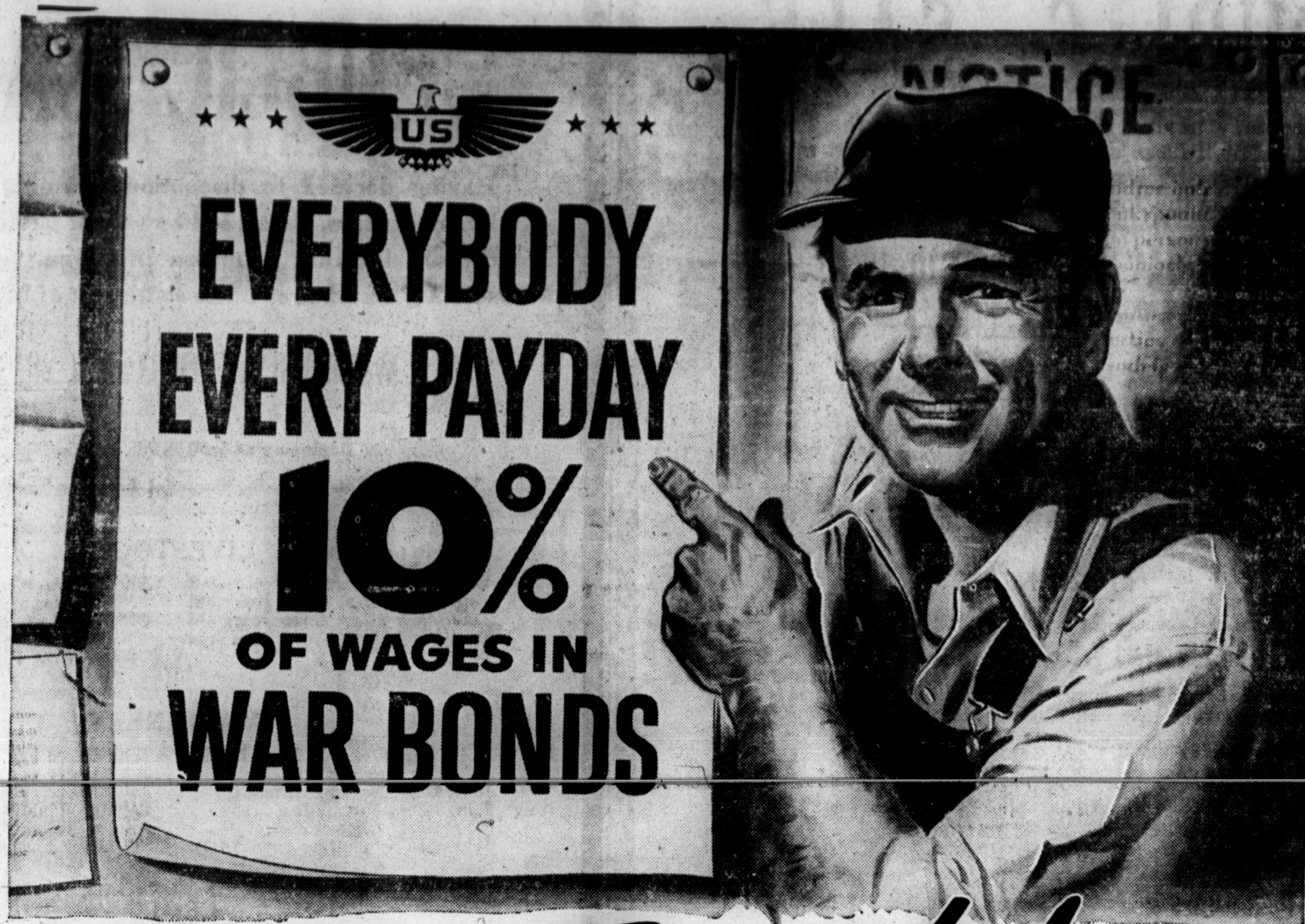
