Seal Sale Campaign Will Open Monday

The thirty-sixth annual Tuberculosis Christmas Seal Sale will be launched Monday, November 23rd, with hundreds of volunteer workers representing all city and county associations and committees affiliated with the Virginia Tuberculosis Association, cooperating to raise the 1942 goal of \$214,420 to continue the year-around program of controlling and eradicating tuberculosis in this State.

In Prince William County, six District Chairmen of the County T. B. Association under the direction of Frank D. Cox, are mobilizing for the campaign to meet the quota of \$1,223 assigned this county. Chairmen of the various districts are: Mrs. George R. Lee Turberville, Manassas; Mrs. Benjamin Brown, Brentsville; Mrs. Eva Garner, Occoquan; W. Y. Ellicott, Coles; Mrs. J. F. McInteer, Dumfries; Mrs. Holmes Robertson, Gainesville; Dr. John D. Williams, Negro Auxiliary, Manassas, and Miss Sue Ayres, school seal sale chairman.

The Rev. John DeChant, president, and Mrs. Marshall Haydon, secretary of the organization, are assisting with the drive.

Through the sale of Christmas seals and bonds representing contributions the local organization is striving to raise the largest amount of money the association has every penny is needed to carry on the expanded work planned in an intensive effort to prevent a widespread and material wartime rise in tuberculosis. Income from the Seal Sale is the sole support of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 1,700 affiliated associations, of which the Virginia organization is one. Ninety-five percent of the income from the Seal Sale remains in the State, and 5 percent of it goes to the National Association, while approximately 75 percent of the Seal Sale totals in Prince William are retained here for work in the county. Every citizen is urged to join in this battle against the scourge of tuberculosis, by adding a little bit to the funds being solicited to continue the activities of the local unit, and to aid with Nation-wide control of tuberculosis. Our National Defense Health program depends upon our united cooperation—our Country's welfare depends upon the health of our people.

Do Your Christmas Mailing Early

The following is published by special request of the postmaster:

The Post Office Department now is starting the most gigantic task in its history—the movement of a deluge of Christmas parcels, cards and letters while maintaining the regular flow of millions of pieces of mail daily to and from our armed forces all over the world.

Indications are that the volume of Christmas mail will be the largest on record. Already in September, latest month for which figures are available, retail sales had reached a level second only to the record month of December, 1941, according to the Department of Commerce. And sales are rising. Such heavy purchases always presage heavy mailings.

If thousands of our soldiers, sailors, marines and civilian friends are not to be disappointed at Christmas time, the public must cooperate by mailing earlier than ever before and by addressing letters and parcels properly. The best efforts of the Post Office Department alone cannot be enough, in view of wartime difficulties faced by the postal system. The public must assist.

About 25,000 experienced postal workers already have been taken by the war services. Arrangements are under way to add thousands of temporary personnel to postal staffs, but this man power is hard to find and is inexperienced. Facilities of railroads and air lines are heavily taxed by movements of huge quantities of war materials and personnel. Extra trucks are almost impossible to obtain. Winter weather, hampering transportation, is beginning.

The free-mailing privilege granted to members of the armed forces has raised their mailings some 30 percent, it is estimated. Expansion of those forces also is adding rapidly to the postal burden.

The deadline already is past for mailing gifts to Army and Navy personnel overseas with assurance that the parcels will arrive by Christmas. The New York post office reports that in late October, 350,000 such parcels were handled daily in that office alone.

The Post Office Department is making strenuous efforts to avoid such a terrific jam as it faced in 1918 under similar conditions, during the First World War. It can succeed in those efforts—and avoid many heartaches for its patrons—if the public will cooperate by mailing early.

Another Honor Comes To Prince William

Since the publication of the letter from Great Lakes Naval Training station last week, the Journal has been unofficially advised by the Navy Department that Manassas has, along with another Virginia town, the highest rating in the United States in point of the ratings being acquired and the intellectual tests being passed by the colored youth of the town who have entered the Navy.

HON. GEORGE W. HERRING MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT

George W. Herring, who formerly represented Prince William in the General Assembly, this morning made his formal announcement as candidate for the State Senate, subject to the 1943 August Primary.

In part, Mr. Herring said: "Since the unofficial announcement was printed in the Journal several weeks ago, I have had many others, who were not previously aware of the fact that I was considering the Senate nomination, come to me and pledge their earnest support and cooperation."

"I have, therefore, definitely decided to make this announcement."

"This is a serious time and we should pick our legislators with a view to their experience and practiced ability. In the four years that I had the honor to serve Prince William, every phase of legislative work became thoroughly familiar to me."

"In my daily contacts with the business world, I learn and feel the needs of the people as they arise. After a lifetime spent in an agricultural area, I also know what those folks want, and they, too, shall have my constant attention if I have the honor to represent them."

"Prince William has not had a man in the State Senate chamber for a half century. It would be only fair to send a Prince William man this time."

"I am in thorough sympathy and accord with the aims and ideals of our splendid governor, and shall be able to assist in promoting his program if I am elected."

"During the months to come I hope to see as many of the folks in the senatorial district as possible, and I use this present announcement to urge that they give me their support in the coming Primary."

Red Cross Notes

At the November meeting of the Executive Board of Prince William Chapter, American Red Cross, Mrs. Delancy as chairman of the Blood Donor Clinic recently held at the Parish Hall, Manassas, reported 85 pints of blood were received by the mobile unit. Arrangements are now being completed for the Clinic to be held in this county in January, March and April 1943. The January Clinic will be in another District of Prince William, the exact location to be later announced.

Mr. Lyles from National Headquarters, was present at this meeting to explain the details of the agreement. Headquarters is desirous of this Chapter signing, which definitely places the responsibility and activities upon the local Red Cross Chapter and the local Welfare Board in event of war or other disasters, the care of the injured, shelters etc., and the Civilian Defense Association with their already established and functioning agencies. In other words the practical use of the available organizations in event of need in war and peace at a moments notice. Mrs. Lloyd as Chapter Chairman was instructed to sign this agreement. Headquarters will plan for A-One-Day-Disaster-Institute, in early January, to further co-ordinate the local war activities in this County under Red Cross leadership.

The Annual Roll Call will be combined with the War Fund, therefore the usual November Roll Call is postponed until March 1943, and County members of the Red Cross are asked to set aside their usual donations heretofore made in November, and have their subscriptions ready for the March drive.

All honor to the stalwart men in the Senate who are standing with their backs to the wall to prevent passage of the poll tax bill.

The South has been the most loyal supporter of our war effort and it is unbecoming, to say the least, that our section should right now be subjected to the same kind of political invasion attempted a generation ago.

If the Democratic Party is threatened with a split on this issue we would say that it is time to split wide open and make new political alignments which will safeguard our local institutions both now and after the war.

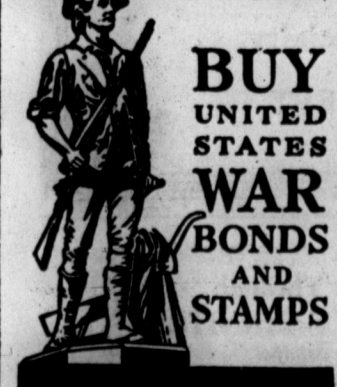

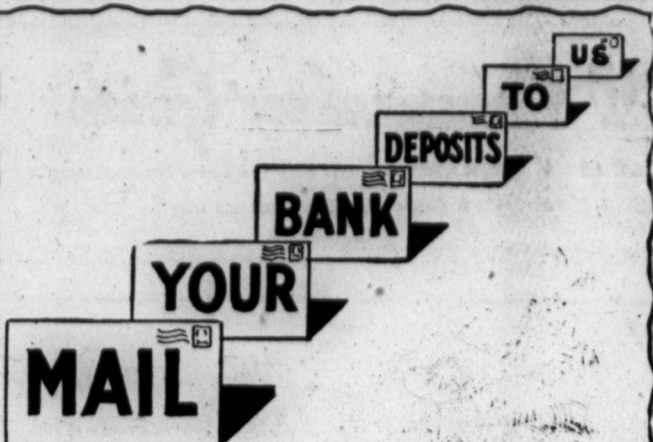

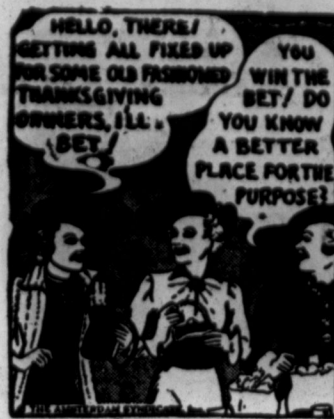

VON HINDENBURG'S PROPHECY

How many remember the prophecy of Von Hindenburg, which was made shortly after the close of the first World War? No doubt very few, for at that time the world was weary of bloodshed, and besides, had they not just fought a war to make democracy safe, and to end all wars, and anything in regard to a prophecy of a future war, well that was just plain foolishness? This being the attitude of the world at that time, it is no wonder that the words of Von Hindenburg should fall on deaf ears and be soon forgotten, yet in view of present events in North Africa, it is well to recall his words, and realize that this military strategist could see far better into the future than we can.

His prophecy was this; that twenty of twenty-five years later (that is, dating from the close of the first World War), Germany would again be engaged against certain allied nations, and that she should meet with her defeat in Northern Africa.

In view of the fact that Rommel has had to flee in North Africa before British forces, and that American forces, have just landed in this part of the world; it is certain that some thing interesting is shaping up. So far, this looks an off shoot of what we suppose will be the main battle field, but it will be interesting to watch and see how nearly true the words of Von Hindenburg will be.

I Like This Book

One of a series of book reviews by students of Osbourne High School Manassas—Session 1942-43—in competition for the W. C. Wagener Memorial Prize.

JANICE MEREDITH

Paul Leicester Ford's Justice Meredith was published by Grosset & Dunlap in 1899. The book is dedicated to George W. Vanderbilt, who was a close friend of Mr. Ford's.

Paul Ford was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., in 1835. A great many of his works were historical and biographical, but he did write a number of novels. In a dispute over financial matters he was shot and killed by his brother, Malcolm, May 8, 1902. The brother later committed suicide.

Janice Meredith is written about the American Revolution. It gives the view points of both armies during the war.

Mr. Meredith was governor of Brunswick, on the outskirts of which was his home, Greenwood. During the time of the war, Greenwood was used as the headquarters of both armies. Mr. Meredith was a true Englishman, and wholly for the English cause.

The hero becomes known to us as Charles Fownes in the beginning of the story, but later revealed his identity as Jack Brereton. He is a bond-servant purchased by Mr. Meredith and when the Revolution began, he left the Merediths to become George Washington's aide. Despite the fact that he sent to his former owner the money for his bond, Mr. Meredith still claimed him a run-away servant.

The heroine, Janice Meredith, really believes in the Americans, but she is little able to help them because of her father. Through her many suitors, who are members of both armies, her family is often helped. She, finally, realizes she is in love with the run-away bond-servant, Charles Fownes, but she has been promised by her father to marry Philemon Hennion, a neighbor.

You must read this interesting and educational book to find how Janice defiantly helps the Americans, how she is helped by both armies, how she evades her suitors, how her family is separated, and finally of how the story ends.

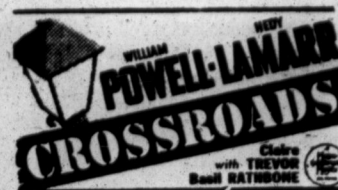

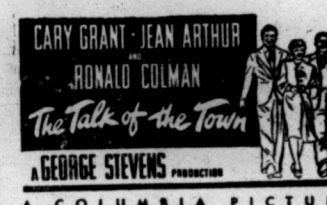

that it shall be unlawful to sell beer
and wine or beer or wine, anywhere
in Prince William County, Virginia,
exclusive of incorporated municipali-
ties located in Prince William County,
Virginia, between the hours of 12
o'clock midnight of each Saturday
and 6 a. m. of the following Monday.
Anyone who shall be convicted of
violating the provisions of this ordi-
nance shall be punished by a fine of
not more than \$50.00 for the first
offense hereunder, and all subsequent
convictions hereunder of any person
shall be punished by a fine of not
more than \$50.00 or imprisoned in
the Prince William County, Virginia,
jail for a period of not more than
thirty days, or both, in the discretion
of the Trial Justice or the Court try-
ing the case with or without a jury.

It is further ordered that a certi-
fied copy of this order, certified to by
the Clerk of this Board, upon the
adoption of said order, be transmitted
to the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage
Control Board and that this order be
published for two successive weeks
upon its adoption in the Manassas
Journal, a newspaper published in the
Town of Manassas, Prince William
County, Virginia.

This order shall become effective on
December 1, 1942.

RE: COMPENSATION OF SPECIAL OFFICER.

It appearing to the Board of Supervisors of Prince William County, Virginia, that by resolution duly passed at the regular meeting of the Board held on Friday, September 10, 1942, the sum of \$150.00 per month was appropriated out of the General County Fund, to be appointed by the Judge of the Circuit Court of Prince William County, Virginia at the October, 1942, Term of said Court.

It further appearing to said Board that on September 12, 1942 the Judge of the Circuit Court of Prince William County, Virginia, in recess, did appoint Wren Causi Hurt as such Special Officer and that the said Wren Causi Hurt did qualify as said Special Officer on the 12th day of September 1942 before the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Prince William County, Virginia and did enter into bond with good and sufficient security for the faithful performance of his duties in the penalty of \$1000.00.

Whereas, it appearing to the Board that no provision has been made to compensate said Special Officer for the period from the 12th day of September, 1942 to the date of the convening of the October 1942, Term of the Circuit Court of Prince William County, Virginia.

Be it resolved that the Treasurer of said County do pay to the said Wren Causi Hurt out of the general county fund the sum of \$120.00 Warrant drawn by order of the Board of Supervisors of said County, to compensate him in full for his services as Special Officer for Prince William County, Virginia, for the period for the 12th day of September, 1942 to the date of the convening of the October, 1942, Term of the Circuit Court of Prince William County, Virginia.

IN RE: ORDINANCE-UNLAWFUL SALE OF BEER AND WINE OR BEER OR WINE ON SUNDAY.

Be it resolved that we hereby order that it shall be unlawful to sell beer and wine or beer or wine, anywhere in Prince William County, Virginia, exclusive of incorporated municipalities located in Prince William County, Virginia, between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight of each Saturday and 6 A. M. of the following Monday. Anyone who shall be convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 for the first offense hereunder, and all subsequent convictions hereunder of any person shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisoned in the Prince William County, Virginia, jail or a period of not more than thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the Trial Justice or the Court trying the case with or without a jury.

It is further ordered that a certified copy of this order, certified to by the Clerk of this Board, upon the adoption of said order, be transmitted to the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board and that this order be published for two successive weeks upon its adoption in the Manassas Journal, a newspaper published in the Town of Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia.

This order shall become effective on December 1, 1942.
