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## County Schools Short Twelve Teachers For School Opening

### Occoquan District School Hardest Hit By Shortage

Twelve vacancies in teaching positions may mar the September 6 school opening of Prince William County Schools. One hundred and five teachers have been signed so far, including 26 new teachers, Jacob Garber, school superintendent, reported Wednesday.

Hardest hit school is Occoquan District High and Elementary School which has four vacancies to fill, while Osbourn and Gainesville District Elementary each need three more teachers to complete their rosters.

Garber urged that experienced teachers be assigned to the four vacancies in Occoquan District High and Elementary School. He also urged parents to register pre-school children entering the first grade immediately. Birth certificates must accompany registration, and children must obtain a physical and vaccination certificate before school opens.

Garber requested that all high school students should check with their own school concerning registration and schedule if they did not do so last spring. This should be done before school opens.

## Manassas Firemen Capture Four Prizes At Convention

Manassas firemen took one first and three second places in contests at the State Firemen's convention at Luray last week. The local group, competing against at least eight other companies in each event, entered in only the four events.

Fred Dowell, Stewart Vetter, Jimmie Rice and Jim Robinson won first place in the four-man hose contests. (See picture on this page).

In other events, Stewart Vetter finished second in the hundred-yard dash while Manassas took second place in the four-man ladder contest, losing to West Point. Fred Dowell set a new record for the one-man hose contest, but still finished only second. C. E. Carlton of West Point won the event in 12.2 seconds while Dowell was tied for second at 12.3 seconds. In the run-off for second and third places, Dowell completed the event in 11.1 seconds, believed by state headquarters to be a new record.

### Local Farmers Tour Pasture Center Friday

Because of a conflict with another meeting, the time for the tour of Prince William County farmers to the Middleburg Pasture and Forage Research Station has been changed to Friday, August 17. The group will assemble at the Community Center in Middleburg and proceed from there to the experimental farm promptly at 1:00 p.m., E.S.T.

The various experimental plots and fields will be visited and the results of the tests will be explained by Dr. Roy Blaser, Dr. Willis Skurda and Mr. Timothy Taylor. Results at the Middleburg Experiment Station are for the most part measured by the actual meat or milk production obtained on the different plots and fields.

The tour is being sponsored by the Prince William County Pasture Committee which is made up of Dr. Grover F. Brown, Ch. L. W. Huff, and Philip B. Reading, Brentsville District; John M. Piercy, Jr., Dr. J. R. Aldred and Gordon W. M. Pattie, Gainesville District; W. M. Johnson, C. C. Lynn and John Barrett, Manassas District; J. Alan Staples, J. L. Oato and L. D. Utterback, Cokesville District; Egbert W. Thompson, Jr., Gilmer Garber and G. C. Russell, Occoquan District.

The pastures of approximately 80 members of the Prince William County Pasture Club are now being scored by the County Veterans Agricultural Class. Recognition will be given to the two farms in each district and to the three farms in the county having the best pasture programs under way in 1951.

Weight Estimating Contest: A prize of \$25.00 will be awarded.

Door Prizes Nightly: Valuable door prizes will be awarded each night, including 10 lbs. of beef, consisting of a 6 lb. roast and 4 lbs. steak; 2½ bushel seed corn, and the grand prize, an automatic dish washer, to be given away Saturday night.

Friday: Judging of dairy cattle and beef cattle, open classes, will begin at 9 a.m. This will be followed by the judging of beef and dairy cattle in the 4-H and FFA classes at 2 p.m.

Saturday: Saturday judging schedule has been announced as follows: 9 a.m., 4-H and FFA, fitting and showing; 10 a.m., selection of champions, all classes; 2 p.m., 4-H and FFA judging contests.

All exhibits will be kept on the grounds until 11 p.m. Saturday.

The second annual exposition of the Prince William County Fair will get under way at Longview Park Speedway next Thursday, August 23rd, and continue for three days and nights through Saturday, August 25th.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the fair and officials state that every effort has been put forth to make it "bigger and better than ever." More exhibits are indicated than last year and a varied program of entertainment to assure fun and merriment for the thousands expected to attend.

Although the fair does not officially open until Thursday, the midway will be open and commercial exhibits on display Wednesday night, August 22, when admission will be free.

All exhibits must be in place by 11 a.m. Thursday. Entries are now being received by the association and should be mailed to William R. Young, RFD 1, Manassas.

First judging of exhibits will take place Thursday at 2 p.m., with the judging of farm produce, home-makers exhibits, poultry, rabbits and flowers.

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### Yorkshire Man Charged With Setting Fire

Mrs. Lloyd Linthicum of Yorkshire Lane, Yorkshire, has signed a statement charging Paul Bostic of Yorkshire with arson. Deputy Sheriff Shumate told the Journal Tuesday.

The charges grew out of an automobile fire Sunday evening at the Linthicum home. The Manassas Fire Department was called out to extinguish the blaze which destroyed the interior of the car.

According to Mrs. Linthicum's statement, Bostic poured five gallons of kerosene he had taken from the Linthicums, all over the interior of the car and then ignited it.

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### Fighting Hurts 3 Monday At Cornwelltown

Prince William County's version of the "Hatfield's and the McCoys" broke loose Monday evening. Three persons were injured in a fracas at Cornwell's home at Cornwelltown near Purcell's School House.

The injured are: Jesse Wheaton of Canova, Virginia; Kelly Bryant Cornwell, Cornwelltown, and Walter Marion Pearson.

According to the sheriff's office, the fighting began shortly after 6 p.m. Monday. Marion Pearson and Harry Cornwell were fighting and Pearson suffered a cut ear. Then both men jumped on Wheaton and cut his right eye, requiring "4 or 5 stitches."

Deputy Sheriff Shumate arrested Pearson and has a warrant for Harry Cornwell's arrest on "felonious assault" charges.

According to Shumate, while he was in the house talking to Harry Cornwell, Pearson jumped Virginia Kelly Bryant Cornwell and cut her hand. Later, at Justice of the Peace Austin Barber's home in Manassas, Pearson took a swing at the woman again and knocked her down.

Pearson has been also charged with "assault and battery" on Mrs. Cornwell as well as "felonious assault." He is being held in the county jail on \$500 bond pending trial.

Deputy Sheriff Joe Garner reported that he picked up Harry Cornwell Wednesday around 1 p.m. in front of the Court House where he was seeking a drivers permit for another person. Cornwell was arrested and charged with felonious assault and is being held in the county jail awaiting trial.

Occoquan, aided by the services of a newly acquired pitcher, dumped Triangle Sunday in the only A Division ball game Sunday. Ben Fuller, recently added to the Ocoquan roster in place of a drafted member, hurled three-hit ball as his teammates banged out an 8-1 victory.

L. Gilliam paced Ocoquan's 12-hit attack with a triple and single while J. K. Gilliam, Murphey and R. Gilliam banged out two hits apiece.

Shorty Reynolds spoiled a possible no hitter for Fuller in the sixth with a single. Dallas Posey and Watson also collected one hit apiece for Triangle.

The victory moves Ocoquan into a two-way tie with idle Bristersburg for fifth place.

# Manassas Cannery Proves of Great Service In This Area

There is no doubt that the Manassas Cannery has been of great service to the people in this area. Now in its sixth year of operation, it has helped in many ways in the conservation of food and a more sanitary canning process. Fruits and vegetables, that would otherwise go to waste, have been preserved by the growers, who are able to be sure of the cleanliness of their product. Also of benefit to the people is the low cost. A No. 2 can, which will hold one pint of any product, is obtainable for only a nickel, and a No. 3 or quart can may be purchased for six cents.

As an example of a typical day at the Manassas Cannery, let's say that you are canning peaches. First of all, you must have your fruit at the cannery anywhere between eight a. m. and twelve noon and must have finished for the day by three p. m. Upon entering, you register with Mrs. R. R. Fishpaw, one of the instructors, giving her your name and the name of the article you wish to can, and she in turn gives you a number to be placed on all of your canned goods for the rest of the season.

To can the peaches, you must first scald, peel and halve them. They are then placed in their container and the syrup, which has previously been made to your own taste, is poured over the fruit. After this has been completed, and it does take a little time, the peaches are immersed in a hot water vat and the water is tested at intervals with a large thermometer until it reaches the temperature of 160 degrees F. Your peaches are then ready to be sealed by an automatic machine. But wait, you haven't finished yet. The sealed peaches must be processed in another hot water vat, taking twenty-five minutes for a No. 2 can and thirty-five minutes for a No. 3 can. After this is over, and you have dipped the cans in cold water, they are ready to be taken home. And there you have your own canned goods, already for a big meal.

The reactions, of the two people interviewed, toward the cannery were quite interesting. Frank G. Sigman, of Manassas, who was canning apple sauce at the time, said that he has made use of the facilities a number of times during the season, and has found that it is a great help to the citizens of Manassas and the surrounding communities. He also wished mentioned the friendly attitude taken by all of the people in helping others.

Bert Rollins, of Bristow, declared that it was much cooler than working at home and also much faster. He said that besides the peaches he was then busy canning, he had used this process before, for string beans, apple sauce, plums and tomatoes.

In this area, besides Manassas, there are canneries in Nokesville and Occoquan, which are three of the best equipped in the State. Also distributed around Northern Virginia are twenty-four others in operation.

R. R. Fishpaw, supervisor, stated

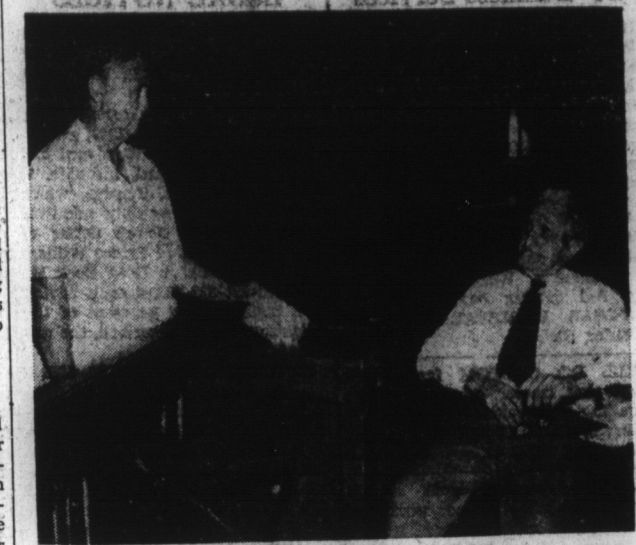
