




Interesting Experiment Made at Cornell Station.

Wet-Mash Powdered Milk Ration Gave The Best Result With Chicks in Weight, Rapid Growth and Their Development

Seven flocks of 110 chicks each. were made the subject of a feeding experiment lasting six weeks, by the Cornell station. The purpose was to ascertain what feed produced the best gain at the least cost. The feeds were as follows:

Cracked Grain, Bran.-Wheat three parts (by weight), corn two, hulled oats one (finely cracked), kept before chicks at all times; bran fed in dish with cracked grain for first few days, afterward in separate dish: beef-scrap unmixed with other foods given from first feeding time. Grain fed in litter on as chicks could find it.




