Farm Implements and Machinery **Reduce Labor and Cost** of Production.

(C. A. Montgomery, County Demonstrat Agent'

The fundamental importance of all farm machinery is that it cuts the cost of growing crops. It returns larger profits for the farmer, lightens his work, increases his crop yields and makes farm life worth living,

Since labor is as scarce and expensive as it is, the question of farm management is being felt. We must take advantage of all modern machinery possible to increase our production and at the lowest cost.

Labor-saving farm implements have greatly increased the earning capacity of the individual farmer. Before these implements came generally into use it required four farms to feed one town family-now one farm feeds three families in town. And yet our methods of farming, in general. are very inefficient. Many of our farmers are working hard, bending their backs and callousing their hands with primitive hand tools, while they could achieve much greater results with less labor by the use of proper farm implements. 1.17

I shall not attempt to name the most important tool for the farmer. as no man can state just what farm implement each farmer should use; but let me urge every farmer to give much thought to the question of how he can utilize farm implements. to lift. him above the routine of drudgery, increase his earnings, cheapen his production, give him an opportunity to make more money and to enjoy life.

The hour has come when Young America may prove its patriotism. President Wilson, under authority of Congress, has issued an order difor his must recting that the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy be increased to eighty seven thousand, over six thousand men have enlisted since Congress recently authorized an increase but many men are needed to man the new ships and ships in reserve which are being fully commissioned for the emergency. "The Navy," says Secretary Daniels, "offers exceptional advantages to young men of stuff and ambition to serve in the first line for defense." Now is the time for the young men of America to show their mettle. The nation needs them.

On the strength and efficiency of our naval defence depends the safety of America. Let the young men of America heed the call.

### TEAM WORK FOR THE FLAG

Congress at the call of the President is to convene Monday to determine America's attitude toward Germany. While party lines are not forgotten, they are laid aside for the nonce by the people of America whose present interest is neither purely democratic nor purely republican, but simon-pure American.

One of the Independent Five, who are destined to wield the balance of power in the House of Representatives, has expressed the opinion that the democrats will have control. Some of our republican friends, perhaps on the strength of similar conviction, have declared themselves happy to give the House to the democrats, as the present situation is likely to involve the commission of many errors in policy, and the party in power will get the blame.

But Germany's open choice of America's enmity has virtually scattered party politics and the American people are looking forward to the team work of the elephant and the donkey under the guidon of the Stars and Stripes.

### GERMAN RUTHLESSNESS

The German government, in defiance of every principle of international relations, has exacted the price of American lives for American attempts to cross the blockade zona. The American Issue reminds us that when the Utah prohibition law becomes effective the traveler can go from ocean to ocean, 3,200 miles, without seeing a saloon. Traveling westward from the coast of Virginia, one may pursue the boozeless highway through North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, Utah, and Oregon.

Bob white is not exactly a song bird, perhaps, although his cheery whistle is music to the traveler on a lonely road. Without special regard for his musical ability, however, the Ohio legislature, in return for his service to the state in consuming great quantities of destructive insects, has decided that he shall be classed among the songsters and entitled, as such, to the protection of the law.

The United States has granted safe conduct across the country to the German diplomats who have been dismissed from China and are compelled to return to Germany by way of America. At last accounts four American consuls were being mysteriously held in Germany. There is no criticism of the action of the United States and by this time we assume is is unnecessary to expect more of the government at Berlin.

While the great majority of Virginia women apparently are indifferent to the advantages of equal suffrage, down in Charlotte county it is expected that a woman will be made division superintendent of schools. A prominent citizen of Charlotte county has written to the Attorney-General, advocating the election of Miss Mary Ambler, a teacher in the Charlotte High School-"I feel quite sure," he wrote, "that she would be acceptable to the people of this county and would make a most excellent superintendent." Whether a women may be appointed to this position under the state constitution is a question to be decided by the Attorney-General.

### WILSON AS A WAR PRESIDENT

Mr. Wilson in the past four years has proved himself one of our very greatest peace Presidents. From now until the end of our inevitable conflict with Germany he must reconcile himself to the fact that he will be a war President; that his paramount duty to the nation will be a successful prosecution of the war; that his success or failure as President in his second term will be judged by the standards of war. Mr. Wilson, like almost any other President in a like position, will have to force upon himself a difficult and painful transformation. He will have to uproot and cast aside many cherished objects; many noble plans and metives which would have been purposeful in peace but could be only paralyzing in war.
