

When we plow land too wet, getting the object of plowing, or we do not know. The object, in the real object, we must leave the texture and structure of the soil in position for growth. If plowed wet you get a puddled! condition which will not drain well in wet weather or hold moisture in dry weather. You not only injure the crop for one season, but the texture of the soil for many years, thus lowering the crop production.
