PROHIBITION DIRECTOR

Fairfax Man Receives Appointment Carrying Salary of \$4,500 a Year.

The appointment of Capt. S. R. Donohoe, of Fairfax, as federal prohibition commissioner for Virginia, has been announced by Daniel C. Roper, commissioner of internal revonne. The appointment carries a salary of \$4,500 a year. Capt. Donohoe will have the appointment of a number of assistants whose duty it will be to see that the prohibition law is carried out throughout the state. Capt. Donohoe was born February

1, 1851, in Loudeun county, is a former newspaperman and served as county treasurer and as a member of the Virginia state senate. On the death of Auditor Morton Marye in 1910, Capt? Donohoe was named to fill the unexpired term by Governor Mann, serving eighteen months. He declined to seek election to the office at the expiration of the term and later became a member of the tax commission named to revise the tax system of Virginia.





TOWN BAISES ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER RATE

Public Utilities Superinte Virtually Tenders Resignation to Council.

Consumers supplied by the municipal light and power plant face an increase in rates at the beginning of the coming month, the town council at its regular meeting on Monday night havmg authorized an advance to seventeen cents per kilowat hour, with \$2 DEALER IN ALL KINDS MARRLE instead of \$1.50 as the minimum monthly charge for lights, and an even more striking advance in the sest of STYLE BOOK OF THE electric power. The power rate to SEASON'S SHOE FASHIONS msumers of 600 kilowat hours or less per month will be raised from to ten cents per kilowat hour us fifty cents per horsepower and to nsumers using in excess of 600 kilwat hours per month the rate is ineased from three and a half to five

The new rates are effective Decem er I and will "remain in force so long the present production conditions The resolution adopted, aucorizing the advance, states that the present power and light rates were established in advance of the present increased costs of production and that the present income derived from power and light furnished by the town is deemed insufficient to meet the increased cost of labor, fuel and necessary supplies.

It was ordered that George L. Rosenberger, superintendent of public utilities, be charged with the regular rates for the privilege of using the electricity and water of the town. Mr. Rosenberger thereupon stated that this action would release him from further obligation under his contract with the town and that if his services were desired the council would have to enter into a new contract after De-

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
