**FIRST BOLT IN 52 YEARS**  
 For the first time in political history since 1868, when President Grant carried the state of Tennessee, what is known as the "Solid South" has been broken.

In the recent election, Tennessee, the same state that went republican fifty-two years ago, the same state whose legislature granted between twenty-three and twenty-six million women of the country the right to vote, was carried for Warren G. Harding, for President of the United States, the only state in the South to break away from the old party, and throw their support to the republicans.

It is very surprising, indeed, to democrats throughout the country. Although a number predicted the defeat of the democratic candidate, Governor James M. Cox, they had no idea that nearly every state in the Union, with the exception of the few Southern states, would be carried by Senator Harding. Democrats entertained hopes until the final election returns, that the vote of the women of the country, the majority of whom were thought to have been in favor of the League of Nations, would turn the tide of victory to the democratic party and Cox.

Although greatly disappointed, they accepted the results without complaint, the majority of them considering the election of Mr. Harding sufficient evidence to show that the people of the nation are not in favor of the League of Nations. They all agree that defeat isn't disgrace, and declare that during Mr. Harding's term, they will support him as true Americans should support the President of the United States.

Prince William county did her best to bring about the election of Governor Cox, as nearly every county in the state of Virginia did, and were hugely disappointed when the democratic candidate was defeated, but the Voice of the People had spoken, and "kicking" was useless.

Residents of Manassas arrived at the polls early Tuesday morning, men and women, and cast their ballot.

Approximately one hundred of our ladies were registered, and probably all of them voted. The final tabulation of the votes showed that Mr. Cox was leading Mr. Harding by one hundred and sixty-three votes, and where one hundred and one votes were cast for Harding here, only eighty-one were given to Brooks, the republican candidate for congress from the eighth congressional district, who was running in opposition to R. Walton Moore who received two hundred and ninety-six votes at the polls here.

**PUT MANASSAS ON THE MAP!**

Put Manassas on the map! Of course, our town is known by readers of history, but getting down to the business opportunities, industries, etc., it is necessary to organize a chamber of commerce, something that will encourage the establishment of business firms in Manassas, something that will draw tourists to this town to view the historic places in and nearby, something that will make people want to make Manassas their home, to really show them that the town of Manassas is not a "has been," but really exists and flourishes daily.

People speak of Manassas in connection with the Civil War, but when they are talking of towns in which there is a good business field or bright business prospects, it is never mentioned—Why? Because there is nothing to indicate that our town is such a place, and the only solution to a problem of this kind lies in a chamber of commerce, made up of business men, professional men, and all other men who are interested in the general welfare and prosperity of the town, men who believe Manassas is a splendid business place and would make an ideal manufacturing centre.

Business men, professional men, all men get together, organize a chamber of commerce, send out circulars giving the history of Manassas, the possibilities for one establishing himself in this town, etc. the result will be that Manassas will not only be on the map as far as history is concerned, but on the industrial map as well. Call a meeting of the citizens. Get busy.

While the law does not require the presence of members of the Board of Supervisors, the presence of any member of the board will be appreciated when their district is under review.

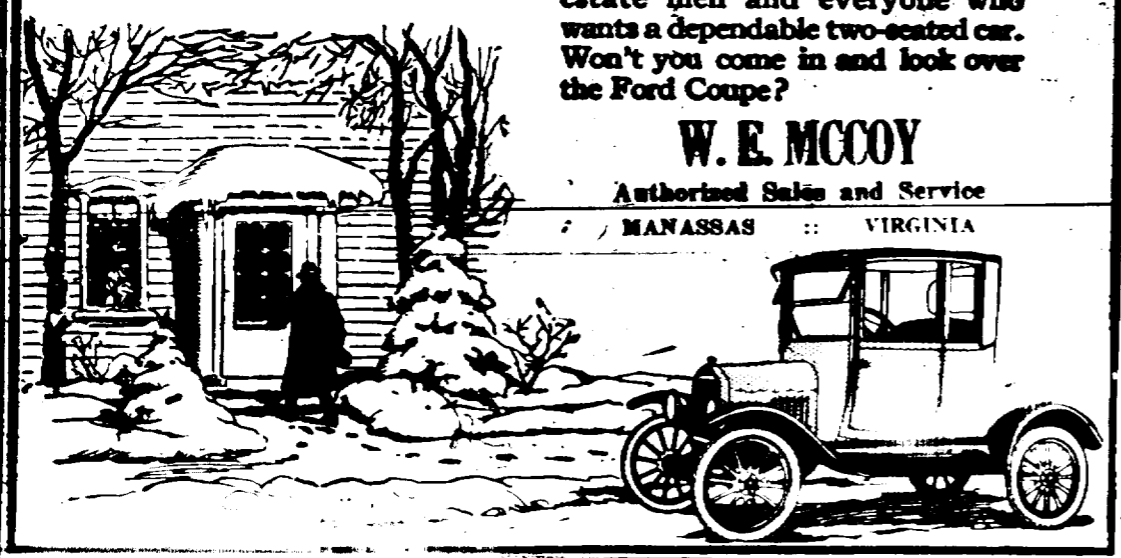
