The Manassas Agricultural Society holds an adjourned meeting at 6 o'clock on the evening of the 23rd of November, 1872, at the Vestry room of the Methodist Church, and has under consideration the question of Shade and Ornamental Trees, the various kinds, and the proper time for transplanting the same, to be discussed.

The writer of this article is informed that an effort is about to be made to induce the inhabitants of Manassas Village and those in the vicinity to set out shade trees along the line of all the streets and public highways in and around our village. Who will doubt the beneficial results of such a small outlay of capital as it would take to plant a row of trees on each side of the principal streets and public highways? Twenty-five dollars per hundred would be a fair estimate cost of transplanting good-sized forest trees. One hundred and twenty-five dollars would well and faithfully plant in and around our village five hundred trees. This small outlay a few years would add greatly to the beauty of our village as well as to the comfort of the inhabitants thereof; and as to the increased value of real estate, who doubts that this \$125 will be the very best investment the inhabitants of the village can make.
