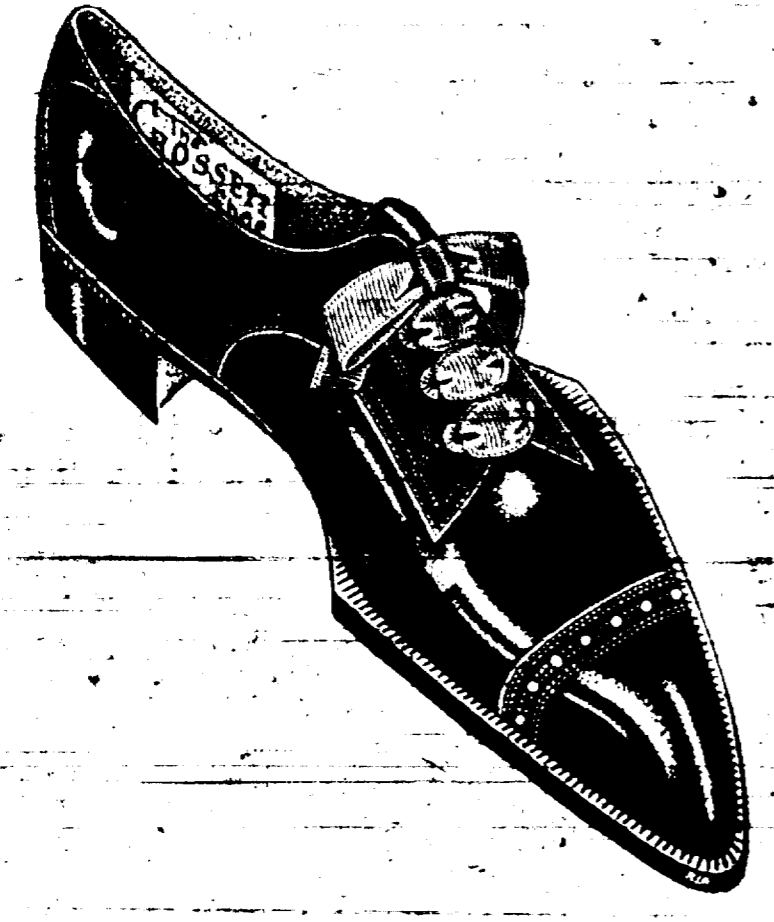

### A Memorable Charge.

M. J. Billmer in Baltimore Sun. I doubt that during the Civil War a cavalry charge that surpassed that of Col. (afterwards Maj. Gen.) J. E. B. Stuart's cavalry charge at First Manassas on July 21, 1861, by a portion of the First Virginia Cavalry.

Stuart led his command that day into the very heart of the Federal army. For boldness and audacity it surpassed anything the writer witnessed during the four years of the war. It was a forlorn hope, yet it seems, it saved the day for the Confederates.

On the morning of July 21, 1861, at sunrise, boots and saddles were sounded, the regiment was quickly mounted and drawn up in line. As we sat upon our horses we could hear the roar of the musketry and booming of the artillery warning us that the battle was on. Our gallant colonel, waiting for orders, chafed the delay, anxious to be ordered in. Courier after courier was sent to General Johnston for orders, but none came. Firing seemed to be getting nearer. At last a courier dashed up with orders. Stuart faced the regiment, told off five companies—H, B, I, K and F (Company K was known at that time as the Clark Cavalry). Stuart gave the command, "Forward march!" We moved out at a brisk trot and then at a gall op, following an old road, which led us to the left rear of the enemy. We were now in a heavy piece of timber. Here we halted a few moments, and were then counter-marched until we cleared the timber, then, turning to the right, made a bee-line for the Lewis house. Here everything was in confusion, our galls without weapons going to the rear claiming that our army had been cut to pieces. Stuart, at the head of the command, was leading us at a fearful rate. It seemed that the enemy was flanking Elzey's left and was pressing hard upon its lines! Reaching Elzey's left, Stuart wheeled his command, in column to the right by fours, rising in his stirrups, pointing to the enemy, gave the command in a voice that could be heard above the din of battle: "Draw sabers! Charge!" Quick as a flash, 250 sabers leaped from their scabbards and, like a thunderbolt, the head of the column dashed through the rank, hurling back and scattering their forces in confusion. It was a complete surprise to them, for they did not see us until the charging column was in their midst. The charge was short lived but terrible. A well-directed fire from the front at close range nearly annihilated Company H, commanded by Captain Carter. Then was witnessed a scene hard to describe. When the first company went down the halt was sudden that the man who could keep his saddle was most fortunate, as the enemy seemed to be firing upon us from almost every direction. The command was enveloped in a cloud of dust so thick that it was impossible to tell whether the man in front was friend or foe, as we were jammed in a narrow road. Horse rearing and plunging, riders and horses struggling to get to the rear; many of the men, having been unhorsed in danger of being trampled to death by their own men. Quicker than it takes to tell, the men leaped from the jam and were returned in a beat by Colonel Stuart ready for another charge but not anxious, as his force numbered not more than 100 men. It was then the General Early came upon the field with his brigade and led it to the left of General Elzey's forces. Colonel Stuart moved to the left of Early's brigade supported by Lieutenant Becknam's battery.

It is only of Colonel Stuart's charge and its effect in turning the tide of battle from defeat to victory of which I am to write. In the official reports fail to give him due credit for the service he rendered on that memorable day. I shall endeavor to show by short and meager reports by General J. E. Johnston Jackson and Early that the true story of the gallant charge by Col. J. E. B. Stuart at First Manassas has never been told.

General Johnston, in his report says: "The enemy on my left as I saw it, he was five times and was repulsed. Colonel Stuart, with his cavalry, contributed to one of these repulses by a well timed and vigorous charge on the enemy's right flank."

General Lee's own says: "Apprehensive lest my flanks should be turned, I sent orders to Stuart and Radford, of the Cavalry, to secure them. Colonel Stuart and that part of his command with him deserve great praise for the promptness with which they moved to the left and secured the flank by timely charging the enemy and driving him back."

General Early, in his narrative, writes: "When I came upon the field I found Colonel Stuart, with two companies of his cavalry and Lieutenant Becknam's battery of artillery (Stuart had five companies) upon General Elzey's left, holding the enemy in check until my timely arrival. But for his presence there I am of the opinion that my brigade would have been too late to be of any service, as by falling upon the left and rear of Elzey's brigade the battle would have ended before my brigade reached that point."

General Early adds: "Colonel Stuart did as much toward saving the battle of First Manassas as any subordinate who participated in it, and yet he never received any credit for it in the official report or otherwise. His own reports are very brief and indefinite. These reports prove beyond a doubt that Colonel Stuart's charge on General Elzey's left saved the day at First Manassas, though he never received the credit for it he so highly deserved."

EX-GOV. MONTAGUE ACCEPTS. Will Go To Pan-American Congress. Former Governor A. J. ### Spelling Reform.

From the Times Dispatch. We have received two circulars, a letter and an accompanying postcard from a group of persons who call themselves the Simplified Spelling Board, and who are now doing business at No. 1 Madison avenue, New York, with money supplied to them through the mistaken generosity of Andrew Carnegie, says Bookman. The letter, which addresses us as "Dear Sir or Madam," calls our attention to a list of 300 words given in one of the circulars. The Simplified Spelling Board would like to have us spell these 300 words in their way rather than in the way to which we have been accustomed. They say that to do this will lead to the advancement of commerce, the democratic ideals and of intellectual and political freedom. We should have not supposed that spelling 300 words in a queer way would do all that. Then they ask triumphantly, "Is it not a matter which appeals to common sense, patriotism and philanthropy?" We are afraid that we must answer "No" to this very naive question. The matter certainly does not appeal to common sense, because we already know how to spell these 300 words in a proper fashion, and we can't spend the time to memorize 300 freakish forms just to please a Simplified Spelling Board. Certainly our sense of patriotism would prevent us from encouraging anything which might lead to citizens to suppose that the United States is populated by cranks. As to philanthropy, we are not sure Mr. Carnegie's money as used by the Simplified Spelling Board is probably maintaining some worthy young men and women who are engaged in preparing the circulars and printing them to other citizens. But that fact affords no particular reason why we should accede to the appeal addressed to us as "Dear Sir or Madam."

Ministers were exhorted to take a lesson from the modern newspaper by Bishop Samuel Potts, in a sermon delivered at the evening session of the general council of the Reformed Episcopal Church, in Philadelphia yesterday. APPROVED MARCH 12, 1906.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, that no person shall spit, expectorate or deposit any spittle, saliva, mucus or any form of saliva or spittle upon the floor, stairway or upon any part of any theatre, public hall or building, or upon the floor or any part of any railroad car or street car or steam train, or upon the floor or any part of any car of interurban or suburban railway, or any other public conveyance in the State of Virginia; or upon any side walk abutting on any public street alley or lane of any town or city in the State of Virginia; and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or lessee of every theatre, public hall or building in the State of Virginia to provide every such theatre, public hall or building with a sufficient number of spittoons or cuspidors.

2. It is further provided that every railroad or steamboat company shall provide in each smoking compartment or smoking car when so requested as many cuspidors or spittoons as may be necessary for the convenience of passengers.

Senator Burton MUST GO TO JAIL

The U. S. Supreme Court Affirms His Sentence. WAS CONVICTED OF GRABBING. Washington, May 22.—The Supreme Court of the United States today affirmed the decision of the United States District Court at St. Louis, Mo., sentencing Senator Joseph R. Burton of Kansas to six months imprisonment in the jail of Iron county, Mo., and a fine of \$2500 and deprived of the right to hold office for one year.

The opinion was by Justice Harlan. All of the points made in Burton's appeal were overruled. The conviction was affirmed. Burton was charged with violating section 1782 of the revised statutes, which prohibits senators and representatives from receiving compensation for services rendered by any of the government departments in any matter in which the government may be interested.

It was contended on behalf of Senator Burton that the fee was paid on account of a criminal proceeding against one of the members of the Rialto company and not because of services rendered in the government prosecution of the company. The law under which he was prosecuted was also attacked.

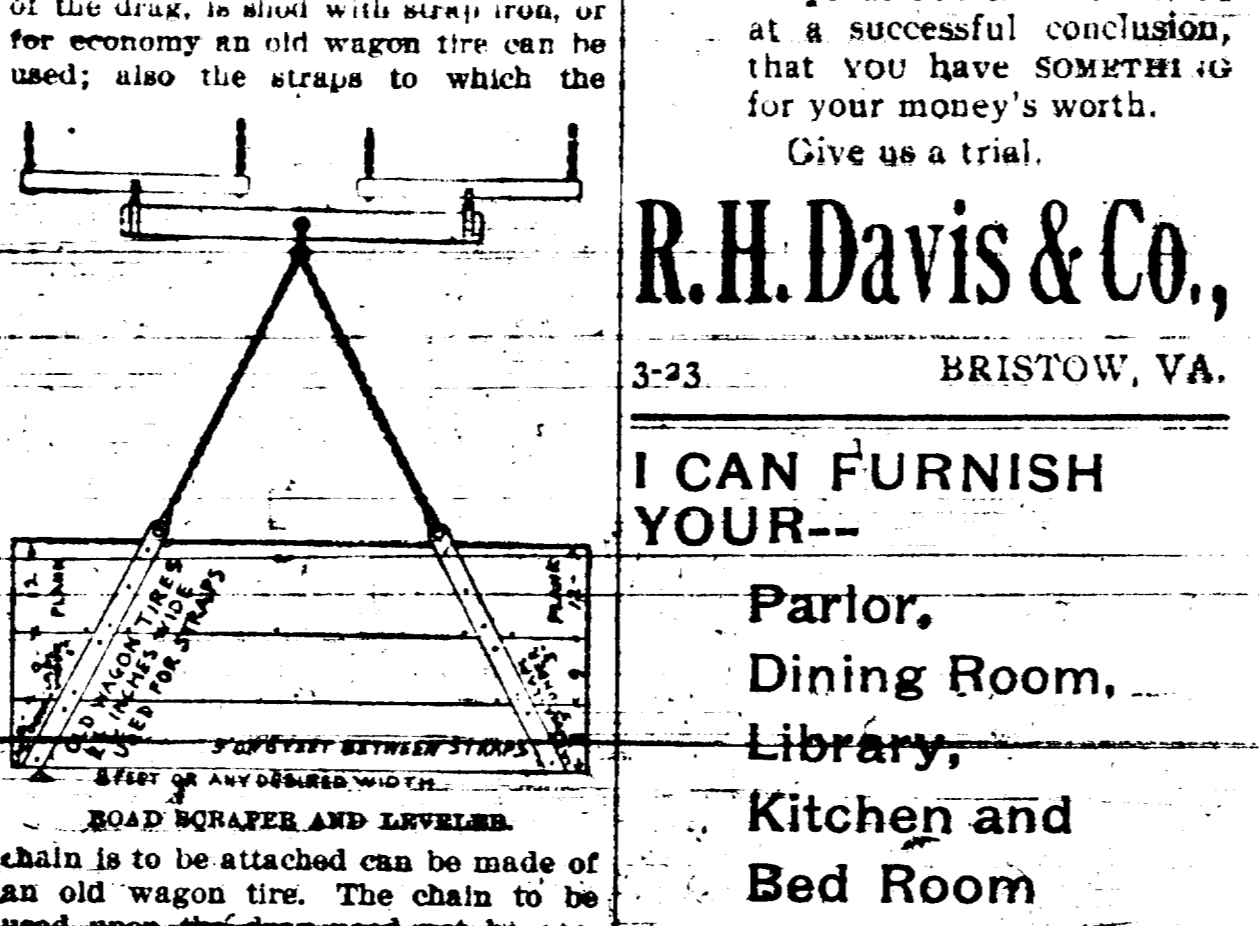
