MUTH KIDNAPPER
RUSHED TO JAIL

J. J. Keen Sentenced to Twenty
Years for the Crime.

HOW THE BOY WAS RECOVERED

Patentia June 10.—Twenty years of hard labor in prison, confinement in the Eastern penitentiary was the sentence pronounced on John Joseph Keen, the kidnapper of Little Freddie Math. The judgment of the man's crime was rendered this morning when the court started the offender of the law from due process. When he got his sentence he was given a couple of sets of new clothes and a place to stay over night.

He had not been warned since his abduction that his trial would be held, so this his jailer was much surprised from sleeping on the dirty floor of the house Keen never left him alone until he was asleep.

Not since the kidnapping of Charlie Ross has thus community been so wrought up by the commission of a criminal act. The newspapers in order to get the public in thinking the kidnapper was still at large, published misleading stories for the purpose of throwing Keen off his guard, in the letters which the kidnapper wrote to Mr. Math he threatened to kill the boy if his demands were not met. He demanded a magistrate and committed to cover without bail. The grand jury quickly found a true bill and at 12:30 p.m. he was in the criminal court awaiting his turn to face Judge Sulzberger. He pleaded guilty, and shortly after 12 o'clock the Judge passed sentence on the kidnapper for the great sum of \$1000 offered by the father of the boy was accepted by Keen, and as a test he sent a letter to Mr. Math requesting him to send \$200 to a certain address, the boy to be free to go home. An hour later came word from Mr. Math to place the money in the engine shed of an engineering operation in the center of the city. The police were on hand to arrest Keen if he should appear, but the letter was received so late that when the police arrived at the point Keen, it had been there had left. Word was sent to Mrs. Becker, of New Brunswick, if the money was forthcoming.

From the day of the kidnapping until the arrest Keen had kept the kidnapping secret, though he was known to the police. Nevertheless, the detective and police force of this city were conducting an extensive search and the authorities of other cities had been furnished with a description of the boy and his captor with instructions to keep a lookout for the first information that Keen and his captive had been in the vicinity in which the boy was eventually found, came from Joseph Sauer, a baker at 20th street and Hawarden avenue, who told a policeman last week that he had seen a man and boy answering the description of the pair in an oyster saloon at 60th Hawarden and 20th street, about 10 o'clock. Other details were supplied by Vale, who was immediately detailed upon the case and instructed to remain in that neighborhood until further orders. Vale immediately began a search of all the vacant houses in the neighborhood, and their search led him to the oyster saloon where the boy and the baker were located. However, that by means of a rear way Keen was able to elude the police by climbing into the back windows of two adjoining houses, which were also unoccupied. A second investigation resulted in the recovery of the boy and his captor at the saloon.

Later, when the police were finally able to apprehend the boy and his captor, they were taken to the police station, where they were interrogated. Keen, who was welcomed home by more than 100 persons, Mr. Math had gone to City Hall; and Mrs. Math, who had been ill during the entire time of the crime, rose from her bed to welcome her child. Despite efforts of relatives to detain her, she insisted upon waiting at the front door until the crowd had swelled to more than 1000 persons. Then she withdrew into the house, and shortly afterward a carriage with the boy and his father drove up to the door. The crowd followed into the house, and before his mother's waiting arms. The scene within the home was far more affecting than the meeting between father and son in the mayor's office, and while the mother was listening to the child's story the house was closed to all callers.

Later reports were submitted to the police, and the boy, who seemed too much dazed to give a connected story of his adventures, in answer to questions, the child said:

"The man took me in the car and then on another and put me in a house where there were many people. There was a door, and I could not open it. I was afraid to knock on the door." The man, who was identified as the kidnapper, appeared at headquarters with a complaint that John Joseph Keen had acted as a collector and had taken \$400. Specimens of his handwriting were shown to the police, and they were found to be identical with the signatures in the letters which the kidnapper had begun sending to Mr. Math.

Special Officers Clark and Vale again instituted a search of the vacant houses in their district, and they paid another visit to the dwellings of Keen and his wife. North of the residence of Vale, they found a thin figure of No. 42, who was Freddie Math, standing on the rear yard of No. 42. He called to him, saying: "Hello, Freddie."

Fredie said "Hello" and immediately hurried in to Vale's house. The next day he was taken to the police station, and he was questioned again. He was just in time to see Keen hurrying down the stairs. Drawing his revolver he fired at the fleeing man, but missed. He crawled through the window and followed, catching up with Keen as the latter was making for the front door. Keen again pointed his revolver at the boy, but missed. Keen had never seen him until Monday.

Keen had the boy tied up and the man who had been holding him was shot. The child in the meanwhile had followed the pair and reached the front door as the arrest was made. The kidnapper and his captive were hastened to the nearest police station and from there to a patrol wagon to the city jail.

**GOVERNOR OF OHIO
DIES SUDDENLY**

Joh M. Patterson succumbed to Long Illness.

THOUGHT TO BE RECOVERING

Cincinnati, June 18.—John M. Patterson, governor of Ohio, died at his residence in Milford, a suburb of the city. He had been ill for eight days, but there had been no report of any serious change during the day. The early news from his home was considered favorable, and the later announcement of his death came as a great shock to the governor's friends.

Not at any time a man of powerful parties, Governor Patterson based upon the responsibility of his wife, his health condition, the strain of the political campaign having so worn on him that a trip to the south was taken in November and December in the hope of regaining health. After the election in November it was said that he was suffering from malaria.

The governor, backed by the illness about the middle of the month, was brought to Cincinnati, spending several weeks in Christ hospital until the physicians thought him ready for a trip to his country home. Two weeks ago he seemed to have so far recovered his strength that no ill effects were noticed

from the trip to Milford, and a special electric car carried him with a short distance of his home in an ambulance taking him the rest of the way. Physicians expressed a cheerful view as to the outcome of his illness, but within a few hours he died.

John M. Patterson, born in Cincinnati, Ohio, on June 18, 1847, retained his home there during his entire life. For the last 15 years he has been president of the Union Central Life Insurance company. As a Democratic leader in the Senate he supported every movement for a more stringent observance of the Sabbath.

He was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and was a trustee as well as a member of Wesleyan University.

Andrew L. Harris, Republican, lieutenant governor, succeeded him as the man for which Padlock was elected in the last election. He was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and was a trustee as well as a member of Wesleyan University.

The boy, who lives in Fort Edward, said that he had been seized while on his way home by two young men, who, after breaking his neck, forced him suddenly across the rails, set fire to the boy, and then left him there to burn to death. The boy was taken to the river by the city detective and recovered.


She was taken to the police station and held over night. She was released on bail of \$1,000 and thrown into the child.
