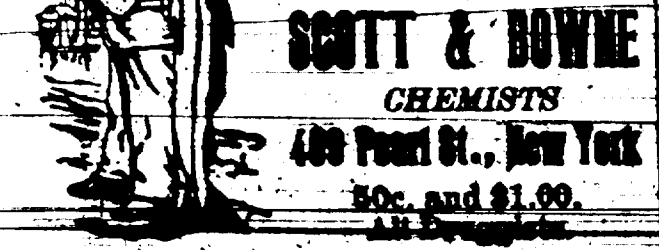

At a meeting of the county school board held at the courthouse at Manassas, November 3, 1906, there were present Dr. H. M. Clarkson, division superintendent, presiding, and Messrs. A. B. Carrington, Wm. T. Allen, Bantsville district; F. M. Elliott, L. M. Stone, Colles district; H. Howdenshell, Wm. H. Brown, Gainesville district; John L. Payne, J. T. Leachman, George C. Round, Manassas district, and M. C. Crouch, Occoquan district, trustees.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Round presented the following report: "The Prince William County School Board."

Your special committee on the Jones Legacy, begs leave to submit the following supplementary report:

The question presented is whether the said fund can in any way be used to better advantage than it now is being used, in carrying out the instructions of testator. It was suggested that it be used for the purchase of Normal Instruction, in order to furnish our schools with teachers thoroughly equipped. While this is a very important matter, a careful consideration of the needs of the children in the territory, one known as Dettingen Parish, led your committee to the conclusion that there is one necessity still greater and more impending, and that is the immediate future.

All of the school officers of the district directly interested seem to have been impressed that our children have been neglected. The school district has equipped a school house at Greenwich, Occoquan has just opened a school house and has just recently embarrassed the district board account the purchase of a school building. 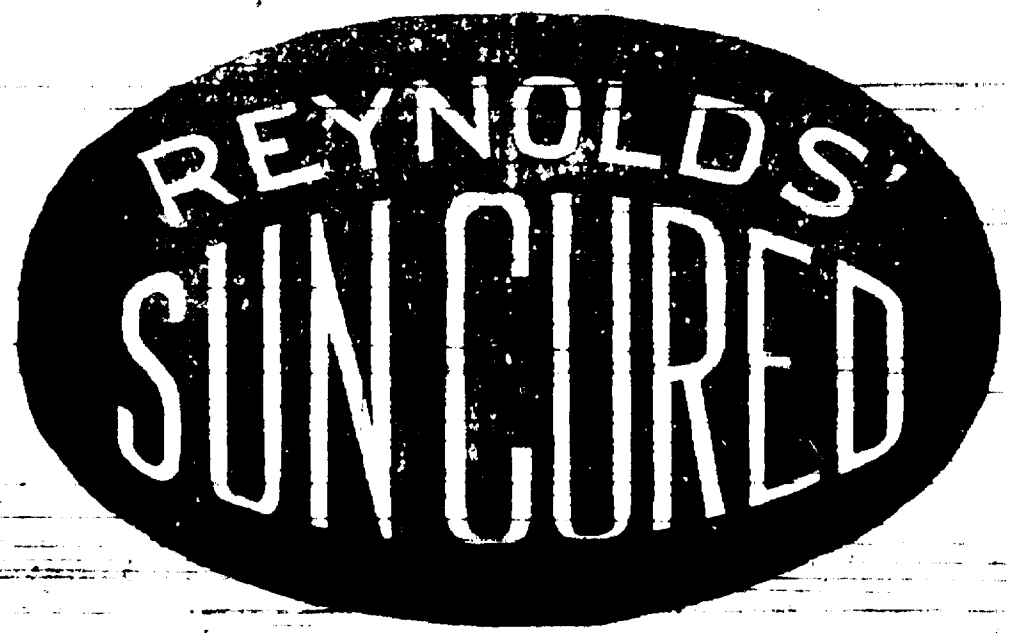

Some figures that have been prepared by the Santa Fe railroad, relating to the corn crop this year, are interesting to business men in general. The figures are as follows: The year's crop is estimated at 2,730,000,000 bushels. If weighed it would amount to nearly 80,000,000 tons. If it were shocked and thrown in piles to form pyramids, it would make 76 of them, each 451 feet high and 750 feet at the base. If shelled and sent to the elevators, it would tax to the utmost the full capacity of 45 centers of distribution, each as great as Chicago. If put into a car, each containing 1,000 bushels, the corn would require 2,730,000 trains of thirty cars each to carry to market. Putting two trains to a mile, they would stretch fifteen times across the continent, or twice around the globe at the Kansas parallel. There is enough of this corn to supply every living person in the world with two bushels. Even after this country's own vast consumption has been fully provided for there will be enough left to give every person in Russia's vast empire one bushel. At present market prices this crop would be worth \$1,410,400,000. Allowing a decline of 10 cents a bushel in the price when the market becomes glutted, the value of the crop at the decline would be \$1,092,000,000, an amount big enough, if equally distributed, to give every man woman and child in the United States \$13.65.

This story is of unusual local interest. It is written by a Virginian, Miss Castleman of Herndon, Va., and the scenes are laid almost wholly in Virginia. Quaint old Alexandria, the Theological Seminary, Mt. Vernon and Arlington are faithfully sketched by one in love with the scenes.

White the story is lacking in strength of plot and vivacity it is as clean as a dewdrop on the violet's petal, and it might be better for the world if we had more stories like it and fewer of the strenuous bursts of passion and realism. It is not an oil painting of life but a pastel for the chance-rail or the theological students' library. It does not excite but it does please the eye. It moves among bifurcated figures but does not quite become a part of history.

Its best delineation is that of Mrs. Fitzhugh, though the picture of the daughter is touched at times with the grace of an artist. The remaining characters do not seem quite the real human pictures we see in everyday life.

The conception of the story and its telling is a compliment to Virginia womanhood, and its author is to be congratulated on knowing and presenting only the essentially pure and beautiful side of life.

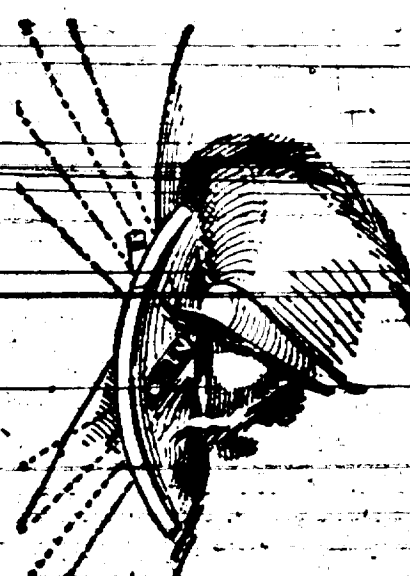
