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"THIS IS A HORSE"

NOTE there was a small boy who wrote "This is a Horse" after trying for hours to draw a copy on his slate of a thoroughbred racer. He admired the horse, Waltham, but did not know how to draw him. He had no experience to practice on, but he had a desire to draw. When his labor was over, and he looked first at the picture he drew, **THIS IS A HORSE**, realizing his failure and that he could not make it all right. How many more hours of practice would it take him to learn to draw? If it is not as good as any other, what about the pleasure of drawing?

This active principle of tobacco is so powerful that the smallest dose of one thirty second of a grain caused an intense burning in the throat, gullet and stomach, which was followed by giddiness, nausea, extreme muscular weakness, laborious respiration, and with extreme, partial loss of consciousness, a rapid, feeble pulse, and other indications of impending collapse.

In large amounts nicotine acts with lightning-like rapidity. In a case of suicide, in which the amount taken could not be ascertained, the man dropped instantly to the floor, gave a long-drawn sigh and was dead in three minutes.

When nicotine is added to freshly drawn blood the blood takes on a peculiar, dark hue, and upon examination with the microscope the minute vital particles in the blood are found to be rapidly breaking up and dying.

It is doubtful just how nearly this represents the inward condition of tobacco-users, since during life the poison which gains entrance to the body is constantly being eliminated by the various organs in the performance of their offices. It is certain, however, that abuse of tobacco will eventually lead to deterioration of the blood. And it is upon this influence of nicotine upon the circulation, as well as upon its effect upon the nervous system, that advocates of total abstinence from the use of tobacco correctly base their arguments.

One can not easily convince of his errors a person who finds greater solace in his nerves from an after-dinner cigar, but the almost continual employment of tobacco in some form, and especially the inhalation of the fumes from a cigarette, which has its own distinct and pernicious effect, is strongly to be discouraged.

The example of men who have been tobacco users for a lifetime with impunity proves nothing save that there are many men with constitutions strong enough to withstand a test which is entirely unnecessary.

Wild Beasts at Large.

From Richmond Times-Dispatch.

The last bulletin of the Virginia board of health shows that tuberculosis causes more deaths in Virginia than any other disease. More alarming still to the people of Richmond is that tuberculosis is more prevalent here than in any other city in the state. During the month of November there were seventy-four deaths in Richmond from tuberculosis, against forty-one in all other cities of the state combined.

Yet doctors are all agreed that tuberculosis is a preventable disease, and that prevalence is due to negligence of the people. If it should be generally known that there were wild beasts in this city which destroyed in a single month twenty-four of our citizens, the whole city would be aroused, and steps would be taken immediately to destroy them, regardless of trouble and cost.

But the tuberculous beast areas so many wild beasts at large in this community. In fact, they are worse than so many lions and tigers, for the large beasts would be seen and avoided, while the little beasts float in the air and are too small to be observed with the naked eye, and so they prey upon their victims at will and without warning.

The trouble is that the people do not believe this, or, if they do believe it, they are indifferent because they do not see the beasts. But whether they believe or not, the beasts are here, and they are doing their deadly work. Every man, woman and child in the city is liable to be attacked by them; and still we go about our affairs in an indifferent way and do not take precautions against them. It is a reflection upon our intelligence and our prudence. We should give this subject our most serious consideration, and we should without regard to expense take immediate steps to stamp out the germs of this dread disease.
