






Brief Local News

Nicol, by special arrangement with Bull Run Council, No. 104, J. O. U. A., delivered an address on the subject of Immigration in Wilson's hall on Saturday night last. Many persons besides Juniors were present and much interest was taken in the address. Judge Nicol practically endorsed the teachings of the Junior organization, which has been from its inception foremost in an aggressive fight against the promiscuous and heterogeneous influx of foreigners. While not opposed to all immigration, Judge Nicol took a vigorous stand against this foreign menace of the pauper and criminal classes pouring into this country, declaring it to be one of the most serious questions confronting the American people. He favored such restrictive and regulations as would protect both the American home and American labor. This, he said, could be accomplished through our consulate abroad, who should be considered as the states agent and character of those who propose to seek a home in this country. The address was one of the ablest that Judge Nicol has ever delivered in his home town and was freely applauded by his audience. J. O. U. A. in Condemn. Judge Griener of the chancery court of Richmond ended Thursday morning the litigation which has been going on for nearly five years by deciding that the corner lot known as the Junior Order of United Americans was in contempt of court by establishing a lodge in the city of Alexandria under a character issued by the corporation commission. May 6 has been fixed for the formal entry of the order and all officers of the society in contempt will be summoned on that date. It was instigated by counsel for the order that the case would be carried to the supreme court. 

The Tuberculin Test.

ERRATA: Y. K. April 24, 1907. The article in your issue of April 24, 1907, from the Washington Post entitled "Tuberculin Test in a Washington County," is a misquoting of the Virginia and District Milk Producers Association. I wish to say in the first place that the reports which have been and are now being published in the Washington papers are based upon reports of some parties sent out by the bureau of Agriculture and the health department which know about as much about the tuberculin test as we do and who made reports very harmful to the dairymen. In the first place the tuberculin test, as the best experts have stated, is not an established test but one that is only an experiment and in its infancy. Tests made by experts have shown that the cows which were infected when the tuberculin was applied did not respond to it at all, and cows which did respond were killed and when examined were found to be absolutely sound and free from any disease whatever. In regard to the herd of cows which were tested at the health department or assurance do we have that these cows had tuberculosis? Some will say because the tuberculin test proved it. We are here to say we are from Missouri, and they will have to show us. If the tuberculin test was an established test, instead of an experiment in its infancy, and would do anything to make pure milk and cream, we would be very foolish to oppose it. As it is one of the laws in our Association to produce pure milk and cream, it should be accepted by the health department and such as we use on our own farms. If the disease in Washington is due to the infected milk and cream why are not our families, who use the very same milk and cream, suffering? If it is, you will find as little sickness as any class of people, if not less. When the real truth is learned of the cause of this trouble in Washington, it will be found that instead of the milk and cream sent from these brands of the health department will be the filthy old water from the Potomac, or some other cause, which the health department has failed to locate. We will now touch on the health office and its managers. The dairy men have been unnecessarily annoyed for some time past by a doctor from the bureau of agriculture, who not only acted very foolishly with us, but showed that he did not know his business and was not at all practical in his strange ideas. He made himself so very objectionable that the dairy men made such a kick he was transferred to another state. The health department has been so very close on us that we have been in hot water for six months. Making us live up to an iron clad permit here in Virginia and Maryland and actually allowing New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware to ship milk and cream into Washington without any permit whatever. If any sickness came from milk and cream it may have come from the milk from the North which was sent to Washington from cows and barns which never had been inspected. These circumstances have existed at least six months. We appointed a committee and sent it to interview the health department, and when the question was put to them they said that the health department would commit their heads down to the facts in the case, they admitted that such was the case, and that they would take steps to compel the Northern shippers to fit out applications for permits to ship milk and cream into Washington, which they have been shipping it for years without any permit. It was reported at our annual meeting, April 17th, by the best and largest dealers in Washington, that the Northern people had indicated that they would not ship milk and cream into Washington, unless the health department in Washington demanded the requirements which they had just received. Now, we think if the health department was so up to date and looking after the welfare of their citizens, they would have compelled the Northern milk shippers to comply with the same rules and regulations as the people in Virginia and Maryland. The older the milk is the more bacteria it contains and the more bacteria it contains the more dangerous it is. It is fifteen minutes and if such is the case, what do you suppose was the amount contained in the Northern milk and cream coming to Washington? If the tuberculin test is to be put in practice we wait congress to make a certain sum as some


