HIDDEN POT OF GOLD COIN A REUNION AT MANASSAS

A Mexican War Veteran Leads Futile Search For Treasure Buried in Mountains.

The commitment of Mr. Clason this week, to the Western State hospital, recalls a long and arduous task he performed some fifteen years ago, in trying to locate a hidden treasure of gold coin at the foot of Bull Run mountains, near Thoroughfare.

At that time there resided with him one Mr. George H. Allen, a Mexican war veteran, who aided and directed him in the futile search.

Mr. Allen claimed that when he came out of the Mexican war, he stopped in Richmond with a comrade who subsequently was taken, fatally ill and was sent to one of the hospitals of that city where he died.

Mr. Allen stated that he attended his sick comrade during his last illness and that just before his death he called him to his bedside and said: "George, I want you to take this chart and locate the sum of \$5,000 in gold at the foot of Bull Run mountains, near Thoroughfare Gap, in Prince William county. I know the money was securely hidden there a year ago, for I assisted in hiding it myself."

The chart was on a well-worn and dirty piece of paper and gave minute instructions as to the location of the buried treasure. The starting point was at a certain spring at the foot of a poplar tree and the treasure was said to have been buried in an iron pot a certain number of feet in a certain direction, by the aid of a compass, from the spring.

Mr. Lion and Mr. Allen spent nearly a week in prospecting for the iron pot containing the yellow gold but without success. So much faith had Mr. Allen in the coin being located as the chart directed that he sought the aid of numerous other persons, including Mr. Harry Hewett, now baggage master for the Southern Railway Company, at this place, to continue the search.

When Mr. Allen died, about ten years ago, he left his personal effects, including the chart, to Mr. Chas. Lion, and upon his deathbed insisted that the beneficiary continue the search for the gold coin with the aid of a competent surveyor, and expressing his confidence in an ultimate location of the same.

It is said that Mr. Lion, in his demented condition, frequently referred to the hidden gold and manifested a desire to further search for it.

Editor Post: I want to make a suggestion to Congress and to the country generally, through your columns, and especially to the surviving veterans on both sides who wore the blue and the gray. It is this: The 21st day of next July will be the fiftieth anniversary of the first battle of Manassas, and it has occurred to me that it would be a gracious thing, and tending to promote peace and good fellowship, if Congress would make an appropriation to bring together in a national encampment on that celebrated field the survivors of both armies who actually participated in the battle. The cost would not be great, probably not over \$50,000, for there are not many of them left, and some of them would be too feeble to go. We have only 15 out of 140 who enlisted in my old company, and if that proportion held good in all the other commands that were engaged there would not be many left to transport and feed.

It would be a splendid object lesson to the country and to the world, that 50 years after the battle the government assembles there the survivors of the two opposing armies to fraternize with each other. It would be a spectacle that could not take place in any other country on the globe, and would have a good effect in promoting the rising tide of peace and good will that seems to be prevailing over the country, and in wiping out any remaining animosities. What do you think of it?

The Business League of Manassas should take this matter in hand and secure the co-operation of our leading citizens, business men and county officials, in a like invitation.

Our people will recall with pleasure the visit of the society of the army of the Potomac, in 1905, and THE JOURNAL suggests that correspondence be opened with Gen. Horatio C. King, the efficient secretary of that organization, while the matter is being discussed by the press.

The destruction of the Prince William hotel at a time when it would be needed for the occasion referred to, is especially unfortunate, but we are advised that the authorities of Eastern College will open both their large halls, which will accommodate in the neighborhood of two hundred people. The presence of this reunion should inspire capitalists to provide suitable hotel accommodations for Manassas.

If the plan suggested by the Post's correspondent from South Carolina be adopted and an appropriation secured from the United States government towards defraying expenses, the war department would no doubt provide tents to accommodate the veterans and their friends.

BIG MEETING IN ROANOKE FAILURE OF CORPORATION

Virginia Farmers Spend Three Days Exchanging Views Along Lines of Agriculture.

The Virginia farmers week meeting, in Roanoke, began Tuesday and will close today. Governor Maxie is in attendance and is manifesting much interest in the meeting.

Seven associations have joined in holding the convention and 1,200 of the 2,000 members are present. The outside attendance is also very large. The organizations giving the meeting are: Virginia State Farmers' Institute, Virginia State Horticultural Society, Virginia Berkshire Breeders' Association, Virginia Jersey Breeders' Association, Virginia Cannery Association, Virginia State Dairymen's Association and Virginia Corn Growers' Association.

There are special meetings given by the various organizations in the special interest of their own associations and general meetings in which all farmers attend.

The largest and finest apple show ever held in the South was a feature to-day, while there was also corn, dairy and milk shows and exhibits of the Virginia Polytechnic Institute, State Food and Dairy Department and State Health Department.

To-day a free excursion was given by the city of Roanoke by special train to Blacksburg for a visit to the state agricultural experiment station and the Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

After the sessions of all the organizations there was a joint meeting of all, with addresses by Governor William Hodges Mann, Assistant Secretary W. M. Eaves, of the United States Department of Agriculture, and President L. E. Johnson, of the Norfolk and Western Railway, with Mayor Joel H. Cuthbert, of Roanoke, presiding.

The speakers for the several associations were men of state and national reputation, including the principal state officers, several representatives of the National Department of Agriculture, directors of the Ohio and Maryland experiment stations, university specialists, editors, etc. Their subjects were of a character to cover practically every phase of farm life and work and pleasure-farming, fruit-growing, dairying, canning, householding, corn-growing, better schools and roads, household economy, etc.

Joseph D. Eggleston, Superintendent of Public Instruction, spoke Tuesday on Agricultural Education in the public schools. Monday night the local Road Production in Virginia.

Good Roads a Necessity for Profitable Farming, was the subject discussed by State Highway Commissioner P. St. J. Wilson.

The Mercantile Railway and Building and Loan Association Closes Its Doors.

Upon application of the directors of the Mercantile Railway and Building and Loan Association of Alexandria, Judge J. B. T. Thornton, of the Circuit Court, yesterday appointed Messrs. Douglas Stuart and Lewis R. Hoof, of the city of Alexandria, receivers to wind up the affairs of the association. Bond in the sum of \$25,000 was required of the receivers.

It is thought that the assets of the association will fully pay the indebtedness of the corporation. The necessity for the appointment of receivers was brought about by the suspension of the Virginia Safe Deposit and Trust Corporation of Alexandria, on December 29.

The Mercantile Railway and Building and Loan Association operated pretty extensively in this and adjoining counties, and loans to the extent of many thousand dollars negotiated.

THE STATE DAIRY SCHOOL A BIRTHDAY-CELEBRATION

"Something About Everything, Everything About Something" Taught.

BY PROF. H. F. BUTTON (Director Manassas Agricultural School) Those who attend the State Dairy School, which is to be held in the courthouse on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Jan. 17, 18, 19 and 20, will be treated to a large share of what Huxley defined as a liberal education.

An educated man should know "something about everything and everything about something." The dairyman, whether he has two cows or fifty, should come to learn all about dairying. The non-dairyman can come with almost equal profit to learn something of the most important and profitable branch of our local agriculture. The business man and investor may learn of the prospects of dairy farming and its safety as an investment. The carpenter and contractor will wish to learn how to build stables in conformity with the requirements of the boards of health and at the same time at a reasonable cost. The housewife will learn the care of milk and the means to preserve it in good condition. The problems of feeding dairy cows are the problems of feeding all kinds of live stock and are of as much interest to the general farmer as to the dairyman.

The great question of maintaining the fertility of the soil is to be treated by an expert on the subject. All agree that the fertility has decreased, and it is evident that unless it is increased our civilization is on a downward path. Let every one who has the interest and the welfare of the county at heart come to this one lecture at least, which in importance ranks above all others that we are called upon to settle.

There has been so much said on the subject of tuberculosis that the layman feels more than a little confused. There is no topic that deserves a larger or more general audience than that which treats of bovine tuberculosis. Let every one come and get the truth direct from one who has the authority to speak.

On one evening Prof. S. W. Fletcher will give a lecture illustrated by a stereopticon. His topic is not yet announced, but we may rest assured that Prof. Fletcher has something worth saying and that he will say it in an entertaining manner. Watch for the announcements.

The success or failure of the Dairy School now rests with the farmers and townpeople of Manassas. If the school is well patronized and supported it will be the first of a series of such schools. If, on the other hand, the attendance is light and the interest poor the State Department of Agriculture will very properly confine its schools to such places as show a proper appreciation. Another reason for a wide interest is to be found in the Dooliver-Davis bill of which mention has been made.

If the State Dairy School is other a great success it will give other communities an argument why Manassas is not the best location for the larger state school.

Therefore, for the intrinsic value of the instruction, as well as for local pride in making everything that comes to Manassas a success, let us have a full attendance from the time when the school opens on Tuesday, at 10 a. m. until it closes on Friday, at 3.30 p. m.

Those acquainted with the deceased will attest his many admirable qualities of mind and heart, and who will mourn his loss.

COL. N. BERKELEY DEAD

A Confederate Veteran Passes Peacefully Away in His Home at Waterfall.

Col. Norborne Berkeley, eighty-two years old, died at his home, near Waterfall, yesterday afternoon, following a stroke of paralysis on Monday.

He was educated at the Virginia Military Institute and at the beginning of the Confederate war, was made Lieutenant Colonel of the celebrated eighth Virginia Infantry commanded by the late General Epps Hunton.

When Colonel Hunton was wounded at the battle of Gettysburg, Col. Berkeley was promoted to the command of the regiment and led it, with gallantry, through many hard-fought battles.

Though Col. Berkeley had attained over four score years of age, he manifested the vitality and energy of one very much younger, and took much interest in caring for the details of his rural home at the foot of the romantic Bull Run mountains.

When stricken he was engaged in pruning his well-kept orchard, and death claimed him without his regaining consciousness.

The deceased is survived by an elder brother, Lieutenant Colonel Edmund Berkeley, who, upon the promotion of his brother Norborne, at Gettysburg, was made Lieutenant Colonel of the regiment.

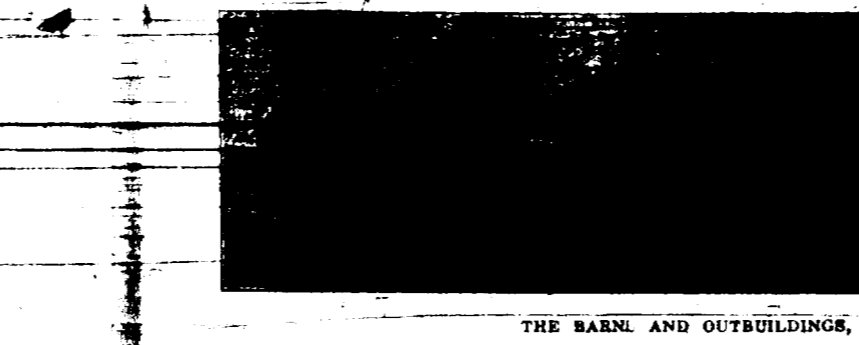
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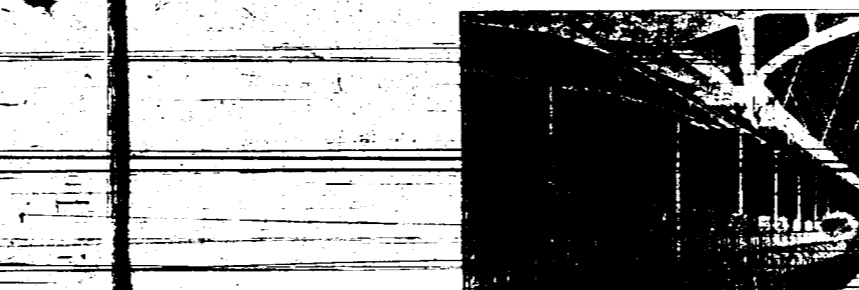
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
